

A New Deal For 'Cloud House' Apts.

Developer may get extension

It's a sort of a "Let's Make a Deal," only the price is well over \$1 million.

On Wednesday the Stanton Planning Commission will hold a public hearing to consider an amended development agreement with a luxury apartment developer struggling to pay the obligatory fees.

At issue is the Cloud House, a five-story complex located at 12331-12345 Beach Boulevard, north of Lampson Avenue.

Citing the "financial burden due to the global pandemic and its lingering effects" the developer – Stanton 2.0 LLC – is asking for some relief from the original schedule of payments.

The original agreement called for the developer to pay the city \$963,000

in community facilities fees, \$50,000 in beautification/enhancement fees and \$336,729 in development impact fees, totaling \$1,349,729, not including staff and legal costs.

Proposed is an alternative total of \$1,419,463.56 to be paid within five years of the city issuing the final certificate of occupancy, which is estimated to be March 2030.

The project has been constructed on the former site of a mobile home dealership. The term "cloud house" comes from the location of some amenities – including a pool – on the rooftop.

The planning commission will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Stanton City Hall, 7800 Katella Ave.

According to the Orange County Fire Authority – which provides fire and paramedic services for Garden Grove – personnel and vehicles were dispatched at 4:22 a.m.

Arriving firefighters saw smoke showing from one home and initiated an attack on the fire.

The blaze was contained to one home and all the residents evacuated the

building. Two were evaluated by firefighter paramedics but declined transport to a local hospital.

The Red Cross was called to provide assistance to four people displaced by the fire. The cause is under investigation and assistance was provided by Anaheim Fire and Rescue.

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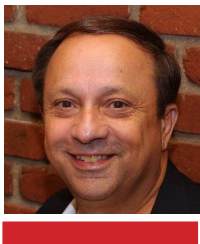
Are you here or are you just kind of present?

More about the Tet, ‘Year of the Snake’

Customs, origins and more about celebrating Asian lunar new year

BEIJING (AP) — Firecrackers popped, incense was offered at temples and dancers and drummers paraded Wednesday in Asia and farther afield as millions around the world celebrated the Lunar New Year.

From Beijing to Havana, the holiday — known as the Spring Festival in China, Tet in Vietnam and Seollal in Korea — is a major festival celebrated in many countries. Wednesday marked the start of the Year of the Snake, one of 12 animals in the Chinese zodiac.

Throngs of people in down jackets filled a Beijing park for

a “temple fair” on a sunny but chilly day. Some rang bells and tossed coins into containers in the shape of gold bars for good luck, while others ate traditional snacks from food stalls and took photos with a person dressed up as the God of Wealth.

The Lunar New Year is a time to wish for good luck and prosperity in the coming year for oneself and others.

“The past year was a very busy one for me, because I had to take care of both my kid and my work,” said Beijing resident Ji-ang Hecang. “In the Year of the Snake, I wish my kid will grow healthily and my work can remain stable. Then I can be happy

Should two parks get new names?

Should the long-standing names of two city parks be changed?

The Stanton City Council took up that issue at its Tuesday meeting. Proposed by Council-member John Warren for a possible change were Zuniga Park, located at 10902 Date St. (north of Katella Avenue) and Stanton Park, located at 7800 Katella Ave. (west of Beach Boulevard) at Cedar Street.

Zuniga Park is six-tenths of a mile in area; Stanton Park is 5.5 acres.

Warren wants to rename Zuniga Park after Victor Zuniga, the city’s first mayor. Stanton Park — located behind the civic center on land leased from Southern California Edison — is sometimes confused with Stanton Central Park, located on Western Avenue.

He’s suggesting that Stanton Park be renamed Philip Stanton Park after the legislator who helped found Huntington Beach (originally Pacific City), Seal Beach and Stanton.

What is now called Stanton was an unincorporated community most commonly mentioned as Benedict when Anaheim sought to annex the area for a sewer farm.

With Stanton’s assistance, residents of the area banded together and incorporated as a city, which they named after Stanton in 1911 in gratitude for his help.

The city lasted for 13 years when residents voted to disincorporate in 1924 to avoid the costs of building roads in the city.

Stanton re-incorporated in 1956 to avoid being swallowed up by its rapidly-growing neighbors of Anaheim, Buena Park and Garden Grove.

After some discussion, the council decided to have staff

Tariffs Are Set to Hit On Saturday

China (10 %) is added to the list, says president

President Donald Trump on Friday added China to the list of countries upon which he will impose tariffs on Saturday.

According to the Associated Press, in addition to the 25 percent levies he is planning on for Canada and Mexico, China is in for a 10 percent charge on goods from that nation into the United States.

"Starting tomorrow, these tariffs will be in place," said White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavett.

"These are promises made and kept by the president," she added.

Products from Canada and Mexico whose prices to Ameri-

can consumers could be affected include:

- automobiles; the supply chain of American-badged cars includes parts from both those nations, and more than one in five cars and light trucks – including sport utility vehicles – were built

north or south of the border.

- gasoline prices: The biggest supplier of crude oil in the U.S. is not an Arab nation, it's Canada, which shipped \$90 billion of crude oil to America during the period of January through November.

- alcohol: The importation of tequila and mezcal from Mexico was worth \$4.7 billion in a recent year.

Canadian hard liquor such as whiskey worth \$537 million came from north of the border.

Will some FBI agents who investigated Trump be discharged?

The New York Times is reporting that the Trump administration is examining the work of "scores" of FBI agents who were involved in the Justice Department's investigations of the president and his backers.

That information could be used to fire bureau leaders and/or agents considered to be "enemies" of the president. Kash Patel, the nominee to lead the agency testified to Congress that

he would not carry out a "campaign of retribution."

"All FBI employees will be protected against political retribution," he said on Thursday.

The Times also reported that "senior officials" at the bureau have asked for the names of the thousands of agents who worked on cases attached to the Jan. 6, 2021 attack on the U.S. Capitol by supporters of then-president Trump.

41 bodies recovered from crash of jet and helicopter

Workers have recovered 41 of the 67 bodies of persons who died in the collision of an Army helicopter and a civilian jetliner, according to United Press International.

The craft broke apart and plunged into the Potomac River in Washington, D.C. Twenty-eight of the victims have been identified.

Teams of divers are employing sonar to search for more human remains in the water, which is near freezing temperatures.

Reporters were told that it may

not be possible to recover all the bodies until the fuselage (main body) of the jet is pulled out of the river. The cause of the crash has not been determined.

Will and Reese Collide in 'Cordially'

Streaming-only comedy from Amazon/MGM

Are you with the bride or the groom? Hold on, scratch that. Are you with Reese Witherspoon or Will Ferrell?

"You're Cordially Invited," a new comedy directed by Nicholas Stoller, brings together two stars whose movie worlds are nearly as divided as wedding guests on separate sides of the aisle.

Ferrell is most closely associated with broad comedies and Witherspoon the more romantic variety. And while both have expanded beyond their wheelhouses, they are each A-list refugees from movie genres — laugh-out-loud comedies, rom-coms — that have largely faded from theaters in recent years.

"You're Cordially Invited," which debuts Thursday on Prime Video, unites these two once-ubiquitous box-office forces in a streaming-only wedding comedy that cross-pollinates "Father of the Bride" with "Wedding Crashers."

The combination works well enough, though it'd be fairer to deem "You're Cordially Invited" a funnier-than-average wedding movie than it would be a top-grade Ferrell comedy.

It's been two decades since, in "Wedding Crashers," Ferrell so gently called to his mother, "Hey, Mom! Can we get some meatloaf!" But a whole era has passed. "You're Cordially Invited" is an attempt to rekindle some of the spirit of those early '00s comedies while growing it up a little, and roping in a new generation of funny people.

Here, Ferrell plays the overly doting father to Jenni (Geraldine

Viswanathan). He's a widower whose happiness rests to an unsound degree on his daughter. Jim steams her clothes and styles her hair. He's not crashing the wedding this time; he's baking the cake.

When Jenni returns home with a ring on her finger and her now-fiancé (Stony Blyden) in tow, Jim experiences the happy news more like a nightmare.

Still, he gathers himself together and books a destination wedding on the small Georgia island where he and his wife were married.

Meanwhile, we're introduced to Margot (Witherspoon) a high-powered reality TV executive in Los Angeles whose younger sister (Meredith Hagner) is getting married to her boyfriend (Jimmy Tatro).

Her abiding issue is a disconnect with her Atlanta-era family and their disapproving mother (Celia Weston), a fissure that the wedding, which Margot opts to plan herself, quickly exacerbates.

When, a year later, these two groups arrive on the island, Jim and Margot eye each other suspiciously right up until they each attempt to check in at the same time.

Thanks to the untimely death of the inn's longtime owner, the place has been double-booked for the weekend — a particularly awkward situation given the island can only accommodate one wedding at a time.

The supporting roles throughout "You're Cordially Invited" are well cast, including the inn's new, very apologetic manager, played by Jack McBrayer.

After some hesitation, Margot and Jim resolve to share the venue. This, of course, is the not particularly subtle concept of "You're Cordially Invited." The arrangement is momentarily copacetic but gradually devolves into an all-out war between Margot and Jim, while the two very different wedding parties — one a multicultural DJ-ing crew, the other longtime Southerners — mingle congenially.

The main deficiency of "You're Cordially Invited," also scripted by Stoller ("Neighbors," "For-

getting Sarah Marshall"), is that everything about it proceeds from its concept. The characters feel engineered to suit it, and everything in its plot is orchestrated to serve the rival wedding feud.

Nothing in how things evolve will surprise you or feel particularly organic. For a not especially long movie, "You're Cordially Invited" drags, a byproduct of its artificial conception. This is the kind of film where the post-credits sing-along feels forced.

That said, there's a wide array of comic talent throughout Stoller's film that enlivens it. That includes Keyla Monterroso Mejia, Rory Scovel, Leanne Morgan and even, briefly, Peyton Manning. This should be a showcase for Viswanathan, the talented star of "Blockers" and "Bad Education," but her character, while primary, doesn't give her much to work with beyond shedding an overly dependent dad.

The highlight of the cast, real-

Whoa ... I'm a little bit dizzy. The professional sports establishments – long averse to any meaningful change – are now showing themselves to be surprisingly open to trying new stuff in an effort to keep existing fans, attract new ones and – most importantly – keep or make more money.

Baseball's moves have been great and have sliced about a half-hour off the time of the average game.

Football's extra point move (good) and kickoff change (not that good) are evidence of a willingness to reform.

Basketball hasn't done much new, but NBA commissioner Adam Silver has rolled out one big proposal: shorter games.

Currently, NBA games have four 12-minute quarters, adding up to 48 minutes. But an NBA telecast – complete with half-time, quarter breaks, time-outs, etc. – takes well over two hours and sometimes closer to two and a half.

Ratings are down, and Silver thinks that the reason is that the games are just too darn long. I agree. His proposal to have the quarters be 10 minutes (for a total of 40 minutes) would lessen the monotony, but that only goes so far.

Not only are the games too long, the most interesting part is the last five minutes. And the season is too long. A stretch of 82 games plus the interminable playoffs means a leg-deadening march from autumn well into spring.

Too much jarring of joints and too little time between games means more injuries and longer recovery times. Fewer games might mean fewer TV games to sell advertising, but think of it

The Chiefs won a close game back in 2023

Patrick Mahomes and the Kansas City Chiefs keep finding themselves on one side of a Super Bowl rematch.

A year after beating the San Francisco 49ers for the second time in five seasons in the NFL's championship game, Mahomes and the Chiefs will square off against the Philadelphia Eagles for the second Super Bowl in the past three seasons.

Kansas City won the first meeting 38-35 in Glendale, Arizona, and will try to pull off another Super Bowl sweep on Feb. 9 in New Orleans.

"This is a great football team

(that) we're playing," Mahomes said. "They're great on offense, they're great on defense and special teams. We played them in a close Super Bowl a couple years ago, but they've added players and got even better, so it'll take our best football to win."

More than 40 players who participated in that nail-biter two years ago are projected to be on the field next week including stars like Mahomes, Travis

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Harden 'assists' in Clippers win

James Harden made history as the Los Angeles Clippers won a game Friday night against the Charlotte Hornets on the road, 112-104.

Early in the game, he had his 8,000th career assist, making him the 13th player in NBA history to achieve that accomplishment. Earlier this week, he was named an NBA all-star for the 11th time, and as the oldest player – he's 35 – to win the honor as a Clipper.

Harden ended up with 14 points and 10 assists. Leading the scoring for the Clips was Kawhi Leonard with 21 points and nine rebounds.

With the win the Clippers are 28-22 and just a few percentage points behind the rival Los Angeles Lakers in second place in the NBA Pacific Division. They'll visit the Toronto Raptors on Sunday and then host the Lakers on Tuesday.

The Garden Grove Argonauts boys basketball team defeated the Ocean View Seahawks 57-47, to secure a CIF-SS playoff spot on Friday night. The Argonauts were in control for most of the game, and despite a fourth quarter push from Ocean View, Grove was able to pull away in crunch time.

Argo Coach Andrew Scimeca was satisfied with his team's overall performance.

"We have come a long way from having two wins a year ago, to where we are today. The last couple weeks the guys have been doing a really good job of executing game plans, and they did the same thing tonight in closing this one out."

ly, is Weston, who is so good as a hard-to-impress matriarch that you could just as easily drop her into a family drama.

Ferrell, who has made unadjusted fathers a specialty since "Saturday Night Live," finds more ways to make Jim a compelling comic character than most anyone could.

Having the chance to see him in a big studio comedy has gotten so foolishly infrequent that

"You're Cordially Invited" is worth RSVP'ing to for that too-rare opportunity, in itself.

Somewhat surprisingly, "You're Cordially Invited" doesn't culminate in a big comic set piece but puts much — maybe too much — of its energy into talking through Jim and Margot's hang-ups.

There's a clever, self-aware theme of honesty: too little of it in Jim and Jenni's performative dynamic, and too much of it in Margot's cynical family relationships.

That all of this hangs together is a testament, most of all, to Witherspoon deftness as a performer.

In a movie in which Ferrell

wrestles an alligator and Nick Jonas cameos (winningly) as a singing pastor, you don't doubt Witherspoon for a moment.

"You're Cordially Invited," an

enough."

In Malaysia, the crackling of firecrackers greeted the new year outside Guan Di temple in the capital, Kuala Lumpur, followed by lion dances to the rhythmic beat of drums and small cymbals.

Ethnic Chinese held incense sticks in front of them and bowed several times inside the temple before sticking the incense into elaborate gold-colored pots, the smoke rising from the burning tips.

Hundreds of people lined up on the eve of the Lunar New Year at the Wong Tai Sin Taoist temple in Hong Kong in a bid to be among the first to put incense sticks in the stands in front of the temple's main hall at 11 p.m.

"I wish my family will be blessed. I hope my business will run well. I pray for my country and wish people peace. I hope this coming year is a better year," said Ming So, who visits the temple every year for the late-night ritual.

Online, Google joined in with the festivities Wednesday by featuring the classic snake game on its homepage.

Many Chinese who work in bigger cities return home during the eight-day national holiday in what is described as the world's biggest annual movement of humanity. The exodus turns Beijing, China's capital, into a bit of a ghost town, with many shops closed and normally crowded roads and subways emptied.

Traditionally, Chinese families gather for a festive dinner at home on New Year's Eve. On the Lunar New Year, many visit temples to pray and attend temple fairs to watch performances and buy snacks, toys and other trinkets.

"I bring my children here to

experience the atmosphere, because the New Year atmosphere ... is fading," Beijing resident Wang Xinxin said at a temple fair at Ditan Park, the former Temple of Earth in the Ming and Qing dynasties.

"Children like mine don't have much idea what New Year was like in Beijing before, but here we can still see some elements of it," Wang said.

The government has curtailed non-official celebrations, with major cities outlawing the noisy firecrackers that once reverberated around Beijing and left some blocks enshrouded in smoke.

Many Chinese take advantage of the extended holiday to travel in the country and abroad. Ctrip, an online booking agency that operates Trip.com, said the most popular overseas destinations this year are Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore, Australia, the United States, South Korea, Macao and Vietnam.

In Moscow, Russians cheered, waved and took smartphone photos of drummers, costumed dancers and long dragon and snake figures held aloft in a colorful procession that kicked off a 10-day Lunar New Year festival on Tuesday night.

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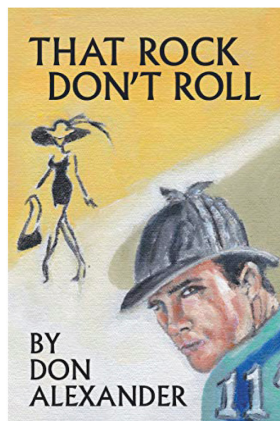

Kelce and Chris Jones for Kansas City and Jalen Hurts, Lane Johnson and A.J. Brown for Philadelphia.

Many played big roles in the last Super Bowl meeting. Hurts rushed for three TDs and threw a 45-yard scoring strike to Brown, while Mahomes threw three TD passes, including one to Kelce, Nick Bolton returned a fumble for a touchdown and Harrison Butker kicked the game-winning field goal with 8 seconds left.

There have only been nine Super Bowl rematches in the previous 58 games, with just four happening in a five-year span before this rematch. The winners of those three rematches were the teams that won the first meeting.

Here's a look at the other times there was a Super Bowl rematch within five seasons of the first meeting:

Chiefs vs. 49ers

Mahomes rallied Kansas City from a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter for a 31-20 win in Super Bowl 54, with his biggest play being a 44-yard pass on third-and-15 to Tyreek Hill that sparked the comeback.

The 49ers kept it even closer last season in a back-and-forth game that featured three go-ahead scoring drives led by Brock Purdy in the fourth quarter or overtime. But it wasn't enough to topple Mahomes.

Mahomes engineered two late game-tying field goal drives in regulation. He then took advantage of San Francisco coach Kyle Shanahan's decision to start overtime with the ball by responding to a field goal by the Niners with a walk-off 3-yard TD pass to Mecole Hardman for Kansas City's third title in this current run.

Giants vs. Patriots

Eli Manning and the Giants spoiled New England's bid for a perfect season in 2007 and then pulled off the upset again four years later.

The Patriots came into Super Bowl 42 with an 18-0 record and were on the brink of matching the perfect season of the 1972 Dolphins when Tom Brady threw a 6-yard TD pass to Randy Moss to make it 14-10 with 2:42 to go.

But Manning drove New York down the field — with help from David Tyree's helmet catch — and threw a game-winning TD to Plaxico Burress to stun New England.

Manning did it again in the 2011 season, driving to a game-winning touchdown with 57 seconds left for a 21-17 win.

Cowboys vs. Bills

Dallas and Buffalo had the only Super Bowl rematch in consecutive seasons, meeting at the end of the 1992 and 1993 campaigns. The Cowboys got the best of both.

They used nine takeaways and four TD passes from Troy Aikman to hand the Bills a 52-17 loss in Super Bowl 27.

The rematch was closer but had the same result. James Washington returned a fumble for a TD early in the third quarter to tie the game and Emmitt Smith ran for two TDs in the second half for a 30-13 win.

Steelers vs. Cowboys

The Cowboys were on the wrong end of a Super Bowl rematch in the 1970s, losing to the Steelers following the 1975 and 1978 seasons.

Dallas became the first wild-

card team to reach the title game in Super Bowl 10 thanks to a desperation pass to beat Minnesota and a blowout against the Rams.

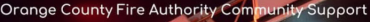
But they fell short against the Steel Curtain in the second second-half in Super Bowl history. Pittsburgh got a safety, two field goals and a 64-yard touchdown catch by Super Bowl MVP Lynn Swann in the fourth quarter of a 21-17 win to complete back-to-back titles for the Steelers.

Pittsburgh won again three years later in the first Super

Bowl rematch to deny Dallas back-to-back championships.

MVP Terry Bradshaw threw four TD passes and Jackie Smith dropped a potential touchdown for Dallas. Roger Staubach's late rally fell short and the Steelers won their third Super Bowl title 35-31.

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
