Updates on two major projects undertaken by the City of Garden Grove will be provided at Tuesday's meeting of the city council.

A progress report on the status of the \$152 million Civic Center project that will include a new multi-story police building connected to a parking structure as well as a "new" Civic Center Park will be presented.

The project is located

generally at Acacia Parkway and Euclid Street. The new police building and parking garage are expected to be finished by the fall of 2026 with demolition of the old building around that time.

The redesigned 2.8-acre Civic Center Park is scheduled for completion in fall 2027.

The Central Cities Navigation Center at 13871 West St. is now open and operating. It serves up to 85 homeless persons from Garden Grove, Fountain Valley and Westminster.

The council will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave.

GG pastor is finally released by China

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Christian pastor from Garden Grove has been freed from China after nearly 20 years behind bars and is back home in the U.S., the State Department said this week.

David Lin, 68, was detained after he entered China in 2006, later con-

victed of contract fraud and sentenced to life in prison, according to the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom and advocacy groups.

He was part of the Evangelical Formosan Church located at Lampson Avenue and Nelson Street.

"Praise God! We got the call late last night!!! Dad is free and over Alaska

now," the pastor's daughter, Alice Lin, said by text message Sunday to Bob Fu, a longtime supporter and the founder of China Aid, an U.S.-based ad-

vocacy group for persecuted activists in China. Fu shared with The Associated Press a screenshot of the text sent before the Lins reunited.

The Biden administration has been working on David Lin's case and those of other wrongly detained Americans in China for years and have raised them at every meeting with se-

nior Chinese officials, including Secretary of State Antony Blinken's meeting this summer with Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi in Laos. Such meetings aim to keep communication open between Washington and Beijing despite escalating tensions.

"We welcome David Lin's release from prison in the People's Republic of China. He has returned to the United States and reunited with his family for the first time in nearly 20 years," State Department spokesman Matthew Miller told reporters.

"We'll continue to push the release of other Americans," he said. "It's something that we continue to work on. It's an important step forward, and we're going to continue to push for the release of other Americans."

Lin frequently traveled to China in the 1990s to spread the gospel, according to China Aid, which says Lin sought a license

from the Chinese government to carry out Christian ministry. It's unlikely he was granted permission, and he was detained in 2006 when assisting a church not authorized by Chinese officials, the group said.

Lin was formally arrested in 2009 on suspicion of contract fraud and, after a court review, was sentenced to life in prison, China Aid said.

The charge is frequently used against leaders of churches that operate outside state-sponsored faith groups, and it is a crime that Lin denied, according to the Dui Hua Foundation, a humanitarian group that advocates for prisoners in China. The commission on religious freedom says those leading and taking part in churches not sanctioned by the Chinese government "often face intimidation, harassment, arrest and harsh sentences."

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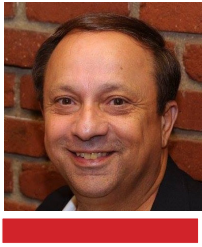

'Signs' of things to come to HB from Portage?

Whether you agree with – or don't agree with – the initiatives promoted by the conservative majority of the Huntington Beach City Council, it's hard to escape the conclusion that many of them are ideologically-based.

This isn't entirely a surprise ... the previous semi-liberal majority swung a bit left in its heyday, so this isn't some kind of precedent-breaking development.

It's the nature of the controversy generated by the topics chosen that's put the Big Four into the limelight locally as well as nationally.

So far, we've seen them act in ways that have chafed the chaps of gays, the transgendered, librarians, state officials and now, people who feel that Israel has gone too far in its pursuit of Hamas and not at all far enough with regard to the fate of Palestinians.

So, if we believe that the council majority has a conservative playbook, or schedule, what's next?

One example could come from Portage County, Ohio where Sheriff Bruce Zuchowski posted on Facebook last week that residents should make a record of everyone who had posted signs on their property supporting "Harris for President."

Angry about conditions at the Mexican border – just a few off-ramps from the Buckeye State, surely – he suggested that illegal immigrants – whom he called "locusts" – should be housed in the homes of supporters of Harris – whom he called a "laughing hyena."

He concluded his latest post by saying, "I am a Law Man ...

'Sister City' relationship with Ramat Gan in Israel approved

■ HUNTINGTON BEACH CITY COUNCIL

Tuesday night's approval of a ordinance declaring Huntington Beach a "parents right to know city" wasn't the only controversial decision made by the city council.

On identical 4-3 votes – with Mayor Gracey Van De Mark, Vice Mayor Pat Burns and Councilmembers Tony Strickland and Casey McKeon in the majority – the council approved taking steps toward initiating a "Sister City" relationship with Ramat Gan in Israel and rejected a proposal to improve city hall security by installing devices to "detect individuals attempting to enter the building with weapons."

After a closed session, the council returned and voted 4-3 – along the same lines – to immediately file a lawsuit to chal-

lenge the constitutionality of Assembly Bill 1955, which forbids public school staff from having to inform parents or any other person if their child's gender

identification changes, without the child's permission.

The council meeting was adjourned at 11:27 p.m.

Bicyclist, 92, dies after a car collision

A 92-year-old Fountain Valley man was fatally injured Tuesday afternoon in Westminster when he was struck by an automobile while he was riding a bicycle.

According to Sgt. Alan Aoki of the WPD, the incident took place around 4 p.m. in the intersection of Newland Street and Bolsa Avenue.

The bicyclist was found bleeding and down in the roadway. He was breathing but unresponsive. The motorist remained at the scene and was cooperative with police.

Orange County Fire Authority personnel – along with WPD officers – attempted lifesaving measures but the cyclist was pronounced deceased.

Early voting has begun in part of USA

It may seem like the 2024 presidential campaign has gone on forever, continuing without end, but the last innings are here.

In-person voting started Friday in Minnesota, South Dakota, and Virginia. According to the Associated Press, a dozen more states will join the parade to the polling places in mid-October.

The election is Nov. 5. By Monday, county election officials will mail ballots to each active registered voter in California and they can fill out their ballots immediately and mail them back in.

The last day to register to vote

is Monday, Oct. 21. But from Tuesday, Oct. 22 to Nov. 5, eligible California residents can sign up for same-day voter registration.

Early voting sites will open in California on Monday, Oct. 7. Ballot drop-off locations will be open no later than Tuesday, Oct. 8.

Vote by mail ballots that are mailed must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by – in our case – the Orange County Registrar of Voters. On Election Day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Controversial candidate has North Carolina GOP 'anxious'

North Carolina – typically a red state – is considered a swing state in this presidential election, with candidates Kamala Harris and Donald Trump in a virtual dead heat in the polls.

But the Republican candidate for governor could tip the election away from the ruling party, according to The New York Times. Mark Robinson, the state's Black lieutenant governor, has roiled the campaign for his controversial statements and

web posts.

Published reports say he has described himself as a "black Nazi," praised slavery in an adult online forum and discussed his tastes in pornography.

He denies those accusations but Republican leaders, see-

ing Robinson badly trailing his Democratic rival, worry he will depress his party's vote and perhaps allow Harris to get a narrow win which would be crucial to the overall election, sending the state's 16 Electoral College votes to the Democratic ticket.

Wall Street ends week on a record high; Dow up 1.62%

Still reacting to Wednesday's half-point interest rate cut by the Federal Reserve, the Dow Jones Industrial average Friday closed at a record-high 42,963.36, up 38 points overall and a 1.62 percent rise.

The Fed's action was the first

rate cut since 2020, according to United Press International.

The S&P 500 was up 1.36 percent for the week to 5,702.44, while the Nasdaq rose by 1.49 percent, finishing at 17,948.32.

‘Transformers One’ Nobody Needs

Who asked for this cheesy origin story?

Movie origin stories finally reach their nadir this week with “Transformers One,” the super-violent, toy-selling vehicle that tells the tale of how Optimus Prime and Megatron went from besties to foes. Did anyone ask for this? Did Wile E. Coyote and the Road Runner ask for too much money?

The computer-animated “Transformers One” is out of time, a throwback to a few years ago when Hollywood mined popular IP for forgotten heroes, built overly complex worlds and then ramped up the action so that the audience just got numbed to a blur of battles. But “Transformers One” isn’t good enough to watch on a plane, even a trans-Pacific flight. The inflight map is better.

A map isn’t a bad idea, actually: You may need some sort of guide for this one — those uninitiated to the folklore of Cybertron are flung helplessly into references to Energon, Alpha Trion, Quintessons and something called the Matrix of Leadership. You come in halfway into a conversation.

The story by Andrew Barrer and Gabriel Ferrari is basically the Bible’s Cain and Abel with a detour into the Roman Empire and the Hasbro figurines’ accumulated mythology, which seems to be a series of never-ending epic battles between good and evil. Some stuff just seems downright weird, like why these robots need a gym or why after running they become breathless.

The main heroes here are buddies Orion Pax and D-16 — who will become mortal enemies Optimus Prime and Megatron by

the end — and we meet them when they are lowly miners, basically non-transforming bots digging for reserves of the energy cleverly called Energon.

This is a society in which the upper class is made up of Transformers who stomp around preening while the lower classes do dirty jobs like comb through garbage.

They all serve Sentinel Prime, the leader of the subterranean Iacon City, who is not what he seems. He is apparently the last of the Primes and lives in a marble palace, giving the people below spectacles as a diversion, like an epic road race. It gives off ancient Roman Coliseum vibes. Orion Pax (voiced with puppy-dog sweetness by Chris Hem-

sworth) is not satisfied by this life. “There’s got to be something more I can do,” he says. “Aren’t you tired of being treated like you’re nothing?” Brian Tyree Henry voices D-16 with skepticism and resignation.

The two friends join with mining manager Elita-1 (Scarlett Johansson, bland) and Keegan-Michael Key’s B-127 (who will later become fan favorite Bumblebee) to journey to the surface of the planet, find the Matrix of Leadership (a sort of necklace that might have been sold in the Sharper Image catalog) and get a hero’s welcome. But they learn some unsavory things about the ruler from the Transformer elder statesman Alpha Trion (the instantly recognizable Laurence Fishburne).

Director Josh Cooley, who co-wrote the screenplay for “Inside

Out” and helmed “Toy Story 4,” never lets the action stop — and that’s not a compliment. The camera is constantly swiveling and the violence — assault-weapon lasers, booming cannons, light torture, martial arts crunching moves, beating a rival with their own amputated limb and ceaseless pounding — is nauseating. (“Please stop punching me in the face” is a joke line here.)

If Transformers ever bled, this would be an R-rated movie.

The hyper-violence papers over some pretty robotic — sorry! — dialogue. Why do all these movies show the Transformers with cool upgrades like laser knives

The rebirth of the best sports magazine: SI

As I wrote in a column earlier this year, I have been a fan of Sports Illustrated for many years. Published weekly – in addition to its popular but somewhat controversial swimsuit issue – SI was the last word in sports journalism.

Sure, we all watched the big football game, but to find out the personalities, strategems and weirdness behind the scenes we waited for the latest issue to arrive.

Earlier this year, amidst the turmoil of changes of ownership for the magazine, I dropped my subscription. Well, following many plaintive entreaties to “please come back” – along with a ridiculously low price – I signed up for the digital version.

Wow.

Whatever confusion in direction made SI highly expendable has lifted. The new issue is 82 pages of gorgeous color, with articles that grabbed my attention right away.

The first was an in-depth examination about what happened to the Pac-12. It's complicated, but – according to SI – the culprits are the college presidents and athletic directors at UCLA and USC. They turned down offers of \$30 million annually from ESPN, demanding \$50 million.

When denied, they took their pigskin and left for the Big 10(ish), and that collapsed the conference as the Bruins (basketball) and Trojans (football) are/were the marquee programs of the conference.

Their departure started a rush for the exits and now you have California schools in an

Best At-Bat Day Ever?

Shohei: 3 homers, 10 RBIs, 2 steals means a 50-50 club

MIAMI (AP) — Shohei Ohtani became the first player in major league history to hit 50 home runs and steal 50 bases in a season when he homered three times and stole two bases to lead the Los Angeles Dodgers to a play-off-clinching 20-4 rout of the Miami Marlins on Thursday.

“Happy, relieved and very respectful to the peers and everybody who came before me to play this sport of baseball,” Ohtani said through an interpreter.

Ohtani also became the first player with three homers and two steals in a game. He doubled twice, had a career-best six hits and set a Dodgers record with 10 RBIs. His 51 homers this season broke Shawn Green's franchise record of 49, set in 2001.

“The individual performance tonight was remarkable,” Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said. “With this game of baseball, it was a win for Major League Baseball. I know people all over the globe were watching this

game and we're excited to see that they got a chance to witness history.”

The Japanese star began the day two homers and one steal shy of the 50-50 mark. Ohtani doubled to lead off the game and then swiped third to get to 50 steals. He stole his 51st base in the second inning.

Ohtani homered in the sixth off reliever George Soriano, a 438-foot drive to the second deck in right-center. His 49th homer put

Shohei hits 52nd; Halos fall

Shohei Ohtani continued to nail his name into the record books on Friday as he hit his 52nd home run of the 2024 season in the Los Angeles Dodgers' 6-4 win over the Colorado Rockies.

He also stole his 52nd base, drove in two runs and scored twice to help the Blue Crew improve its record to 92-62.

The Dodgers now hold a four-game lead over the second place San Diego Padres in the National League West and have secured a

place in the playoffs.

Andy Pages and Teo Hernandez also homered.

The Los Angeles Angels continued their end-of-the season skid, losing 9-7 to the Houston Astros. The Houston team jumped out to an early 6-1 lead and the Angels could never quite catch up, despite getting 13 hits.

Taylor Anderson (10-14) was rocked for eight hits and six runs (three of them earned) in two innings.

the Dodgers ahead 9-3. His turn came again in the seventh and Ohtani connected with his historic blast, an opposite-field shot over the left-field wall against Mike Baumann.

"Being honest, it was something I wanted to get it over as soon as possible," Ohtani said. "The balls were being exchanged every time I came up to bat."

Ohtani was mobbed by his Dodgers teammates when he reached the dugout. The crowd of 15,548 continued cheering until Ohtani emerged from the dugout for a curtain call.

The Marlins' home ballpark has special significance to Ohtani. It's where he struck out star slugger Mike Trout for the final out of Japan's victory over the United States in the championship of the 2023 World Baseball Classic.

"I've had perhaps the most memorable moments here in my career and this stadium has become one of my favorite stadiums," Ohtani said.

With first base open before Ohtani's first two homers, Marlins manager Skip Schumaker opted to have Soriano and Bau-

mann pitch to Ohtani instead of intentionally walking him.

"If it was a tight game, one run lead or we're down one, I probably put him on," Schumaker said. "Down that many runs, that's a bad move baseball-wise, karma-wise, baseball god-wise. You go after him to see if you can get him out. I think out of respect for the game, we were going to go after him. He hit the home run. That's just part of the deal."

The Dodgers respected Schumaker's decision.

"A lot of us actually looked at the opposing dugout and I think a lot of the coaches were telling Skip, 'Hey, we should walk him right here,'" Dodgers infielder Max Muncy said. "I've always loved Skip. When he was the first base coach in San Diego, I always talked to him. I heard all guys love to play for him. For him to do that, that's awesome."

Added Roberts: "The game was certainly out of hand. Guys got their starters out and then to take that potential moment away from the fans, Shohei himself, Skip understood that. It was bigger than that and I've got nothing for respect for that."

but they remain speaking in stilted, operatic prose? "I want him to suffer and die in darkness," "They are to be your undoing" and "Cybertron's future is in your hands."

There are some good moments, of course. When our band of misfit bots get an upgrade to

Transformer status, they cutely don't know how to do it seamlessly at first, with limbs awkwardly getting mixed with vehicle parts. Anyone who has played with the toys knows the feeling.

And Key never fails to generate a chuckle, proving a masterful comedic voice actor.

The other actors — Jon Hamm and Steve Buscemi, included — hardly register and the movie's main song — "If I Fall" by Quavo, Ty Dolla \$ign and Brian Tyler's Are We Dreaming — feels like AI wrote both the uninteresting rap-rock beat and soupy lyrics ("I'm the alpha, omega, got lights on me, Vegas." Vegas?)

The saddest thing about "Transformers One" is the wastefulness of another dull outing in a universe geared toward kids just learning to transform themselves. The lessons here, unfortunately, are that friends can become enemies overnight and you only win if you beat someone hard enough. "We're better than this," Orion Pax screams at his sudden rival at one point. No, they're not.

"Transformers One," a Paramount release that landed in theaters Friday, is rated PG for "sci-fi violence and animated action throughout, and language." Running time: 103 minutes.
