

So just how drunk do you think you are?

You might not think that the weekend leading up to Labor Day would especially be a time for drinking and driving, but checkpoints in Garden Grove resulted in a significant haul of arrests, tows and tickets.

The Garden Grove Police Department conducted checkpoints on Friday and Saturday evenings (and into the early hours of the following days) looking at over more than 1,900 vehicles.

During that time, police made 13 arrests for driving under the influence (of alcohol and/or drugs). Sixteen cars were towed and impounded and 30 tickets were written for various vehicle code violations.

Also, officers visited neighborhood as restaurants and bars to educate the community on the dangers of impaired driving and to test their knowledge by guessing their own blood alcohol content after consuming some liquor.

‘Distinguished schools’ celebrated

Celebrations were the order of business at Tuesday night’s meeting of the Garden Grove Unified School District Board of Education.

Eleven elementary schools in the GGUSD have been declared California Distinguished School for show-

ing exceptional academic outcomes or great success in closing the achievement gap.

That’s the most in Orange County and topped only by the huge Los Angeles Unified School District, which is 14 times larger than the GGUSD.

The board presented framed certificates to representatives – principals, teachers and other staff – from Anthony, Barker, Brookhurst, Cook, Eisenhower, Excelsior, Hill, Patton, Peters K-3 and 4-6 and Zeyen schools.

Also on Tuesday the board approved by a 4-0 vote – with Trustee Dina

to amend a contract with Environmental Sciences Associates to appropriate \$250,000 for the airshow environmental impact report and “ongoing mitigation monitoring.”

Public comments on the deal were mostly negative, citing environmental concerns and the financial details of the deal, which was described by critics as worth \$50 million over the course of the agreement.

Six council members spoke in favor of the deal, arguing that it would provide economic benefit to the community as well as net income to the city.

Williams, attempted to pour cold water on the agreement. He called into question estimates of the benefits and costs.

"How much is the TOT ("bed tax" paid by hotel guests at ho-

tels)? We don't know," he said. "How much will we get in more tax revenue? We don't know."

Williams suggested that economists be consulted to determine with more precision the promised financial benefits and costs.

After his substitute motion to amend the deal to keep the 40-year deal and keep the "deal points" intact for one year but then renegotiate them afterwards failed, the full council voted to approve the original plan, with Williams dissenting.

27-Year Hate Crime Sentence

Convict threatened pregnant woman at Fullerton bus stop

SANTA ANA (AP) — A California man was sentenced Friday to 27 years to life in prison for making racist threats against a pregnant Black woman after prosecutors appealed an earlier, lighter sentence, officials said.

Tyson Mayfield, 49, pleaded guilty in a court-offered deal in 2019 to get a five-year sentence

that the Orange County District Attorney's office opposed and later appealed.

An appeals panel rejected the decision, and Mayfield was retried and convicted of making criminal threats with an enhancement for a hate crime.

"Over the last six years we have fought and fought and fought for justice in this case," District Attorney Todd Spitzer said in a statement. "Justice was finally served today against a man who spent decades hating others, and now he will spend decades be-

hind bars where he belongs."

A message was left at the public defender's office seeking comment.

Mayfield was accused of threatening and yelling racial slurs at a woman who was eight months pregnant at a bus stop in Fullerton in 2018, prompting her to use pepper spray to protect herself and run for help.

Authorities said Mayfield, who is white and has a swastika tattoo, had prior convictions for attacking bystanders, including

Curbs on the sale of kratom products in OC

The Orange County Board of Supervisors passed an ordinance last week authored by Supervisor Janet Nguyen (First District) restricting the sale, distribution or possession of synthetic kratom products some parts of the county.

These are primarily sold in smoke and vape shops as a remedy for quitting opioids. The ordinance goes into effect late September.

Southland cities such as Newport Beach, San Diego and Oceanside have outlawed kratom entirely, which is derived from Southeast Asian tree leaves. The ordinance will take affect this summer within unincorporated Orange County.

Users report that kratom acts a stimulant and pain reliever, however the Mayo Clinic has labeled the substance "unsafe and ineffective."

"Every few years we learn about dangerous narcotics that can be created by utilizing ingredients purchased over the counter," Nguyen said. "Kratom has been linked to thousands of cases of liver damage, seizures, and even death, the Mayo Clinic reported."

Troops Coming to Chicago, Baltimore?

Illinois governor says there's no need to do that

The intervention of federal law enforcement to fight crime in Chicago and Baltimore will be ordered, President Donald Trump said on Tuesday.

"We're going in," said Trump about Chicago. "I didn't say when. I have an obligation. This isn't a political thing."

Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker said that sending military troops and federal agents into the nation's third-largest city wasn't necessary or wanted, according to the Associated Press.

Pritzker urged Chicagoans to be watchful and film and publicize interactions with federal agents. "Authoritarians thrive on your silence. Be loud for America,"

he said.

Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson said that violence in the city is influenced by guns brought in from neighboring states such as

Indiana where guns are more freely available and legal.

The AP reports that in 2024, Chicago had 573 homicides – the most in the nation, but that

the number was decreasing and some other cities – including those in "red states" (St. Louis, New Orleans, Atlanta and Indianapolis) have higher murder rates per capita.

Venezuela president warns Trump against a 'fight'

President Nicolas Maduro of Venezuela warned President Trump that his nation would use "an armed fight" to resist American military action near that nation's shores.

The New York Times is reporting that Maduro claimed that U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio was trying to spur a war in the Caribbean.

"Watch out," said Maduro on Monday, "because Mr. Rubio wants to stain your hands with blood."

On Tuesday it was announced that U.S. military forces had launched a "lethal strike" against a suspected drug vessel which reportedly departed from a Venezuelan port.

Judge says use of troops in Los Angeles during the protests was illegal

The use of California National Guard troops in Los Angeles to control protests was not legal, a federal judge has ruled.

United Press International reports that U.S. District Court Judge Charles Breyer of California said in a ruling that the use of federalized National Guard soldiers and U.S. Marines to protect federal agents during the

immigration "crackdown" were a violation of the 19th century Posse Comitatus Act, prohibiting the use of troops in law enforcement.

Breyer wrote that Trump and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth were intending to "create a national police force with the president as its chief."

Sequels Will Light Up Hollywood

Here's what to expect in cinemas for September

Daniel Craig's Benoit Blanc is back. So are the stars of "Wicked" and the animals of "Zootopia."

Summer may be known as sequel season, but part twos, and threes, will play big roles this fall at the movies. That goes not just for the likes of Rian Johnson's "Wake Up Dead Man: A Knives Out Mystery," "Wicked: For Good" and "Zootopia 2," but for new installments in family sagas, ranging from the Crawleys ("Downton Abbey: The Grand Finale") to the Na'vi ("Avatar: Fire & Ash").

Still, much of the season will belong, as it always does, to original dramas and awards contenders. Hollywood tends to save its best for last. Well, this wasn't surprising, except perhaps in its frankness.

Responding to some ragging from the coach at Oklahoma State about how much the Ducks spend on football, Oregon coach Dan Lanning replied: 'If you want to be a top-10 team in college football, you better be invested in winning and we spend to win.'

Well, there you have it; something we long suspected. Big-time college football is a professional sport.

The culprit is the doctrine of "name, image, likeness" in which college athletes can be paid for the value of their name, appearance and other characteristics by third parties – not the colleges – for endorsements, social media content, autograph signing, etc.

Under this concept, an allegedly "amateur" athlete can make millions (perhaps tens of millions) of dollars in a single college season just for the value of his (and sometimes her) star value.

The colleges benefit indirectly because the big-time programs have the biggest following and exposure, making a college choice for a high school kid potentially pivot on how much money is to be made.

Those endorsements, etc., mean more exposure for the college program. It's a revolving circle of gold lust made more onerous by the transfer portal.

It's long been hinted that blue-chip athletes were lured by gifts of cars, cash and some personal companionship. Now, it's obvious that what was once called cheating is now the new normal. "Be true to your school" is a slogan to be mocked.

Rams Among The Best?

The addition of Davante Adams raises hopes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles Rams (11-8)

Expectations

Serious title contention. The Rams believe they've got the talent and the experience to vie for the third Super Bowl appearance of Sean McVay's career. They return nearly every significant player from the team that got on a serious roll after its October 2024 bye week, finishing last season on a 10-4 surge — with two of those losses to Philadelphia and the third in a meaningless regular-season finale played by backups.

McVay again masterminded a tenacious, resourceful squad that won even when the offense struggled in December.

The Rams got impressive improvement out of a defense that was poor earlier in the season.

They've also got continuity going for them in a sport where it's

often lacking; their only major personnel change this year is the replacement of oft-injured Super Bowl MVP Cooper Kupp with Davante Adams, one of the very best receivers of his generation. The Rams might

not have the Super Bowl champion Eagles' depth of talent and championship experience, but they appear to be a match for any other team in the NFC.

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Strengths

McVay's passing game will have new dimensions this season for 37-year-old Matthew Stafford, who has been given nearly all the ingredients necessary to lead a prolific offense.

Adams and Puka Nacua could form one of the NFL's best receiving tandems, while Los Angeles added second-round pick Terrance Ferguson to create a deep tight end room.

Kyren Williams will team up with youngsters Jarquez Hunter and Blake Corum in a talented group at running back. The Rams had the NFL's best young defensive front last season, and almost everybody has returned along with respected veteran

Poona Ford, who takes over at nose tackle. Jared Verse and Braden Fiske are eager to build on their standout rookie seasons while becoming the leaders of the defense

Weaknesses

Stafford missed a month of training camp with a bad back, and he's hesitant to say it's all behind him. One big hit on the 17-year veteran could change the Rams' entire season outlook by thrusting Jimmy Garoppolo into the lineup.

Keeping Stafford safe would be even harder in the absence of starting left tackle Alaric Jackson, who missed all of training camp with blood clots.

While he's on track to return, any absence would hinder an offensive line that already looks competent at best.

The entire offense faded down the stretch of the regular season to some of the worst production in McVay's career, but he doesn't seem concerned after its playoff rebound.

The Rams curiously added nobody to a secondary that struggled for long stretches last season, unable to reacquire Jalen Ramsey and uninterested in signing a proven veteran. They believe they can win with Darious Williams and Ahkello

Witherspoon as their starting cornerbacks while Quentin Lake again plays the current version of Ramsey's do-it-all "star" role from their Super Bowl title run 3 1/2 years ago.

Camp development

The Rams allowed leading tackler Christian Rozeboom to walk, but ex-Falcons linebacker Nate Landman seized the largely thankless role at inside linebacker with his work this summer.

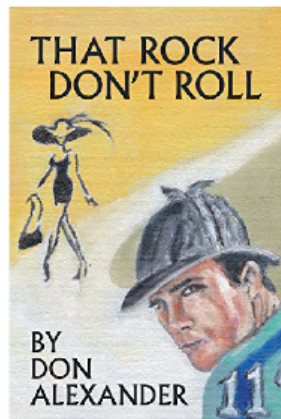
Undrafted rookie linebacker Shaun Dolac also earned a roster spot. Returnee Coleman Shelton beat out Beaux Limmer for the starting job at center, as expected. Receivers Xavier Smith and rookie Konata Mumpfield earned roster spots, likely because of their utility on special teams.

Fantasy player to watch

Tutu Atwell. The diminutive receiver struggled to get on the field during his first four seasons with the Rams, even though he regularly produced yards whenever he got a chance. He's speedy with good hands, but his size limits his blocking effectiveness and therefore his usefulness to McVay. But the Rams surprisingly re-signed Atwell to a \$10 million contract last spring, making it all but certain McVay will play Atwell extensively in his multiple-receiver sets. With defenses understandably focused on Adams and Nacua this season, Atwell could be a high-value selection in later rounds.

dards (just 40,000 square feet) and was originally planned for a two-story facility.

But for reasons that elude logic, they decided to build the second story underground and use that for storage instead of selling.

The City of Garden Grove tried to talk them into making more use of the subterranean real estate, but no luck. It eventually became an outlet store as a new two-story (all above-ground) store was built at The City (later The Block, now the Outlets in Orange).
