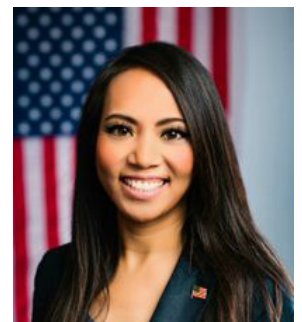

Amy West Charged With Att. Bribery

Amy Phan West, a controversial member of the Westminster City Council, is in more legal trouble.

West, elected to the council in 2022, is being sued by the city for disrupting council meetings, and now is facing a misdemeanor bribery charge over an illegally-parked Jeep.

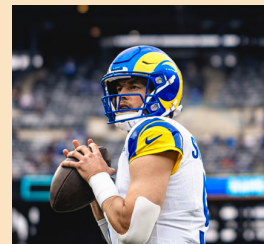
According to the Orange County District Attorney's office, West will be arraigned on Feb. 24 at the Stephen K. Tamura Justice Center in Westminster.

The OCDA's office alleges that her car rental

business located in the area of Dorothy Street and Melanie Lane was reported to have "dirty, unregistered, or abandoned vehicles" there.

The council will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Civic Center at 7800 Katella Ave.(located west of Beach Boulevard).

They requested a tow truck to remove the Jeep when she allegedly identified herself, told the parking officers not to tow the Jeep – she would “move it herself,” she said .

She then allegedly spoke of her friendship with the Westminster police chief and that she was in the process of “getting raises for police department personnel.”

The tow truck was cancelled and the Jeep left at the site.

Phan West denies the accusations, according to published reports.

“The law applies equally to everyone, including elected officials. Holding elective office does not entitle anyone to a separate set of rules and any attempt to engage in corruption, bribery, or any other crime under the shroud of elective office will be thoroughly investigated and any and all crimes that have been committed will be prosecuted by my office to the fullest extent of the law,” said Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer in a statement.

Goose, Goose, Duck Dept.:

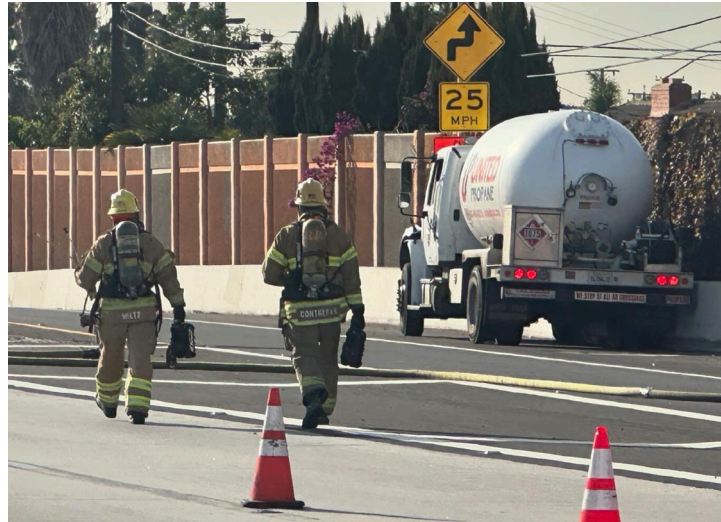

Suspect held in 8 robberies across GG and Orange County

Garden Grove police believe they may have solved a string of armed robberies recently occurring in and around the city.

According to Sgt. Nick Jensen of the GGPD, David Zamarripa, 52, of Garden Grove has been arrested in connection with multiple robberies having occurred from Jan. 2 to 18.

Over a two-week period, detectives investigating such robberies noticed "similar circumstances" and cross-referenced five of them in an effort to identify a single suspect.

With information from witnesses, surveillance and help from other law enforcement agencies, GGPD detectives learned about three similar incidents in Orange County, making a total of eight robberies.

Detectives tracked the suspect and detained him as he attempted to leave a motel in Garden Grove. He was arrested and booked into Orange County Jail in Santa Ana.

Trump, Newsom to 'Work Together'

Governor and the president have a cordial encounter

President Donald Trump and California Gov. Gavin Newsom met on Friday in Los Angeles and conducted a cordial encounter which seemed a departure from their past acrimony.

The New York Times is reporting that the governor and president spoke amicably about the need to provide aid to the fire-afflicted areas of Pacific Palisades and Altadena.

"They are going to need a lot of federal help," said Trump. "Unless they don't need any?"

Newsom responded, "We need

your help," adding "I have all the confidence in the world that we will work together."

Before their meeting, Trump had suggested that federal aid was contingent on California

changing its policies on issues like voter ID or water management.

On a narrow 51-50 vote, Hegseth is defense sc'y

Pete Hegseth, President Donald Trump's pick for secretary of defense, was confirmed Friday by the Senate in a dramatic late-night vote.

According to the Associated Press, the vote was 51-50 as Vice President J.D. Vance was present to cast a tie-breaking vote.

Hegseth's nomination was controversial not only for views on military policy – he's opposed to women assigned to combat duty – but because of allegations of sexual infidelity.

Sen. Mitch McConnell of Kentucky was one of three Republi-

U.S. foreign aid suspended for a three-month 'study'

With the exception of Egypt and Israel, all foreign aid from the United States has temporarily been suspended, according to United Press International.

A cable authored by Secretary of State Marco Rubio and sent to diplomats around the world announced "all new obligations and disbursement" to countries and non-governmental organizations and contractors was suspended for 90 days "pending review."

Any exceptions to the hiatus



would have to be approved by Rubio.

Affected will be Ukraine, which will receive no more financial help from the U.S. for the next three months as it fights Russian invaders.

Dictatorship Tears a Family Apart

‘I’m Still Here’ tells of life and death in Brazil

It’s easy to fall in love with the Paiva family. Filmmaker Walter Salles makes sure of that in “I’m Still Here.”

He drops the audience into the warm everyday of the beautiful home of Eunice (Fernanda Torres) and Rubens Paiva (Selton Mello), in 1970s Rio de Janeiro, where their five kids run freely between the beach and their living room.

Life is calmly chaotic, full of affection, gentle familial teasing and various life stages (one is about to lose a tooth, another about to go to university). Someone always seems to have wet hair, be covered in sand, or bringing in a mangy stray, as their youngest, Marcelo, does in the film’s lovely opening.

Even if their life is technically worlds away from any one person in the audience, it feels familiar and close.

Anyone coming to “I’m Still Here” will surely know that this domestic tranquility does not and cannot hold. It was about seven years into Brazil’s military dictatorship, which would last until 1985.

And while the film suggests that there was a semblance of normalcy in their day to day, there are also ominous signs of change and oppression — reports of ambassadors being kidnapped on the news, and tense “random” traffic stops that their eldest daughter endures one night. Some left-leaning citizens are making plans to leave, but the Paiva family is not in a terrible rush. They’re even making plans to build a new home.

So when three men in civilian clothes enter their home one

afternoon and tell Rubens, a former left-leaning congressman, that he needs to come in for questioning, it happens with little incident.

Everyone is on guard — they’re not naive — but you sense that Eunice believes he will come back that night. Maybe even the next day. Rubens is calm changing into a collared shirt and tie and lying to his daughter that he is going into the office, even though it’s a holiday. But he also savors this moment with her, perhaps because he knows he’s likely to not return.

The film is based on a memoir written by Paiva’s son, Marcelo, but you don’t need to know that to know that it is first and foremost a memory piece.

It is deeply personal and imbued with the kind of tenderness that is extremely difficult to see or appreciate in the moment. And although it’s certainly idealized and wistful, we accept any assumed white lies because we all wish that for ourselves: to

truly recognize what we have before it’s gone.

This story is not about the abduction, however, or what may have happened to Rubens after that day. It’s about how Eunice continues on, through uncertainty, absence and, ultimately, the loss of hope.

Salles chooses to tell this story in a rather straightforward manner, which works well, allowing the compelling narrative and the talented actors to carry the audience through.

At the heart of it is Torres, who has already won a Golden Globe for her performance and whose portrayal of Eunice is a true marvel. Mothers and wives often get the short shrift in movies like this, about Big Important Topics decided on by men, but Torres instills Eunice with a deep emotional and practical intelligence that’s beautifully feminine, whether she’s dealing with a misogynist banker, a dead dog in the street or the thugs surveilling her home.

She’s fascinating and resilient in a way that so many women are in times of historical strife but rarely celebrated for.

Good: ★ ★ ★

In one particularly poignant scene, she and the kids are being photographed by a journalist hoping to tell their story. They smile together, as they did earlier in the film when Rubens was there.

Now he’s not, and the reporters are confused. They ask Eunice to try a more serious expression. She laughs, “They want us to look sad,” and instructs her kids to keep smiling. It’s a perfect encapsulation of the complex spirit of the movie. Political disappearances don’t begin and end with the victim, or the toppling of a regime — they are generational traumas that live on in the survivors and alter everything in their wake.

“I’m Still Here,” a Sony Pictures Classics release is rated PG-13 by the Motion Picture Association for “smoking, drug use, brief nudity, some strong language, thematic content.” Running time: 135 minutes. Three stars out of four.

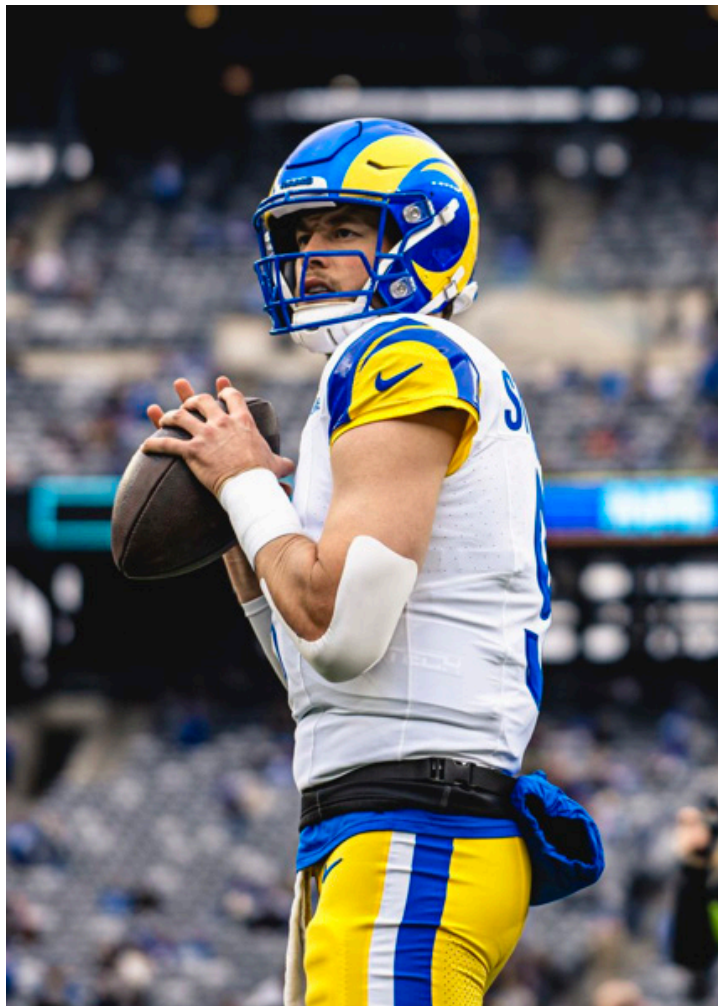
Over in the NFC, the Philadelphia Eagles are hosting the Washington Commanders, who are 6.5 point favorites. We are not convinced.

He's 37, but there's still gas in the tank

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles Rams coach Sean McVay says he would like to know "sooner than later" about Matthew Stafford's status for next season.

McVay provided no updates on his veteran quarterback's plans for the coming year when the coach held his end-of-season news conference Thursday, but McVay sounded eager to confirm whether or not Stafford will be returning to the Rams for a 17th season. Los Angeles spent much of the past offseason working on changes requested by Stafford to his contract, only completing the deal on reporting day for training camp.

"We don't want to have that go on again," McVay said. "I don't think that's good for anybody. I think sooner than later, being able to get that clarity, understanding, open and honest communication. I think there's a lot of love coming from our part. I think there's a lot of ap-

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Kupp's past success could bounce

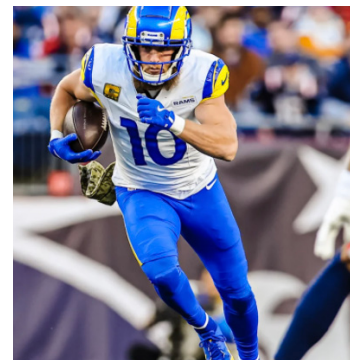

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Cooper Kupp is uncertain whether his remarkable eight-year career with the Los Angeles Rams came to an end last weekend in Philadelphia.

Although the former All-Pro receiver is under contract for the next two seasons, the massive size of his deal could compel the Rams to part ways with their Su-

per Bowl 56 MVP — and Kupp realizes it.

"Who knows what's going to happen?" Kupp said Monday as the Rams cleaned out their lockers at their training complex. "A lot of stuff is out of my control. We'll see what it's going to be. There's obviously stuff that was going on early on in the season, and we'll see. I don't have any clarity on what that's going to look like or anything like that.

preciation coming from his part as well, and I think a lot sooner than later is an ideal scenario."

McVay indicated the Rams want Stafford back after he led them to the NFC West title and a playoff victory over Minnesota before the Rams were edged 28-22 by the Philadelphia Eagles last Sunday. Los Angeles won the Super Bowl in Febru-

ary 2022 with Stafford, who has led the Rams to three postseason berths and seven playoff games in his four seasons with the club. But McVay isn't saying if he's certain Stafford, who turns 37 in two weeks, will play next season — or whether he'll do it with the Rams.

When asked to say definitely that Stafford would play for the Rams next year if he plays, Mc-

Vay replied: "We'll talk about all those things at the appropriate time. I know he's playing really good football. Obviously I love working with him. What he's meant to our football team has been immeasurable in a positive way."

Stafford dealt with a typical amount of bumps and bruises during the season despite a relatively low sack total. After the

loss in Philadelphia, Stafford said he would "take some time" to decide his plan for next season, but also indicated he feels like he can still play.

Stafford's wife, Kelly, revealed on her podcast this week that the quarterback broke four of his ribs in a game against San Francisco in December, saying the injury made him "miserable."

Ah, family. Can't live with 'em, can't do away with 'em., amirite?

Westminster Community Playhouse's 2024-2025 season is going strong with their production of "Arsenic & Old Lace", now playing through Sunday, January 26.

Directed by Greg Stokes, it's the story of a remarkably unusu-

al little family: living in an old manor in Brooklyn in 1940's New York, there's the pair of elderly sisters, Abby and Martha Brewster (Candy Beck and Sarah Hoeven), taking care of their reality-challenged nephew Teddy (Jorge Agustin) and his antics – he genuinely believes himself to be President Teddy

Roosevelt, so everything around him becomes related. The stairs become San Juan Hill, for him to charge up; the basement becomes Panama, where he digs the canal.

The locals are accustomed to the eccentric family, and regard them as harmless -- such as when officers Brophy and Klein show up (played by Jim Henson and Adriana Catanzarite) to pick up toy donations for the local orphanage and to remind the sisters to please keep Teddy in check, so as to not annoy the neighbors.

In fact, just across the cemetery adjacent to the manor lives the pious Reverend Harper (Frank Valdez) and his lovely daughter Elane (Pechiney Suos), who is herself soon-to-be betrothed to the lone "white sheep" of the Brewster family, Mortimer (Shawn Patrick Thomas).

And while the reverend disapproves of his line of work (as a theater critic), he can't deny the young man's affection for his beloved daughter.

When Mortimer visits the family home and discovers a very unexpected guest, his whole world is turned upside-down when he realizes that his family is more than just quirky... they're downright dangerous.

Great: ★★★★★

Adding to this mood is the appearance by his prodigal brother, the unsettling and menacing Jonathan (Guy C. van Empel) and his cohort, the inebriated doctor Einstein (Charlie Rodriguez), who are themselves looking for a place to "lay low" from the authorities.

But Jonathan's ire arises upon seeing his brother, whom he used to torment as a child... and now realizes that he might just use this reunion to finish the job.\

Mortimer's caught between a rock and a hard place, trapped between loyalty to his kin and his concern for the populace at large... how can he extricate himself from these family ties that bind?

For those who have never seen "Arsenic and Old Lace" on stage, or even if you've seen the classic film – this Westminster Community Playhouse production is a marvelous rendition, with an excellent cast and bril-

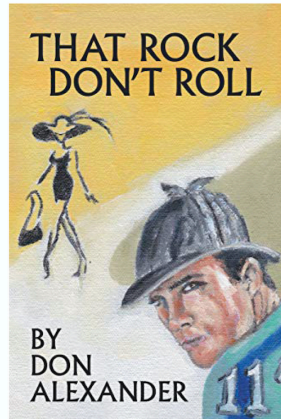

liant comedic timing.

Jorge Agustin makes a delightful Teddy, vaguely childlike in some of his conversation with his aunts and the friendly Officer O'Hara (Benjamin Rasmussen); Thomas's Mortimer charms, as does Suos's Elane;

Hoeven's Martha is a lovely, doting aunt to her nephews (Candy Beck was unfortunately unavailable for the matinee this reviewer attended, with the role of Abby instead portrayed by director Greg Stokes, to great comic effect.)

But a particularly entrancing duo in the production (aside from the Henson's and Catanzarite's lively officers Brophy and Klein) are van Empel's Johnathan and Rodriguez's Einstein: with his deep, monotone delivery and slow, measured steps and movement, van Empel creates quite

the threatening brother, while Rodriguez makes quite the likable and friendly character... despite his poor life choices.

Playing for one final weekend, "Arsenic and Old Lace" at the Westminster Community Playhouse is a wonderful throwback to times past, and a marvelous introduction to these classic characters; and most definitely one to catch while you can.
