Tet Festival Returns to the GG Park

It's on from Jan. 31 to Feb. 2, 2025

Approval was granted by the Garden Grove City Council on Tuesday night to the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations to conduct a Tet Festival in Garden Grove Park next year, but not without some skepticism.

The vote was 6-0 in favor with Councilmember Joe DoVinh abstaining. The one-year agreement authorizes the UVSA to

bring the event to the city's largest park from Friday, Jan. 31-Sunday, Feb. 2, 2025.

Most members of the council were enthusiastic about the return of the event to Garden Grove, which was the home of the festival from 2001-13.

Councilmember George Brietigam spoke of how much he and his family enjoyed attending the festival in years past.

But DoVinh made an

Council takes care of housekeeping business

Several "housekeeping" actions were approved by the Stanton City Council when it met on Tuesday night.

The council voted 5-0 to accept as completed the demolition and clearing of the site of a vacant four-plex building at 8930 Pacific Avenue.

According to a city staff report, the building had been damaged by fire and was the center of vandalism and other minor crime

in the surrounding area.

The cost of the project was \$96,000, paid to Interior Demolition, Inc.

Also on Tuesday night, the council approved on 5-0 votes:

- a license agreement with Southern California Edison for a five-year lease on three parcels of property utilized by the city for Hollenbeck

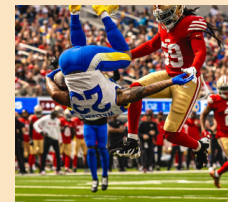

oblique reference to the scandal in 2015 when the UVSA removed two of its leaders – the president and treasurer – for allegedly embezzling over \$118,000 from the 2013 event.

Speakers from the UVSA addressed the councilmembers, assuring them that there would be “full transparency” and incidents of years past wouldn't be repeated.

But DoVinh questioned whether any of the members of the UVSA Board of Directors – who

are responsible for overseeing the actions of the UVSA and the conduct of the festival – were in the audience.

He named each member of the board and asked “Present or not?” and received no answer. Councilmember John O'Neill said board members were located all across Southern California and might not be able to make it to Garden Grove on a Tuesday night.

The council heard updates on Civic Center Revitalization and Central Cities Navigation Center.

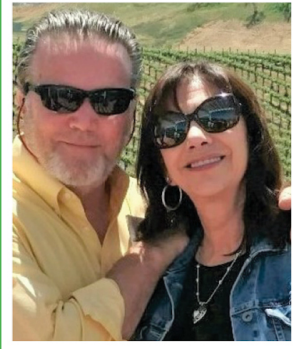

Justice for all, not just justice for my side

Ten people, including two professors, will face misdemeanor charges of refusing to disperse as police tried to clear the University of California, Irvine campus of encampments in May created to demonstrate for Palestine in the struggle between Israel and Hamas militants.

More charges could be coming; the court date is Oct. 16.

I am not moved.

It's not that I am not upset about the deadly overreac-

tion of the Israeli government to the heinous attack by Hamas forces in starting the war, killing 1,500 Israelis and taking hostages, many of whom were mistreated and some executed.

What I am asking is where were these "warriors for justice" in the early stages of the conflict, when it was the Israelis who were being callously slain?

It reminds of me of the Vietnam War protests – also largely students – who raged in the streets and campuses over what they saw as cruel and unjust acts on the part of the U.S. government.

But when the Communists prevailed in Vietnam and Cambodia, a mean tyranny descended in those countries. Hundreds of thousands of people were confined in "reeducation camps," and many tortured in Vietnam.

In Cambodia (renamed temporarily Kampuchea), the victorious Khmer Rouge committed a genocide on their own people, taking the lives of an estimated 1.5 to 2 million persons, about 25 percent of the nation's population. In terms of the United States, that would mean about

Commemoration of the history of the former Republic of (South) Vietnam is again on the agenda for the Westminster City Council when it meets on Wednesday.

The council will consider two special events permits on those themes.

Candidate forum set on Saturday

A candidate forum for those running for Garden Grove City Council, mayor and Garden Grove Unified School District Board of Education will be held on Saturday in the Courtyard Center, 12732 Main St. (Village Green park).

Doors will open at 10 a.m. and the program begins at 10:30 p.m. Each candidate will have five minutes to address the audience.

There will be no questions or interruptions from the audience. Guests can speak to candidates at their tables/booths in the activity room.

First will be an application from Dien Dan Giao Dan and the Coalition of the Republic of Vietnam Veteran Associations in Southern California to hold a memorial for President Ngo Dinh Diem on Sunday, Nov. 3 at Sid Goldstein Freedom Park in the Civic Center.

The other is an application from the Lost Soldiers Foundation to hold the Fifth Anniversary of the Commemoration and Interment Ceremony for ARVN (Army of the Republic of Vietnam) Soldiers on Saturday, Oct. 26, also at Sid Goldstein Freedom Park. Diem was the first president of the Republic of Vietnam, serving from 1955 to 1963.

He was assassinated on Nov. 2, 1963 by leading generals concerned that his alleged favoritism toward Catholics in a nation that was mostly Buddhist would hinder the war effort against the communist Viet Cong.

The council will meet in a study session at 4 p.m., a closed session at 5 p.m. and an open session at 6 p.m. in its chambers located at 8200 Westminster Blvd.

10 charged in protests last spring at UCI

SANTA ANA (AP) — Prosecutors in Orange County have charged 10 people, including two professors, with failing to disperse during a pro-Palestinian protest last spring at the University of California, Irvine that led to a clash with police, officials said last week.

The Orange County District Attorney's office said those charged included two UCI professors and four students. All are due to appear in court on Oct. 16 to be arraigned on misdemeanor charges, the office said.

"The right to peaceful assembly is a constitutional right and we encourage protestors to exercise their right to peaceful assembly on any issue," Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer said in a statement. "However, criminal activity which transcends peaceful assembly will not be tolerated."

Prosecutors are continuing to review evidence to determine whether charges will be filed against the remaining 40 people arrested during the May incident on campus, the statement said.

The university said in a statement that all members of the campus community are subject to "all applicable laws, policies and relevant codes of conduct while engaging in protest activities."

In the spring, university officials said they had allowed a peaceful encampment to remain on campus even though it violated school policies, but called in police after a small group barricaded themselves inside a lecture hall, supported by a large group of community members outside. Police in riot gear who were sent to the scene made dozens of arrests.

Protest camps sprang up across the U.S. in the spring, including at University of California campuses, as students demanded that their universities cease doing business with Israel or companies they said supported the war in Gaza.

Israel continues bombing of Lebanon

Hezbollah replies with rocket strike into north Israel

Israel's bombing campaign in Lebanon has killed a leading commander of the Hezbollah militant group and left at least 560 people dead on Tuesday.

According to the Associated Press, thousands more are jamming roads in southern Lebanon to escape what could be a widening conflict.

Hezbollah sought to strike back by sending "dozens" of rockets into Israel, aiming at an explosives factory. The rain of rockets sent Israelis in the northern part of their country into bomb shelters.

Some schools in southern Lebanon have been closed to instruc-

tion and turned into shelters for those fleeing the attacks. Others are trying to escape by crossing

into Syria.

An Israeli military spokesman said the bombing would be "as

short as possible," but that "we must be prepared for it to take longer."

Ryan Routh indicted for assassination attempt against Donald Trump

Attempted assassination charges have been brought against Ryan Routh, the man arrested with a rifle near a location where former president and current Republican presidential nominee Donald Trump was present.

According to USA Today, the Justice Department has indicted Routh with attempted assassination of a political candidate and

other offenses. He is being held without bail.

Prosecutors say that they found a note written by Routh reading that his actions were "an assassination attempt."

Routh's son, Oran Routh, was also charged on Tuesday on allegations of receipt of, and possession of, child pornography.

Hurricane bound for Florida?

A tropical storm warning has been issued for the lower Florida Keys as Tropical Storm Helene threatens to turn into a hurricane later Tuesday.

According to United Press International, the storm was about 180 miles east-southwest of Mexico and about 170 miles

south-southeast of Cuba.

Forecasters say the storm system is moving northwest with "maximum winds of 45 miles an hour."

The storm/hurricane is expected to make landfall in or near the Big Bend region that includes the city of Tampa, sometime in the next 24 to 48 hours.

Pitt, Clooney Carry Caper Film 'Wolfs'

An old-school movie-star flick with much charm

The overriding tension in "Wolfs," starring George Clooney and Brad Pitt as rival fixers brought in to clean up the same crime, isn't so much the threat of police arrest or Albanian mob assassination — both of which are concerns. It's that Clooney and Pitt aren't pals.

The two start out as strangers to one another. It's a testament to Clooney and Pitt's jovial on-and-off screen chemistry, and their bond in shared movie-star charisma, that it's genuinely discomfiting to hear Pitt tersely call Clooney "sir" as he does in the opening scenes of Jon Watts' winning, clever caper. Pitt and Clooney first acted together in 2001's "Ocean's Eleven." And like that remake riff on the Rat Pack original, "Wolfs" is as much, if not more, about its movie stars as it is anything else.

The movie's appeal is mostly in their easy charm and chemistry — the little eye rolls and games of one-upmanship that accrue until, finally, they're buddies, like we want them to be.

Clooney is 63 and Pitt is 60, and there are few bits about back pain and Advil in Watts' film. But "Wolfs," which opens in limited theaters Friday and streams next week on Apple TV+, is designed to show you that they can still, without ever really breaking a sweat, get the job done.

When their characters meet, they are both standing in the penthouse of a luxury New York hotel where a tough-on-crime district attorney (Amy Ryan) is in desperate need of a cover up. A young, nearly naked man is seemingly dead on the floor.

She's frantically searched her phone for a number once given for such emergencies. That brings the first never-named fixer (Clooney) to the door. Not long after, the second, also unnamed fixer (Pitt) knocks. After a moment of confusion, he points to a small camera at the ceiling. He's been dispatched by the hotel owner (an unseen Frances McDormand) who doesn't want any bad press.

The two fixers are spiritual descendants, you might say, from Harvey Keitel's Winston Wolfe, the fast-driving cleaner of "Pulp Fiction." Each is a specialist, supposedly the only man who can do what they do. "Wolfs" — with an awkwardly spelled title that represents the pained collaboration of these two solo freelancers — is a little bit like the pointing Spider-Man meme brought to life. Fitting, then, that it comes from Watts, director of the three Tom Holland Spider-Man films. He also wrote the script.

There are more movies that

"Wolfs" has some kinship with, too, like Tony Gilroy's "Michael Clayton," a high point for Clooney in which he played the clean-up man of a malicious law firm. "Wolfs" doesn't measure up to anything like "Michael Clayton" — what does? — and isn't trying to, anyway.

This is more of an old-school movie-star-driven entertainment featuring two actors with skills as rarified as their characters', the kind of movie that was once regularly at home in theaters but now has instead been built for the streaming era.

Informed that they have to finish the job together, the two fixers begin to go about the business of getting rid of the body. They eye each warily, disinterested in giving away any tricks of the trade. This mostly falls to Clooney's character, whose creative way of lifting the body onto a luggage rack begins to earn the respect of Pitt's character.

They turn out to have much, maybe everything, in common. Slowly, reluctantly, they inch toward a partnership. It's a credit to Watts' keen sense of rhythm and his stars' subtlety that it more or less takes the whole

movie to get there. Once outside the hotel, "Wolfs" unspools over the course of one night, shot sleekly in the shadows of downtown Manhattan by cinematographer Larkin Seiple.

Things get a jolt when the body in question turns out to be alive, and kind of a hoot, too. The kid, credited only as "Kid," is roused from a drug-induced stupor, and quickly, in tighty whities, goes escaping down the street, forcing the two fixers on an extensive chase leading up to the Brooklyn Bridge. The kid is played with a lot of goofy moxie by Austin Abrams ("Euphoria," "The Walking Dead"), and his account of how he got into this mess, delivered in a cheap motel, may be the film's best sequence.

Along with Sean Baker's upcoming "Anora," it's turned into a surprisingly good season for New York nocturnal odysseys propelled by mop-haired kids who end up in Brighton Beach.

But the kid's perspective on his two captors also pushes "Wolfs" along. He's naive enough to

Late rally by Rams earns first win of the 2024 season

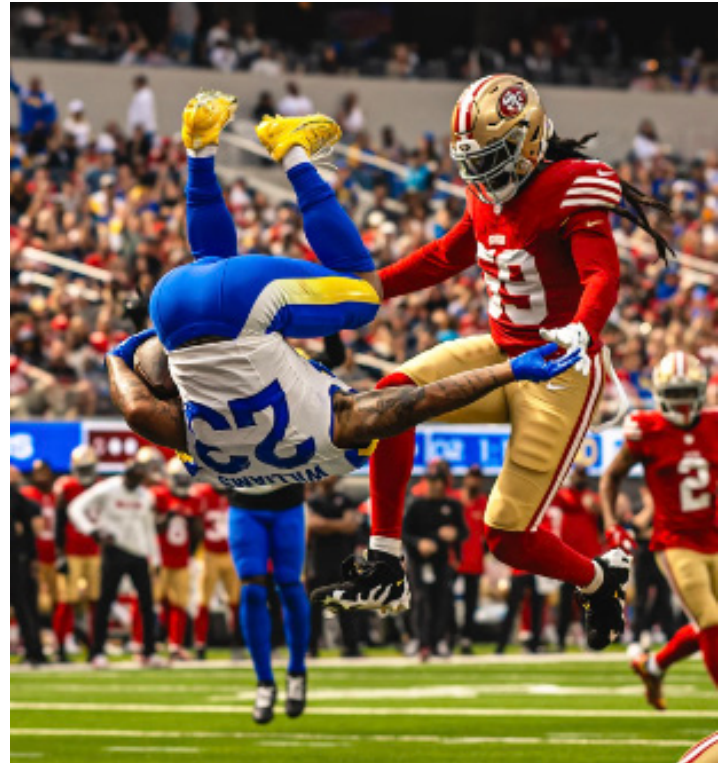
INGLEWOOD (AP) — The winless Los Angeles Rams were fresh off a 31-point loss and missing their top two receivers when they took the field Sunday against a rival that has dominated them for a half-decade.

The Rams then fell behind San Francisco by 14 points in the second half, and they still trailed by double digits midway through the fourth quarter.

Although Matthew Stafford has seen plenty of crazy stuff in his 16 years in pro football, the Rams' thrilling 27-24 comeback victory ranks way up there — both for the way it happened, and for the heart his team showed in grim circumstances.

"I'm not into improbable, probable," Stafford said. "NFL is an improbable business, I'll tell you that much. You never know what's gonna happen week in and week out. You've got to go out there and earn it and prove it, and we did that."

Kyren Williams rushed 4 yards to score his third touchdown of the day with 1:51 remaining, and Joshua Karty hit a 37-yard field

goal with 2 seconds left to complete the dramatic rally by Los Angeles, which outscored San Francisco 20-3 in the final 19 minutes.

The Rams (1-2) matched their franchise's biggest second-half comeback victory since 2006

while earning their second straight win over the 49ers (1-2) after losing nine of the NFC West archrivals' previous 10 meetings.

Williams caught a TD pass and

rushed for two scores for the Rams, who avoided their first 0-3 start under Sean McVay in remarkable fashion. Stafford passed for 221 yards, and Tutu Atwell had four catches for 93 yards.

"I think there are the games where you bring just a little bit more juice," Williams said. "Just the games where you can't wait to play, when everybody's doubting you and everybody's (saying), 'There's no way the Rams are gonna win. The Rams are gonna start 0-3.' We feel it for sure, but it's something that fuels us."

Jauan Jennings set career highs with 11 catches for 175 yards and three touchdowns for the 49ers, who blew a lead of at least 14 points for the first time since 2018.

While the Rams have salvaged hope for their season, the defending NFC champions were left flustered, frustrated — and under .500 for the first time since Brock Purdy became their starting quarterback in 2022.

The Niners led 24-14 midway through the fourth quarter, but Jake Moody missed a 55-yard field goal attempt for San Francisco with 2:43 to play. Stafford hit Atwell for a 50-yard completion to the San Francisco 5, and Williams took it in two plays

later.

Ronnie Bell then dropped a long pass with 1:02 left that would have put San Francisco in field goal range, and Xavier Smith — elevated from the Rams' practice squad for this game — took his first career punt return 38 yards to midfield.

A 25-yard pass interference penalty against linebacker De'Vondre Campbell put the Rams in range, and their rookie kicker buried the kick.

San Francisco threw several laterals after time expired, but the final play died on the Rams' sideline.

Purdy passed for 292 yards in the Super Bowl favorites' second straight road loss after falling at Minnesota last week.

"Plenty of opportunities," defensive end Nick Bosa said. "I can only speak for myself, and it wasn't good enough. We've got to close them out when we have a chance. ... It's definitely a rough start, but we've been through some tough stretches before, but we just have to stay together."

Both teams were missing most of their top offensive playmakers due to injury. The 49ers played without Christian McCaffrey, Deebo Samuel and George Kittle, while the Rams were without Cooper Kupp, Puka Nacua and Tyler Higbee.

For a while, it worked. The Los Angeles Chargers quarterback threw a first-half touchdown pass to Quentin Johnston and largely stayed out of trouble in the face of T.J. Watt and the rest of Pittsburgh's relentless pass rush.

It all ended midway through the third quarter when Herbert dropped back to pass and Steel-

ers linebacker Elandon Roberts crashed into him for a sack.

Herbert hobbled to the sideline one play later and watched backup Taylor Heinicke muster little the rest of the way as Pittsburgh surged to a 20-10 victory.

"I did everything I could to go back in there," Herbert said afterward, his right foot in a protective boot.

"I didn't feel like I could move around or really push off of it," he said.

Herbert went to the medical tent to be evaluated then spent the rest of the game on the bench

as the Chargers (2-1) saw their promising start under first-year head coach Jim Harbaugh take a hit.

"Not every game is going to be a fairytale ending," Harbaugh said.

Harbaugh declined to speculate whether Herbert will be available next week when Los Angeles hosts AFC West rival Kansas City, saying only the team will take the same "wait and see" approach it used after Herbert initially injured the ankle on Sept. 15 in Carolina.

84 million people murdered. And yet where were Joan Baez, Jane Fonda, Abby Hoffman and others most famous for their public virtue? Why were the streets and campuses not filled with righteous protesters?

There's a legal maxim that reads "who comes into [the court of] equity must have clean hands." There's an even older maxim from classical Greece:

"When will there be justice in Athens? There will be justice in Athens when those who are not injured are as outraged as those who are," said Thucydides.
