

Seek Suspects in 'Targeted' Shooting Case

Gunman fired into car with 2 adults and infant

Two suspects are at large in a "targeted" shooting incident in Westminster in which a victim suffered two gunshot wounds.

According to Commander Andy Stowers of the WPD, the incident took place on Wednesday around 9:30 p.m. in the area of Gold-west Street and Trask Avenue.

Officers were dispatched there in regard to a report of a shooting.

When they arrived, they learned that an "unknown" male, standing on a street corner, fired several

rounds of gunfire into a vehicle occupied by a vehicle with two adults and their 8-month-old infant.

The driver was stuck and sustained what are termed "non-life-threatening" gunshot wounds. The female passenger and child were not hit.

Investigators believe the attack was planned ahead of time and the victim was "targeted" for unknown reasons.

The suspects – shooter and a driver – left the scene in a black sedan.

'Gone Girl' drama had a link to Hunt. Beach

SANTA CLARA (AP) — A man who kidnapped and sexually assaulted a Northern California woman in what became widely known as the "Gone Girl" kidnapping has been charged with two 15-year-old home invasion sexual assaults, prosecutors announced Monday.

Prosecutors allege Matthew Muller, 47, broke into a woman's home in Mountain View, California, in September 2009, attacked her, tied her up and made her drink medications. He then told the woman in her 30s that he was going to rape her, but she convinced him not to, prosecutors said. Muller left after recommending the woman get a dog.

The following month, prosecutors say he broke into a home in Palo Alto, California, bound and gagged a woman and forced her to drink Nyquil. He started assaulting the woman in her 30s, but she also convinced him to

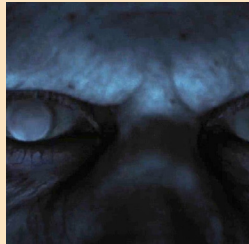

One of my favorite old sci-fi stories by Robert Heinlein had the title of “Solution Unsatisfactory.”

With the change in administrations coming in a little more than a week, there’s a lot of speculation about just what that will mean. The most likely event is – aside

from a fistful of executive actions to undo what Joe Biden did (which he did to undo what Mr. Trump did in his first term,

which were done to undo that Mr. Obama did in his second term ...) —is action on immigration.

I’m not going to get into the rights and wrongs of promised actions, even some deportations. There are good arguments on all sides of this challenge but I’ll be darned (Jim, language!) if I can figure out what the solution is.

In fact, I don’t think there is any solution, in the traditional meaning of the word.

I’m all for a secure border. You don’t have to be a hard-line MAGA guy to see the problems of a lot of people streaming across the border illegally.

stop, prosecutors said.

Muller has been charged with two felony counts of committing a sexual assault during a home invasion. The charges carry a possible sentence of life in prison. He is currently serving a 40-year prison term for the 2015 kidnapping.

Muller’s lawyer, public defender Agustin Arias, said they have no comment about the new charges.

The new charges came after testing evidence based on a “new lead,” according to prosecutors. District attorney criminalists found Muller’s DNA on straps he used to bind one of the victims, officials said.

Muller, a disbarred, Harvard-educated attorney, pleaded guilty to the 2015 kidnapping of Denise Huskins, whose father lived in Huntington Beach. He was also sentenced in 2022 to 31 years in state prison after pleading no contest to two counts of forcible rape of Huskins.

Huskins was abducted by a masked intruder who broke into her boyfriend’s home in Vallejo. Her boyfriend, Aaron Quinn, told detectives that intruders had drugged, blindfolded and tied both of them up before kidnapping Huskins in the middle of the night. Quinn also said the kidnapers were demanding an \$8,500 ransom..

Huskins, who was 29 at the time, turned up unharmed two days later outside her father’s apartment in Huntington Beach where she said she was dropped off. She reappeared just hours before the ransom was due.

After Huskins’ release, Vallejo police erroneously likened her kidnapping to the book and movie “Gone Girl,” in which a woman goes missing and then lies about being kidnapped when she reappears.

Investigators dropped that theory after Muller was arrested by police in Dublin, California, for a similar home invasion.

Mike Johnson is Speaker, Again

Re-elected by a narrow 218-215 margin in House

It wasn't easy, but it was close. Mike Johnson won another term as Speaker of the House on Friday, turning back a challenge from "hardline" Republicans.

The vote in the closely-divided House of Representatives was 218-215, according to the Associated Press. Johnson had to "flip" two votes to get the victory.

All the Democrats voted for Hakeem Jeffries, the House minority leader.

Johnson's efforts to retain the gavel were assisted by President-elect Donald Trump, who

gave his endorsement. The dissenting Republicans were concerned about the inability

of previous Republican majorities to cut taxes and trim the federal budget.

Trump's conviction is upheld, but jail unlikely, NYC trial judge indicates

The conviction last year of Donald Trump for offenses connected to a "hush money" scandal was upheld Friday by the same judge that presided over his trial.

The New York Times reports that State Supreme Court judge Juan M. Merchan upheld the jury's decision on 34 felony counts last May, but indicated that any penalties would be light or non-existent.

Sentencing is scheduled for Jan. 10 – the president-elect must appear in person – but Merchan indicated he would prefer an "unconditional release" for Trump. That would affirm his status as a convicted felon, but not require jail time, a fine or restitution.

Trump still can appeal his conviction to a higher court.

The jury found Trump guilty of a variety of charges including falsifying business records to conceal the payment to a pornographic actress with whom he allegedly had sexual relations.

Alcohol use tied to cancer, warning labels are recommended

There's a connection between consumption of alcohol and cancer, and the risk should be included on the labels of alcohol.

That's what U.S. Surgeon General Vivek Murthy proposed in an advisory on Friday.

The Associated Press reports that Murthy contends that there's mounting research and evidence that consumption of alcohol – beer, wine and liquor – contributed to almost one million preventable cancers cases in the United States over the last 10 years.

He's advocating for a label on bottles and cans that indicates that consuming alcohol increases

'Nosferatu' Not a Cute Vampire

This winter, a film to chill you to the bone

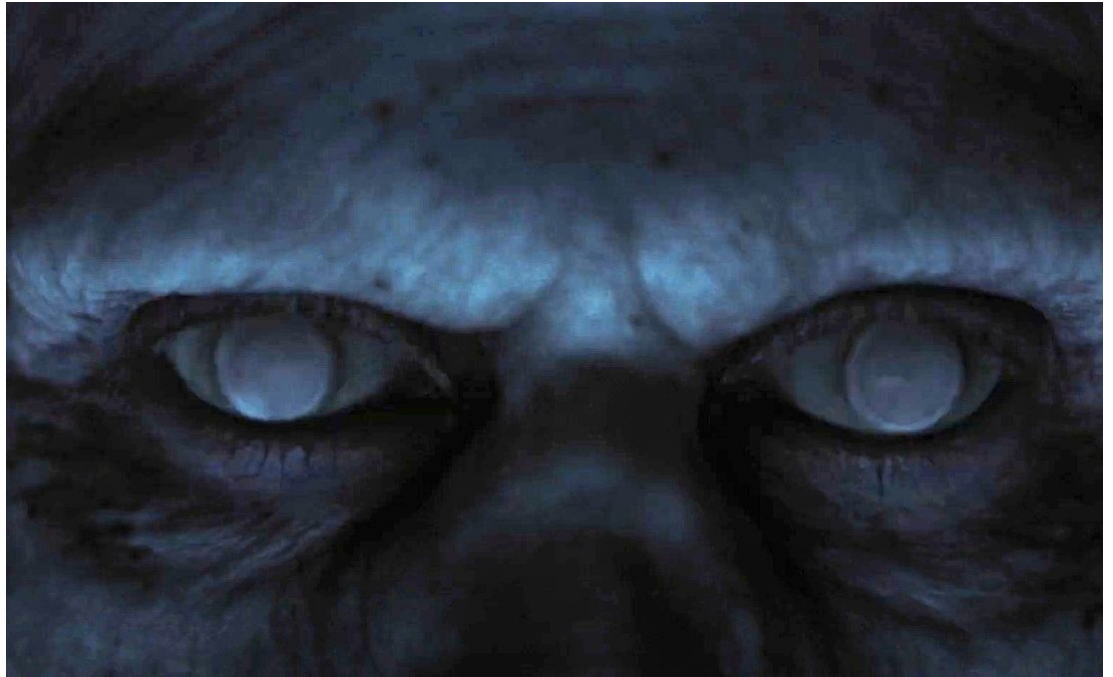
Oh, the weather outside is frightful. But don't head to the multiplex to stay warm. Not if you're seeing "Nosferatu," anyway. Bring your hand warmers, toe warmers, heart warmers and soul warmers — this update of the 1922 silent vampire classic will chill you to the bone.

But it may not terrify you. Everything in Robert Eggers' faithful, even adoring remake, from his picturesque 19th century German town to those bleak mountain snowscapes leading to that (brrr) imposing castle in Transylvania, looks great. But with its stylized, often stilted dialogue and overly dramatic storytelling, it feels more like everyone is living in a quaint period painting rather than a world populated by real humans (and, well, vampires) made of flesh and, er, blood.

Eggers, who writes and directs here, has described being haunted since youth with F.W. Murnau's 1922 "Nosferatu," starring Max Schreck (which borrowed so much from Bram Stoker's 1897 novel "Dracula" that the author's estate sued for copyright infringement). Eggers has said he wanted to present a true vampire, meaning the original folk variety — the horrifying, ugly, venal sort. Not the seduce-you-in-a-dinner-jacket kind.

And certainly not the "veggie vampire" who drinks only animal blood (think "Twilight"). No, Eggers' vampire, Count Orlok, wants only human blood — preferably from a lovely damsel.

The damsel here would be young wife Ellen (Lily-Rose Depp), the focus of Orlok's obsessive desires. In a nod to changing times, Eggers brings the character to

the forefront and suggests that in 19th century society, she was unfairly seen as "hysterical" when actually, she was, you know, possessed. The lovely Depp fully commits to the high drama — but we don't learn much about what's in her head. Like everything here, it's a stylized performance that feels like a piece of art but keeps us at a distance.

After a prologue in which Ellen's spiritual connection to Orlok is established, we begin our story in fictional Wisborg, on the Baltic coast. Ellen has just been married to handsome, fresh-faced Thomas Hutter (Nicholas Hoult, giving his all), who aims to gain employment with a real estate firm.

But first, Thomas is told by the shady-looking boss, he must undertake an out-of-town assignment, traveling into the Carpathian mountains to obtain the signature of a shadowy client on the deed for a local fixer-upper.

And he sets off, to the protesta-

tions of Ellen, who has been having some truly terrible dreams.

Note to self: When accepting job assignments, maybe think twice if your boss is sending you, solo, deep into wintry Transylvania? But if Thomas had used his noggin and sat home by the fire with his bride, we would have no movie.

Waiting for Thomas in the dark, lonely castle — the exteriors of which were actually filmed in Transylvania — is Orlok himself (Bill Skarsgård, truly unrecognizable in heavy, ugly makeup).

They get down to business, but Thomas unfortunately cuts his finger, and his blood awakens a thirst in Orlok. Thomas soon realizes he's in a very bad place and needs to get back to his wife forthwith.

Back in Wisborg, Ellen is staying with the couple's friends, the Hardings (Aaron Taylor-Johnson and Emma Corrin, not given much to work with), and suffering from seizures and spells. Orlok is calling to her, staking his claim. The friends are trying to

help, and when traditional medicine fails they turn to a specialist in the occult — and a gift to the rest of us, because he's played by Willem Dafoe.

Dafoe's naturally witty presence gives us a sense of relief from the stylized dialogue as the movie travels to its inevitable conclusion, and surely what true horror fans are waiting for: Orlok's climactic confrontation with Ellen.

For such fans, the frightening tableau of a skeletal Orlok lying atop a drained Ellen will be satisfying enough to make the experience worthwhile. The rest of us might leave with the same feeling we had in the beginning: a deep but distant chill.

"Nosferatu," a Focus Features release, has been rated R by the Motion Picture Association "for bloody violent content, graphic nudity and some sexual content." Running time: 133 minutes.

What does it mean to be 'well-coached'?

Like a lot of other Americans — and some Canadians, I suspect — I am binge-watching football. Between the college playoffs and the closing games of the NFL season, I'm absorbing enough radiation and cliches to last a lifetime.

Speaking of cliches, one that I keep hearing over and over again involves play-by-play and color commentators saying that a team is "well-coached."

Hmmm. I guess it's good for a team to be well-coached. It's hard to feel good about a team that's badly-coached, especially if it's got a bad (i.e., losing) record.

But what exactly constitutes "good" coaching aside from the win-loss record? How can I — who was not at all the practices and what used to be called "chalk talk" sessions — gauge whether a team is well-coached?

Here's what I look for.

Dumb penalties: Teams that shoot themselves in the foot are generally not well-coached, although there are some exceptions. But when a team gets tagged with four, five six offsides or encroachment penalties, somebody's not successfully emphasizing the little stuff.

Emotional outbursts: I'm not talking about the usual yelling and carrying on that almost all coaches participate in at one time or another. But when a 50-year-old man — in front of fans, friends and family — berates a 15-year-old kid for making a simple mistake, that coach has placed his priorities in the wrong end zone (i.e.

Jimmy G Gets His Chance

Stafford will sit when Rams play Seahawks

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jimmy Garoppolo will take his first snaps for the Rams when he starts in place of Matthew Stafford in playoff-bound Los Angeles' regular-season finale against Seattle on Sunday.

Coach Sean McVay announced the decision Wednesday to rest Stafford, the 16-year veteran starter. The Rams haven't decided which additional starters will rest.

Los Angeles (10-6) has clinched the NFC West title over the Seahawks (9-7) based on strength of schedule. The Rams are currently the third seed in the NFC playoff bracket, but they will fall to fourth if they lose to Seattle and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (9-7) beat Atlanta to win the South division.

The wild-card seeding is still in flux among Minnesota, Washington and Green Bay, so Mc-

Vay clearly doesn't care whether the Rams enter the postseason as the third or fourth seed.

Garoppolo has yet to play for the Rams since signing to be Stafford's backup last spring. The 33-year-old veteran who led San Francisco to Super Bowl 54, missed the first two games of his first season in Los Angeles under suspension for violating the league's performance-enhancing drug policy.

Stafford has taken every snap this season for the Rams, who have won nine of 11 to surge into the postseason for the third time in his four years with Los

'Business as usual' for the Chargers in seed chase

EL SEGUNDO (AP) — The Los Angeles Chargers could have their AFC playoff seeding locked in before going to bed Saturday night in Las Vegas.

When it comes to Jim Harbaugh's plans for playing or resting his starters, he is keeping things close to the vest as usual.

"We're taking it one day at a time. As (safety) Derwin (James) said, 11 wins sounds better than 10," Harbaugh said on Monday.

The Chargers (10-6) could have a chance at moving up to the

fifth seed and a trip to Houston for the wild-card round if Cincinnati beats Pittsburgh on Saturday night.

If the Steelers win, the Bolts are locked into the sixth seed and a trip to the AFC North champion. That would be Baltimore — and a possible Harbaugh Bowl rematch — if the Ravens beat the Browns on Saturday afternoon. Baltimore opened as a 17 1/2 point favorite against Cleveland according to BetMGM Sportsbook.

Harbaugh and the Chargers though will be hoping for a Ben-

gals victory to make Sunday's regular-season finale against the Raiders meaningful.

"We're playing to move up," Harbaugh said. "We'd love to be in the fifth seed. That gives you a chance to have a playoff game at home, even in the divisional round. That's where things stand for us, the plan for us is to win. That's been the mindset from the beginning."

Even though the San Francisco 49ers had a playoff berth wrapped up going into the final week of the regular season in 2011, '12 and '13, when Harbaugh was the coach, there was still something to play for.

The Niners needed a win in 2011 to secure a first-round bye. In 2012, they needed a victory over Arizona to wrap up the NFC West.

A year later, it was a win over the Cardinals to keep their division title hopes alive.

Chargers fans still have bad memories from two years ago

when then-coach Brandon Staley played his starters in the finale at Denver even though they were locked into the fifth seed.

Wide receiver Mike Williams

suffered a fracture in his back late in the first half of a 31-28 loss to the Broncos.

Williams wasn't available for the first-round game at Jackson-

ville, which the Chargers lost 31-30 after blowing a 27-point lead.

Harbaugh though did play the reserves, including quarterback Taylor Heinicke, for most of the fourth quarter of last Saturday's 40-7 victory at New England.

Harbaugh didn't answer if Heinicke would get additional snaps this week with an increased possibility of him seeing action.

One player who won't be available is safety Elijah Molden, who suffered a broken fibula during the second half of the Patriots game.

Molden, acquired from Tennessee on Aug. 29, started three games and was second on the team with three interceptions.

Harbaugh said it is possible Alohi Gilman, who is on injured reserve, could have his return to play window begin this week. Gilman has started 10 games but missed the past five because of a hamstring injury.

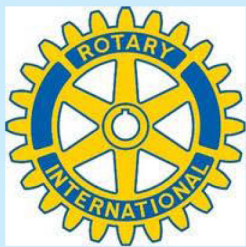
Angeles.

His 3,762 yards passing and 20 touchdown passes are his fewest in a season in which he played at least 15 games, but Stafford's eight interceptions are also his fewest in a nearly-full season, while his completion rate (65.8 percent) is above his career average.

Stafford improved to 13-1 as a starter in Rams games played in December when Los Angeles held off Arizona 13-9 last Saturday, but his offense has been in a slump.

The Rams have scored more than 21 points just once during their current five-game winning streak, and they've managed just three touchdowns in their past three games combined.

The third-string quarterback is Stetson Bennett. The two-time national championship winner at Georgia and fourth-round draft pick in 2023 also has yet to play for the Rams, missing all of last season while away from the team for undisclosed personal reasons.

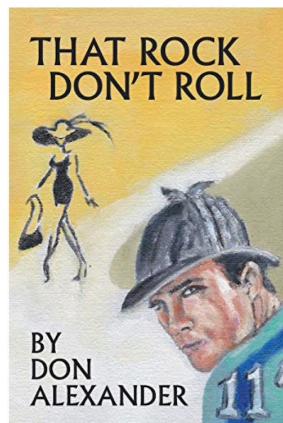
