# Surf City Not A Sanctuary City by 7-0

Lines up with Trump's policies

One day after President Donald Trump staked out a hard line on immigration, the Huntington Beach City Council took its own action on undocumented workers.

On Tuesday night the council voted to declare Surf City a "non-sanctuary city" which would cooperate with federal immigration officials.

"I am pleased the city council unanimously supported my initiative," said

Mayor Pat Burns. "This will be another effective tool to combat crime and it will be a sign to would-be criminals, do not come to Huntington Beach." The intent of the resolution is to also "encourage" other cities to adopt similar resolutions.

Typically, cooperation with federal immigration officials means police holding suspects believed to be illegal aliens would be transferred to the custody of Immigration and Customs Enforcement

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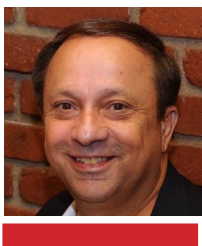

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## Hong Alyce Van charged with election offense

A former Stanton City Councilmember has been charged with multiple felonies for allegedly forging nomination paperwork to run for re-election for a City Council seat in a district in which she did not live and illegally voting in the Nov. 5, 2024, general election.

Hong Alyce Van, 40, of Anaheim, has been charged with one felony count of perjury, one felony count of offering a false or forged document to be filed, registered, or recorded, one felony count of filing false nomination papers, and one felony account of not being entitled to vote at an election.

Van is scheduled to be arraigned on Jan. 29, 2025, at the Stephen K. Tamura Justice Center in Westminster in Department W12. She faces a maximum sentence of six years in state prison if convicted on all counts.

Van was elected in November 2020 to represent Stanton's City Council District #2, but less than a year after her election Van is accused of purchasing a home in Stanton City Council District #4 with her husband and son.

Despite no longer living in her district, Van did not resign as required by law – according to the district attorney – and continued to serve as the District #2 City Councilmember. Van did not sell her home in District #2, which was located next to the home where her parents live and allowed other family members to live in her former home.

## Trump Gets ‘Citizenship’ Pushback

States, cities will go to court to fight executive order

President Donald Trump’s bold vision for a changed America which he outlined in a speech Monday after his inaugural address has received some immediate challenges.

His vow to move to overturn “birthright citizenship” for the children of illegal aliens produced an instant angry response from states and cities.

According to the Associated Press, attorneys general from 22 states and two cities have announced plans to challenge in court Trump’s plan, which appears to run counter to the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, which grants automatic American citizenship to all persons born in the U.S.

The pardon of over 1,000 peo-

denouncement from many in law enforcement, including some of those injured in the attack.

## Worst of LA fire danger is believed to have past

Firefighters, with some help from Mother Nature, are getting the upper hand on the fires that ravaged large areas of Los Angeles County.

The Los Angeles Times is reporting that the Palisades fire was 65 percent contained by Tuesday afternoon, having burned over 23,700 acres.

At least 6,380 structures were destroyed and 857 damaged and

11 people dead.

The Eaton fire was 89 percent contained after burning 14,000 acres, destroyed 9,418 buildings and damaging 1,071 more. At least 17 deaths have been confirmed.

Evacuation orders have been lifted in some areas, and the slowing of winds has helped firefighters in their efforts.

## Diaz and Foxx are 'Back in Action'

But glam spies turned into two dorky parents

But, we do Wordle!!

Er, OK. That's how former secret agent Matt (Jamie Foxx) explains that he and wife Emily are now living a boring, mundane, glamour-free life and nobody would ever be looking for them. To which the rest of us Wordle players say: Whoa, speak for yourself, Matt! Lots of us play Wordle and we don't think WE'RE boring or mundane.

Anyway! More to the point is that Matt's explanation obviously doesn't work, because within a moment he and Emily are, yes, "Back in Action." It's not only the title of director Seth Gordon's film, but the story of Foxx's co-star, Cameron Diaz. Back in movies after more than a decade, Diaz retains her easy charm and has chemistry with Foxx.

But this doesn't mean their lines are funny or logical. Often, they are neither.

We start 15 years ago, in a pre-credits sequence featuring our ultra-cool co-spies (also lovers). Their job is to pose as French arms dealers visiting the home of a shadowy Russian terrorist — then break into a safe and steal a key to the entire world's infrastructure or something.

On the private jet headed back home, Emily reveals a secret we already knew: her home pregnancy test was positive. Actually, all six of them were.

Matt says he's all in. They break out the champagne (well, for him.) And then all heck breaks loose and they end up needing to kill a bunch of people and parachute into the snowy mountains.

It's indeed funny when Matt observes: "We can't keep doing

this, especially with that baby on the way."

Flash forward 15 years, and the couple, having gone underground, live in a comfy suburban house with two lovely (and barely annoying) teenagers. Matt coaches the soccer team. The teens, Alice and Leo (McKenna Roberts and Rylan Jackson, both appealing), are not aware of their parents' high-flying past; Matt and Emily want their lives to be normal.

Director Gordon, who co-wrote the script with Brendan O'Brien, has said he was aiming to explore what might happen when spies become parents. (This was brilliantly addressed in "The Americans" on FX, but that was a whole different thing.)

Now, without knowing too many spy couples, or any, I'm pretty sure what happens is NOT that the parents become SO uncool SO fast that they buy binoculars on Amazon to spy on their daughter's social life from the car at school dropoff. Guys, at

least hide so she doesn't see you. Did CIA training teach you nothing?

Equally unartful is the way they explain their past to their kids. We join this conversation as the kids wonder why Dad was speaking Russian to the AC guy. The parents explain they picked it up during their time in the Peace Corps. But they don't even have their story straight: Were they in Colombia, Belize, or Russia? Again, they had 15 years to get this straight.

All is peaceful in suburbia, sort of, except Emily is having trouble connecting with daughter Alice (could this be because she spies on her?) She's also getting bored, and wonders if she and Matt can briefly skip down to South America and stop a coup somewhere — or, heck, start a coup! Either way! And then the doorbell rings with a long-lost contact, and Matt and Emily claim Wordle and Etsy, but soon they're dragged back in, and the whole fam is on the run.

You also should know that Emily has both a past with a jealous MI6 agent (Andrew Scott) and a complicated relationship with

her mother (Glenn Close, game for broad comedy), who lives on a huge estate in England, was also a spy, and has enthusiastic but terrible taste in men.

The action comes fast and furious, and the banter is pleasant enough. Diaz, especially, makes the proceedings decently enjoyable and some of the sillier lines believable.

It all leads to some predictable questions: Will Emily and her estranged mother find some common ground? Will the kids come to understand their parents? Will Emily and Alice forge a truce? Will a good time be had and lessons learned on the family adventure?

Also, what's Matt's Wordle streak?

"Back in Action," a Netflix release, has been rated PG-13 by the Motion Picture Association "for sequences of violence and action, some suggestive references and strong language, and brief teen partying." Running time: 114 minutes.

## Bad weather worked against them

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Kyren Williams made a cut in the snow, then the Rams’ 1,200-yard rusher had the football pop loose on a clear — well, clear-ish — slick path snow-blown clean of a wintry mix.

The ball rolled free, recovered and returned by the Eagles, ending one drive for Los Angeles.

Matthew Stafford dropped back on the next series, tried to get rid of the football, but was stripped and the Eagles pounced on another fumble.

The Eagles kicked two field goals in the fourth quarter off

two game-changing fumbles — Los Angeles turnovers that might not have happened under clear skies at SoFi Stadium.

In the snow and cold, the Rams coughed up late scoring chances and lost 28-22 Sunday to the Eagles, falling one game short of hosting the NFC championship game.

“We had two turnovers that don’t necessarily occur in different elements,” Rams coach Sean McVay said.

From a 1-4 start to NFC West champions, the Rams navigated a short week following a playoff win over Minnesota and kept the game close until the final possession.

Even with the frosty fumbles, the Rams — who toughed out the last two weeks as wildfires have devastated large portions of Southern California — still

had an upset in sight.

Stafford, who threw for 324 yards with sore ribs, kept the Rams in it with a 4-yard TD pass to Colby Parkinson that made it 28-22. The Rams got the ball back with two minutes left and Stafford completed consecutive passes of 11 and 37 yards to move the ball into Eagles territory.

Stafford, who has thrown multiple touchdown passes in each of his first seven playoff games with the Rams, was sacked by Jalen Carter on third down and threw an incomplete pass on fourth down to end the threat.

"I felt like we had total control toward the latter part of that game," McVay said. "The momentum was in our favor and we had an opportunity to be able to

win that game and we just came up short."

Cooper Kupp had a surprisingly small role again, catching only five passes for 61 yards. Only six days after he spit up blood in the playoff win over Minnesota and was taken to the hospital with a chest injury, Tyler Higbee returned to catch a 4-yard touchdown pass that tied it at 7 in the first quarter.

Williams rushed for 106 yards — so many more potentially lost because of his fumble.

"It felt like as an offense, we had them on the ropes, and that they probably felt it, too," Stafford said. "We were moving the rock really well the last two drives, and then just a couple of unforced errors here and there and got behind the sticks."



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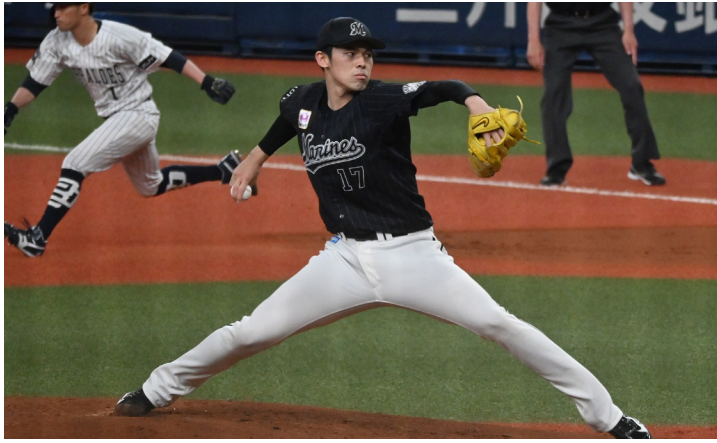

# Roki Sasaki added to Dodger all-star lineup

The courting of young Japanese flamethrower Roki Sasaki was one of the few instances that all 30 Major League Baseball teams were on equal footing for prized talent. A time when some of the lower-spending teams had a chance to pick up a promising player and add a little parity to a sport that ...

Hahahahaha — just kidding. He's signing with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The 23-year-old right-hander, who has a fastball that tops 100 mph, joins the defending World Series champions in a move that felt inevitable. The San Diego Padres and Toronto Blue Jays were the other finalists, but as expected, he's joining Japanese stars Shohei Ohtani and Yoshinobu Yamamoto in L.A.

The Dodgers didn't even need to dip into their deep pockets to entice Sasaki to make his baseball home at Chavez Ravine.

Because he's under 25 and does not have six years of service time in Japan, Sasaki is considered an international amateur by MLB's rules and was limited to

a minor league contract with a limited signing bonus.

Los Angeles had just north of \$5 million in its 2025 bonus pool to offer Sasaki when he revealed his decision, though the team's front office is making moves that will likely open up a little more money. The other 29 teams had roughly the same amount of cash — or more — to offer.

A fatter wallet wasn't the issue: Sasaki simply wanted to be a Dodger.

"At my news conference for joining the club, I hope to wear my Dodgers uniform, feeling gratitude for all those who have supported me," Sasaki wrote in Japanese on Instagram.

And really, who could blame him?

The Dodgers look like a team set up for success for the foreseeable future, with a lineup that includes Mookie Betts, Freddie Freeman, Teoscar Hernández and two-way star Ohtani. Sasaki could join a starting rotation that includes Ohtani, Yamamoto, two-time Cy Young award winner Blake Snell, Tyler Glasnow and Tony Gonsolin.

The presence of Ohtani and Yamamoto was undoubtedly a big selling point. But there are other reasons why Southern California is arguably baseball's premier destination, even topping the Big Apple.

The Dodgers drew nearly 50,000 fans per game last season, highest in the league. Away from home, they're an in-demand traveling show, sometimes drawing cheers that make it easy to forget they're the ones wearing road uniforms.

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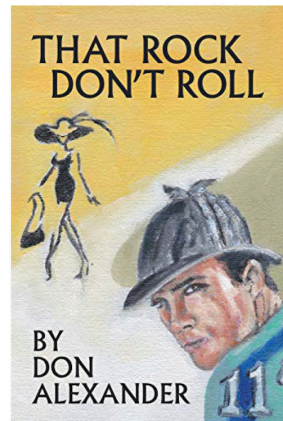

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# Betts led no. 1 Bruins past no. 25 Baylor

UCLA star had 24 points; team vs. Rutgers next

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Lauren Betts had 24 points, nine rebounds and a school-record nine blocks to help No. 1 UCLA beat 25th-ranked Baylor 72-57 on Monday in the inaugural Coretta Scott King Classic.

The doubleheader that also featured No. 7 Texas and eighth-ranked Maryland was created to honor King's legacy and celebrate female empowerment in sports. It's the first time the names of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and Coretta Scott King have been licensed for a sporting event.

UCLA (18-0) jumped all over Baylor to build an early double-digit lead. The Bears (16-4), who saw their five-game winning streak end, got within five a few

times, but each time Betts and the Bruins answered.

The Bruins had a 41-36 lead midway through the third quarter before scoring six straight to restore a double-digit advantage. Baylor didn't get within single digits the rest of the way. Yaya Felder scored 10 points to lead the Bears.

UCLA scored 17 of the game's

first 19 points to build a double-digit cushion.

Betts broke the school record for blocks she held with Corinne Costa of seven. Betts reached that mark in her last game against Penn State last week. Costa did it four times from 2011-14.

UCLA: The Bruins remained one of two unbeaten teams in

Division I women's basketball, along with No. 5 LSU. UCLA will remain on the East Coast for the week to face Rutgers and then Maryland.

Baylor: The Bears entered the Top 25 this week for the first time since early in the season. They probably will need a win on Sunday against No. 9 TCU to stay ranked.
