Hungry and curious crowds thronged the Village Green park and a stretch of Main Street in Garden Grove's downtown on Friday evening for "FOGG [Foods of Garden Grove] LIVE," the second annual celebration of the local cuisine and community spirit.

More than two dozen eateries, offering a wide variety of foods from classic American fare to Asian, Italian, Mexican and more offered attendees a chance to sample – for a modest price – bite-sized offerings in a well-organized and attractive setting.

"It's great," said Garden Grove Councilman George Brietigam (District 1). "It brings all the better restaurants in the city together and the community can try them all out. That brings in increased customer business which improves the tax base for the city, so it's a win-win-win."

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Three political resolutions win approvals

The political issues that have sometimes dominated meetings of the Westminster City Council for months and even years surfaced again on

Wednesday. At a meeting that lasted nearly four hours, the council first approved a resolution by Councilmember Amy Phan West (District 1) in favor of the use of voter identification in elections.

WESTMINSTER CITY COUNCIL

"We need to make sure that every vote is legal and every vote is accounted for," said West.

But Vice Mayor Carlos Manzo pointed out that

state law prohibits cities from requiring identification to cast a ballot and that the city could find itself in an expensive legal battle.

Mayor Chi Charlie Nguyen agreed that while

the resolution was unnecessary, he would support it on the grounds that it probably reflected the opinion of the majority of the public.

The vote was 3-2 in favor with Manzo and Councilmember Mark Nguyen opposed. The council also took up a resolution opposing "VietRISE's promotion of Communist propaganda in Little Saigon and Reaffirming the City's Commitment to Historical Truth and Freedom."

It was approved 4-0 with Manzo abstaining on the grounds of insufficient information.

Manzo argued that it was an attempt to suppress freedom of speech and thereby resembled the policies of communists.

Mayor Chi Charlie Nguyen recounted his own experience's fleeing Vietnam after the fall of Saigon and spoke of what he called "false and misleading" propaganda about the history surrounding the fall of the Republic of Vietnam.

Manzo said he didn't condone suppression of speech or communism, but expressed concern about the lack of information about the specifics of what VietRISE was advocating.

Finally a resolution – again, put forth by West – "opposing any actions that dishonor the American flag" was approved by a 5-0 vote.

City won't take sides on California's Prop. 50

Stanton won't be joining two other West Orange County cities in taking an official position on Proposition 50 on the fall ballot. Mayor David Shawver brought the matter to Tuesday's meeting of the city council.

The proposition – if passed by voters – would redraw Congressional districts in California to create five or more "winnable" seats in the House of Representatives for Democratic candidates in the 2026 mid-term elections.

That's in response to actions by Texas to redraw its districts to add five more Republican seats. President Donald Trump has made the request in an effort to protect Republicans' narrow margin in the House.

It's common for the party in control of the White House to lose seats in the House in a mid-year election.

The council considered the proposal but a consensus was not reached and no action was taken.

City councils in Westminster and Huntington Beach have passed resolutions urging residents to vote against the proposition.

Guilty plea from Stanton sex offender

A Stanton resident who is a former Orange County Sheriff's Deputy has pleaded guilty to sexually assaulting two female inmates, including directing them to engage in sexual activity, while assigned to work at the Theo Lacy Facility in Orange.

He was sentenced to 364 days credit time served and ordered to register as a sex offender.

Arcadio Rodriguez, 30, was charged in January 2023 with one misdemeanor count of sexual battery, one misdemeanor count of a detention facility employee engaging in sexual activity with a confined consenting adult, and one misdemeanor count of possession of a cell phone in a correctional facility.

Rodriguez has been on GPS monitoring since January 2025. In addition to the 364 days of custody time, Rodriguez was ordered to register as a sex offender for a minimum of 10 years and was placed on one-year formal probation.

The deputy established an inappropriate relationship with two female inmates incarcerated at the Theo Lacy Facility, which included touching them in intimate areas over their jail uniforms and showing them pornographic videos of himself while they were in their housing locations.

Liberal Groups Called ‘Terrorists’

Comey says he is victim of policy of ‘retribution’

President Donald Trump announced on Friday he would direct the Justice Department to classify some liberal organizations as “domestic terrorist organizations.”

That comes, the Associated Press reports, after criminal charges were brought against former FBI director James Comey, a long-time foe of Trump.

A Virginia grand jury indicted Comey for allegedly lying to Congress in testimony he gave in 2000.

Comey said he is paying the

“price” for taking on Trump and becoming the target of what the AP is calling an “unprecedented retribution campaign” against people he considers his political

enemies.

Earlier this week he said he “hated his enemies.”

“Donald Trump has made clear that he intends to turn our justice

system into a weapon for punishing and silencing his critics,” said Sen. Mark Warner of Virginia, the top Democrat on the Senate Intelligence Committee.

Netanyahu rejects statehood for Palestine, “a shame”

Before a quickly departing audience of diplomats of the United Nations General Assembly, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu defended his nation’s military actions in Gaza and refused to consider the creation of a Palestinian state on Friday.

Such a development would lead to the “national suicide” of Israel, he said, according to The New York Times. He added that for nations that have recog-

nized Palestine as an independent state, “it will be a mark of shame on all of you.”

As he spoke, diplomats began a walkout and the hall was nearly empty.

The speech was broadcast in English and Hebrew in Gaza territory hoping to reach hostages still held by Hamas.

“We have not forgotten you,” he said.

Sinclair and Nexstar in reversals, will return to Jimmy Kimmel show

After vowing it would not broadcast Jimmy Kimmel’s late night show after being re-instated by ABC, Sinclair Broadcasting – holder of a large number of network affiliate stations – reversed itself. So did Nexstar.

The AP is reporting that Sinclair had been pre-empting Kimmel broadcasts with news programming. Kimmel had been suspended because of remarks made after the fatal shooting of conservative activist Charlie

Politics is 'One Battle After...'

A madcap roller coaster ride on today's crises

In Paul Thomas Anderson's gloriously messy, madcap roller coaster ride through modern America, objects in the rear view may go out of sight, but they don't disappear.

Political struggles never die in In "One Battle After Another," they just repeat. Or maybe they grow older and become paranoid, pot-smoking, pajama-wearers like Bob Ferguson (Leonardo DiCaprio), a washed-up revolutionary living off the grid with his daughter, Willa (Chase Infiniti). The cycles of oppression and resistance are palpably felt in Anderson's film, a decades-spanning odyssey where gun violence, white power and immigrant deportations recur in an ongoing dance, both farcical and tragic.

But "One Battle After Another" could also be fairly described as a sweet movie about a father coming to terms with his teenage daughter having a phone — which is one example of how Anderson's destabilizing approach to big themes can turn poignant and revelatory. "Sweeping" would normally be a way to characterize a nearly three-hour-long, multigeneration saga like this, but Anderson works in a more rough-hewn, compassionate register that burrows strangely but acutely into the American psyche.

"One Battle After Another" is arriving after months of speculation and some skepticism because it's easily Anderson's biggest budgeted, largest scaled film yet. But scale is an interesting thing when it comes to Anderson's movies. "Magnolia" is modest by most metrics, but you'd be hard pressed to find a

more ambitious movie. "There Will Be Blood" didn't feature much spectacle beyond some rickety wooden oil rigs, but it feels about as large as the frame of Daniel Day-Lewis' Daniel Plainview, which is to say terrifyingly enormous.

Likewise, "One Battle After Another," shot on VistaVision, is big and long but feels intimate and fast. That's partly due to the propulsion of its opening prologue and the absurd knock-out vigor of Teyana Taylor as a scorching, potent screen presence. Her Perfidia Beverly Hills is at the center of the movie's beginning. And she makes such a powerful mark that it takes half an hour for "One Battle After Another" to pick up the pieces after it moves on. (My personal recovery time is ongoing.)

We first see Perfidia, dressed in all black, striding across an overpass. Below is an immigration detention center. The atmosphere is tumultuous. Bob is

there, ready to set off fireworks or bombs, but has little clue of the plan. She assures him: "Make it big, make it bright. Inspire me."

They and their co-conspirators soon announce their intentions, freeing the immigrants, tying up the military guards and declaring that they're the radical group the French 75. This is the start, Perfidia says, of a revolution. Their cause is righteous but their drive is visceral and sexual. Bomb-making and sex go hand in hand. Bob trails after Perfidia, in love with her but also in awe. Perfidia's mother doesn't give them much of a chance as a couple. "She's a runner and you're a stone," she tells him.

At the same time, Perfidia comes in contact with Col. Lockjaw (Sean Penn), a rock-jawed military man who, too, swoons for Perfidia. When they first meet, she holds him at gunpoint and tells him to "Get it up," and she doesn't mean his hands. These charged scenes, followed by Perfidia's pregnancy and new police trouble for the French 75, set the table for the drama to come, set 16 years after this opening salvo, a frenetic eruption of Black and female power.

By then, the forces fought by the

But considering the trend line, it's clear that at 34 years old, #27 can't be the same Mike Trout who was once the Face of Baseball.

Remember the fun me had with the "Farewell Tour of Kareem Abdul-Jabbar" back in the day? Accolades in every arena and much bon homie?

It's possible that Mike still has one glittering season in him. And perhaps it would also be his last.

No great player, and a lot of mediocre ones, want to hang up the glove. And maybe that day's not yet here. But we can all see it from here.

Dodgers clinched another NL West over the D-backs

PHOENIX (AP) — As the Los Angeles Dodgers celebrated their 12th National League West title in 13 years, Clayton Kershaw thought about participating in a division championship for the final time.

"This is what I'm going to miss," the left-hander said after Thursday's 8-0 victory over the Arizona Diamondbacks. "Pitching is great and I love that, too, but getting to do this with a group of guys, all working for a collective goal, the camaraderie, that's really special.

"You don't get that anywhere else. There's no jobs where 37-year-olds get to do that. But I'm good, I had a great run."

An 11-time All-Star and three-time Cy Young Award winner, Kershaw said last week he will retire at the end of the postseason. He won the first of 14 division titles as a rookie in 2008.

"It was a lot of fun then and it's a lot of fun now," Kershaw said of

While the Dodgers celebrated their 2013 division title by jumping into the Chase Field pool behind the right-field wall, they avoided the water this time — except when Shohei Ohtani hit a splash shot for his 54th

home run.

"Winning the division title, you can never take it for granted," said Freddie Freeman, who homered twice Thursday. "We feel like we're really starting to

radicals have clawed back their advantage. Lockjaw (this is a taut, drained, maniacal Penn) now moves with impunity, directing troops on illegal raids where he chooses. Some of those in power like what he's doing. A secret white supremacist group called the Christmas Adventurers (they speak of cleansing the Earth and greet each other with

"merry Christmas") offers him a membership. The French 75 are essentially no more. Bob is now alone with their 16-year-old daughter. He's grown less connected with the world. He calls his daughter's friend "Homie," has trouble with pronouns and usually has a roach going. It's the most Lebowski-esque performance by DiCaprio, whose recent gravity toward less polished, error-

prone characters ("Killers of the Flower Moon," "Once Upon a Time in Hollywood") has made for some of his most interesting movies.

Willa, though, is said to have her mother's courage. (Infiniti, a newcomer, has an inner strength that comes across clear as day.) When Lockjaw comes looking for Willa, a new cycle of state-sponsored violence is set off. That brings in a delightful Benicio Del Toro as a combination sensei and Harriet Tubman-like figure to immigrants who shepherds Bob when the authorities are closing in. This is probably the most shambolic section of the movie, but Del Toro's Sergio St. Carlos is also the film's most resonate encapsulation of freedom. He's free because his purpose is clear and principled. This is a movie filled with police convoys across the land and military tactics that effectively turn modern-day America into a battlefield. The film, inspired by Thomas Pynchon's "Vineland,"

shares some of the culture clash of Anderson's earlier Pynchon adaptation, "Inherent Vice." But "One Battle After Another," graced with a swelling score by Johnny Greenwood that gives the movie a hint of epic, feels more urgently contemporary and more morally motivated.

That makes "One Battle After Another," as a major studio release clattering with straightforward representations of racism, xenophobia and vigilantism, an exception in almost every way to modern-day Hollywood. I'm sure that will bring debate, just as any good movie does. And I'm sure some will find its American portrait muddled and chaotic. But those aspects feel true, too, just as does the movie's abiding fighting spirit.

"One Battle After Another," a Warner Bros. release is rated R by the Motion Picture Association for pervasive language, violence, sexual content, and drug use. Running time: 170 minutes.

3-0 Chargers take on 0-3 New York Giants

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Jim Harbaugh's Los Angeles Chargers are right where their coach wants them to be, winning games with plenty of things to improve on. Now comes the perfect chance to build on that.

The Chargers are 3-0 for the first time since 2002, when they were based in San Diego, and visit the 0-3 New York Giants on Sunday. The scuffling Giants are making a quarterback change, benching Russell Wilson to start rookie Jaxson Dart, while Los Angeles is riding the wave as one of six unbeaten teams left in the NFL.

"We've never looked too far ahead (and) we've never looked back," said Chargers quarterback Justin Herbert, the only player in the league this season with multiple 300-yard passing games. "It's going forward and making sure that we're on our stuff because they are much bet-

ter than their record indicates." The record indicates New York is again on track for a top-10 draft pick, if not top-five, getting outscored 83-52 with a wild overtime loss at Dallas sandwiched between offensive duds.

Here comes Dart, who wants to "be a spark" — and also might be key to saving coach Brian Daboll's job. No pressure, kid.

"I don't really feel pressure," Dart said. "I feel like pressure is given to those who play at a high level, and the best players in the world are the ones that are kind of involved with that word 'pressure.' ... My focus is just trying to win one game at a time."

Dart is from Utah and was the 25th pick out of Mississippi, but he also spent his freshman season at Southern California and sounds like he could be studying from the Chargers' school of thought. Herbert called it "truly one week at a time."


