15th Career Pathway unveiled

To that end, the Garden Grove Unified School District on Wednesday took the wraps off its latest and 15th “Career Pathway” in an event at Rancho Alamitos High School.

Vodie’s To Come Down; Apts. Go Up?

Iconic sign on GG Boulevard could be fated for its end

One long-time Garden Grove landmark may soon be replaced with a brand-new one.

At next Thursday’s meeting of the planning commission, there will be a public hearing on a site plan and lot line adjustment for the construction of a seven-story, 98-unit multiple-family apartment complex on a 1.35-acre site on the north side of Garden Grove Boulevard between Galway Street and Brookhurst Way.

Long-time residents and anyone who regularly travels along Garden Grove Boulevard will recognize that as the site of the now-closed Vodie’s Brakes with its giant neon-lighted bear sign.

Opened in 1939, Vodie’s was a towering point of visual interest from the era of Franklin Roosevelt to the recent past. In addition to brake work, wheel alignment and other automotive repairs were done.

The new building will

combine two parcels and include 10 affordable housing units for “very-low income” residents.

The applicant is William Jager.

Also at that meeting will be a public hearing on a site plan, conditional use permit and other permissions to develop a six-story mixed-use development on a 0.94-acre lot consisting of an 80-unit senior

apartment complex and an 82-unit "residential care facility for the elderly."

It will include four affordable housing units for four "very low income" residents.

southeast corner of Stanford Avenue and 9th Street at 11432 and 11462 Stanford Ave.

The meeting will take place in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave. at 7 p.m.

Should short-term rentals be banned?

The Stanton Planning Commission will again take on the issue of whether short-term rentals of private homes should be legal within city limits.

At the September 18 meeting of the commission, the panel continued to the next meeting consideration of a zoning code amendment to prohibit short-term rentals throughout Stanton along with bed and breakfast establishments in residential and mixed-use overlay zones.

After the public hearing, the commission asked that staff return with a resolution recommending denial of the proposal. Arguments cited by members of the commission included denying residents from earning revenue

for themselves and operate small businesses and regulation of short-term rentals was better than prohibition.

However, city staff argue that residents have reported negative impacts to surrounding residents, including parking problems, noise and other “nuisance activity.”

Some neighboring cities – such as Anaheim and Garden Grove – have banned such businesses, not only because of reported nuisances but because they may attract customers from established commercial hotels, which provide substantial tax revenue to municipal coffers.

The meeting will take place in Stanton City Hall at 6:30 p.m.

Supervisor Do, missing in action, censured by Orange Co. board

Although the effect is largely symbolic, the Orange County Board of Supervisors voted 4-0 to censure outgoing First District Supervisor Andrew Do “for his failure to abide by the code of ethics and commitment to public service, and for the reckless judgment and favoritism he has demonstrated.”

Do, a former Garden Grove City Councilmember, was not present for Tuesday’s action. He has been missing from board meetings since Aug. 13.

The county is suing the Viet-America Association, alleging that money allocated for the relief of elderly Vietnamese residents was directed toward the private benefit of officers of the organization, buying houses and other items unrelated to the relief during the coronavirus epidemic.

That money was directed to VAS by Do.

He is not being sued.

His daughter, Rhiannon Do, worked for the organization, which was not disclosed at the time of the assignment of the funds to VAS. She is named in the lawsuit.

On Sept. 10, the board voted to remove him from all committee and board appointments.

Israeli jets attacked Hezbollah HQ

Netanyahu vows to keep up assault into Lebanon

The widening war between Israel and Hezbollah continued on Friday with the Israeli military claiming it destroyed the main headquarters of Hezbollah in Beirut, Lebanon.

Fighters attacked the target, which Israel claims was located below residential buildings, according to the Associated Press. Casualties are unknown.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu spoke to the United Nations General Assembly in New York promising that Israel would continue its offensive, then left the U.S. to return to his home country.

So far, an estimated 720 people

have been killed in the battle, mostly from Israeli air strikes. There is concern that Israel may inflict similar destruction in Lebanon as has been done in

Gaza.

The conflict started when Hezbollah began launching rockets into Israel in support of Hamas militants since the war broke out

on Oct. 7.

About 200,000 people have been rendered homeless in Lebanon because of the violence, says the AP.

U.S. Marshals rounded up over 3,400 fugitives in Operation North Star

“Operation North Star,” a wide-ranging operation by the U.S. Marshal Service, has arrested over 3,400 fugitives in the period from mid-May to mid-September.

According to United Press International, the U.S. Department of Justice reports that 3,421 people were apprehended, including 216 for homicide, 803 for assault and 482 for weapons offenses.

The crackdown took place in nine urban areas, mostly in the South and Southeast.

In the course of their work officers recovered firearms, cash and illegal drugs, including fentanyl.

Since North Star began in July of 2022, over 10,200 people have been taken into custody of whom 1,153 were homicide suspects.

In some cases, roads were blocked and helicopters had to be employed to pluck people from the roof of a hospital in Tennessee, according to The New York Times.

Evacuations have been ordered in an area near a stressed dam.

Electrical power was out for an estimated 4.2 million customers in the Southwest and Southeast.

‘Megalopolis’: Idealism with Excess

Coppola has fulfilled his dream, but ...

If anything is clear about “Megalopolis,” it’s that Francis Ford Coppola has a lot on his mind. The legendary filmmaker spent decades on this Roman-style epic, set in the present day, about a civilization on the brink of collapse.

A wealthy and powerful few of the old guard are running the gilded city of New Rome into the ground, a new generation is embroiled in a stalemate of a culture war between hedonists and puritans and a visionary architect caught in the middle is dreaming up a different future.

But none of that captures the wild experience of actually watching “Megalopolis,” a sprawling, operatic, clumsy and fascinating film that should inspire discussions for many years to come.

“Megalopolis” is not a disaster, but it’s far from a success. It’s a bacchanalia that’s bursting with so many ideas, so many characters, so many great lines and truly terrible ones as well that it’s nearly impossible to digest in a single, baffling viewing.

If there is a center to this story it’s Adam Driver’s Cesar Catilina, an artist who can stop time and who believes that a substance called Megalon, a shimmering people mover that can be used to make a translucent (but not naked) dress or reconstruct a face mangled by a gunshot, is the way to a utopia.

Driver is a great actor who is utterly misused here as a grief-stricken, alcoholic, “Hamlet”-quoting megalomaniac aristocrat who spends his days in an art deco ivory tower (the Chrysler Building) fretting about time and what the corrupt Mayor Frank-

lyn Cicero (Giancarlo Esposito) is doing to the city.

We’re supposed to believe that Cesar is a widely desired catch who would attract the mayor’s beautiful daughter Julia (Nathalie Emmanuel) to his side. But Kylo Ren had more charisma than Cesar. The story’s ability to sell Cesar as something special is not helped by Julia, more symbol than character despite plentiful screentime, whose leaden dialogue is not given any life or spark by Emmanuel.

Their Romeo-and-Juliet love story is labored, to say the least, despite some stunning shots that might suggest otherwise. It’s a problem with much of the conflicts and connections in the film, which all sound great on paper — they should, as much of it is drawn from juicy Roman history — but fumble in execution.

That’s not to say that all the actors wither under the excess. The great Talia Shire, as Cesar’s cold mother, does more than either Driver or Emmanuel, with just a handful of lines and scenes. Aubrey Plaza, too, seems to have understood exactly what “Megalopolis” needed from a character

named Wow Platinum, a social-climbing broadcast journalist who marries Jon Voight’s bank scion Hamilton Crassus III: a high dose of camp. She embraces the silliness of her dialogue, seeing the comedic potential in every ridiculous moment.

It’s hard to stress just how much there is stuffed into two hours and 18 minutes. Shia LaBeouf is Clodio Pulcher, the rich kid son of Crassus, who has Mae West eyebrows and long feral hair. He is in love with Julia, jealous of Cesar and may be having an incestuous relationship with his party girl socialite sister Clodia (Chloe Fineman).

He attempts his own political bid, preying on the city’s desperate peasant class. Laurence Fishburne is Cesar’s driver (and the narrator of the film). Dustin Hoffman is a fixer. Jason Schwartzman is around (and delightful, as always). There’s a pop star named Vesta Sweetwater (Grace VanderWaal) who has taken a virginity pledge. Even Romy Mars plays a teen reporter!

“Megalopolis” shines brightest with its crafts, including Milena Canonero’s decadent Roman-inspired frocks, Osvaldo Golijov’s sweeping, romantic score and Mihai Mălaimare Jr.’s golden

cinematography that makes the feast of the production design glow lovingly.

But this is a film that I can only in good conscience recommend fully to cinephiles, who were most certainly going to see it regardless.

It’s Coppola’s first in 13 years, after all, and one that he boldly and admirably self-financed. I hope that it’s the movie he wanted to make. For anyone else, it’s a tougher sell — not unworthy of someone’s time and money, but also not guaranteed to be especially rewarding or satisfying for anyone hoping that he’s made another “Godfather” (and who hasn’t watched “Twixt” or “Tetro”).

Coppola is an artist whose films sometimes take time to find their place in audiences’ hearts and minds. No one understands that as pointedly as he does. Whether or not there’s a drastic reappraisal somewhere down the line, “Megalopolis” will forever be a fascination.

“Megalopolis,” a Lionsgate release, is rated R by the MPA for “sexual content, nudity, drug use, language and violence.”

But then he recanted, somewhat. "I misspoke. I didn't mean it the way it came out, where I'm saying the organization isn't giving me big league players, it's players that have to grow into big league players."

C'mon, Ron. You're a straight shooter. The '24 Angels, finishing with their worst record ever and dead last in the weak AL West, are awful.

The "best" hitter is Nolan Schanuel at .250. The right fielder is hitting .207. The centerfielder is batting .219. The second baseman hit .170.

Truth be told, this is not a big league team in the original meaning of the word. It's more like an above average AAA team.

However, there is still virtue in patience. Wait 'til next year, as Brooklyn Dodger fans used to say. But if these not-ready-for-prime time players on the roster don't make a giant leap for Angel-kind, some will start wondering whether Ron Washington is still suited to managing a big-league team. Or this one.

Dodgers get 11th division title in 12 years with 7-2 win

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Will Smith hit a tying, two-run homer and the Los Angeles Dodgers scored three more runs in the seventh to beat the San Diego Padres 7-2 on Thursday night and clinch the NL West title.

The rally was dampened by an apparent injury to All-Star slugger Freddie Freeman, who left the game after awkwardly colliding with Luis Arráez and the first base bag trying to avoid being tagged for the second out of the inning. Freeman grabbed at his lower right leg before hobbling off the field.

The Dodgers (95-64) had not

clinched at home since the pandemic-shortened 2020 season, when cardboard cutouts replaced fans. The last time fans were on hand for a clincher at home was 2018.

"I couldn't be more proud of these guys," manager Dave Roberts said. "They fought and fought and fought and overcame adversity."

A sellout crowd of 52,433, including retired Dodgers star Manny Ramirez, packed Dodger Stadium for the finale of the crucial series between the top teams in the NL West. Both teams had already clinched postseason berths.

"Doing it in front of the home fans, beating those guys, winning a series, it's pretty sweet," Roberts said.

The Padres led 2-0 as Joe Musgrove pitched six shutout innings.

But the Dodgers got to him in

the seventh.

Musgrove gave up a leadoff walk to Max Muncy. Smith followed with a 426-foot blast to center, flipping his bat while tying the game at 2-2. It was the Dodgers' first home run of the three-game series.

Pinch-hitter Kiké Hernández singled and took second when Andy Pages reached on catcher's interference by Kyle Higashioka.

Shohei Ohtani singled and Hernández scored and Ohtani was safe at second on Fernando Tatis Jr.'s throwing error.

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Trojan star to face off vs. the LA Rams

CHICAGO (AP) — Caleb Williams was always in awe watching Calvin Johnson make those highlight-reel catches in triple coverage for the Detroit Lions. Over time, something else also stood out to him.

"I got a little older and kind of realized how good Matthew Stafford is at his job," Williams said.

Williams knows he can learn a few things from a quarterback such as Stafford, and he'll get an up-close look when the Chicago Bears host the Los Angeles Rams on Sunday in a game matching this year's No. 1 draft

pick against a two-time Pro Bowl selection with a Super Bowl ring.

Chicago (1-2) tries to get back to winning after losing two in a row, while the Rams hope to build on last week's thriller over San Francisco.

Coming off a 31-point loss at Arizona, Los Angeles (1-2) rallied from 14 down in the second half and trailing by 10 in the fourth quarter before squeezing out a 27-24 win.

The Bears, meanwhile, have not won since they beat Tennessee in the opener at Soldier Field. Their revamped offense has not performed the way they envisioned, though Williams at

least showed progress last week in a 21-16 loss at Indianapolis.

The former Heisman Trophy winner out of Southern California set a Bears rookie record with 363 yards passing and his first two touchdown throws.

Now, he'll go against a quarterback who has thrown for nearly 57,000 yards over 16 seasons with Detroit and Los Angeles. Stafford's resume includes a Super Bowl championship in 2021, his first season in Los Angeles.

"I think there's a lot of respect for the toughness, the competitiveness of Matthew (and) the ability to always stay in the fight," Rams coach Sean McVay said.

Some of the different things in terms of how he's beating you with his ability to be able to manipulate coverage through his eyes, understanding how to try to move defenders that are visual on him to open up and expand windows, you heard (Houston's

C.J. Stroud talk about that as well.

"I just think it's the mastery of some of the finer things about the position that those who play it really appreciate and understand."

Williams certainly notices.

"He controls the game as a quarterback," he said. "He knows how to get in and out of things efficiently. He knows

where people are going to be. He knows where the defensive players are going to be, so he can move them on a string."

The Bears could take some of the load off Williams by getting their run game going.

Chicago had 63 yards on 28 carries against Indianapolis. That's down from 71 at Houston the previous week and 84 against Tennessee in Week 1.

Chicago is averaging 72.7 yards rushing, second-lowest in the NFL, after finishing second a year ago. Their leading rusher against the Colts was Roschon Johnson, with 30 yards after missing the first two games with an injury.

D'Andre Swift, signed to a three-year deal, has just 68 yards and is averaging 1.8 per attempt in his first season in Chicago.

The Rams are feeling good about their offense after an upset victory over San Francisco without their top two receivers, Cooper Kupp and Puka Nacua.

Stafford completed only 16 passes against the Niners, and no receiver had more catches than Tutu Atwell's four.
