A Long Beach woman has been jailed in connection with a traffic accident Monday that left one bicyclist dead and two others severely injured.

According to the HBPD, the incident took place near the intersection of Pacific Coast Highway and Newland Street.

Police responded at 6:47 a.m. and found three adult male cyclists in the roadway. One was pronounced

dead at the scene and the others taken to local hospitals.

The investigation showed that a gold 2006 Mercedes E-class car struck the cyclists as they rode in the bike lane. The driver was identified as Amber Calderon, 43, of Long Beach. She was arrested about half-mile away from the scene, where she had eventually stopped.

She was arrested for gross vehicular manslaughter, felony hit-and-run, felony driving under the influence and possession of narcotics.

The bicyclist who suffered fatal injuries was identified as Eric John Williams, 45, of Garden

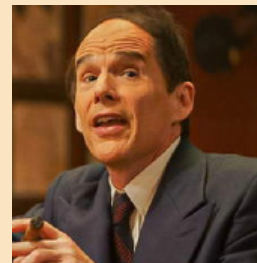

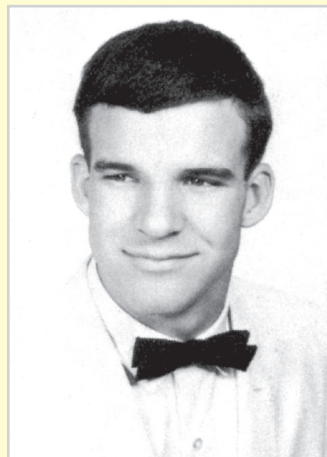

# Trump: the U.S. Owes Him \$230M

*Says he would donate money that he received*

About \$230 million is owed to President Donald Trump from the federal government ... according to Trump.

The Associated Press reported that he spoke in reference to a published report that said that he was seeking about \$230 million in damages related to previous investigations including a 2022 search of his property looking for classified documents and a separate inquiry into alleged ties between Russia and his 2016 presidential efforts.

In response to a reporter's question, he said that he didn't know the specific amount of the damages he was seeking, but "it's

interesting, 'cause I'm the one who makes the decision, right? That decisions would have to go across my desk."

He promised he would donate any of that taxpayer money or use it to help build a new ballroom at the White House.

## Attacks on 'drug vessels' continuing; 32 people have been killed in Caribbean

The U.S. military is continuing to attack boats in the Caribbean Sea that are alleged to be involved in smuggling drugs for narcotics cartels or criminal gangs.

The New York Times is reporting that these attacks have killed at least 32 people, most of them allegedly from Venezuela. The most recent incident on Oct. 17 involved alleged members of the ELN Marxist group designated

as "terrorists" in 1997.

The Trump administration is considering these actions to be "national self-defense" because of high-overdose deaths in the U.S. Some critics have questioned the legality of the attacks in international water that don't offer those targeted a chance to surrender or submit to a search. Nicholas Maduro, president of Venezuela, called the U.S. actions a "heinous crime."

## Most American citizens are unhappy with both U.S. political parties

The American public is unhappy with both major political parties according to a new Gallup Poll. United Press International reports that "favorability" of Republicans have decreased from 43 percent to 40 percent and Democrats from 42 percent to 37 percent from a year ago. Gallup noted that since 2020 half or more of respondents

have expressed "unfavorable" opinions about both parties. Republicans scored their party highest on fiscal policy. Democrats scored highest on abortion, health care, environmental and civil rights issues. The poll also indicated that the U.S. Supreme Court's popularity was near an all-time low and was "too conservative."

## 'Blue Moon' is Poignant, Funny

Ethan Hawke  
has never been  
better on screen

For a filmmaker once synonymous with slackerdom, Richard Linklater has proven to be one of the most prodigious and consistently excellent American filmmakers. A small but rich vein of the two dozen features he's made have been portraits of artists, including "Me and Orson Welles" and, if you like, "School of Rock."

This fall brings two more, one set at the dawn of a great career ("Nouvelle Vague," about Jean-Luc Godard and the birth of the French New Wave) and another on the cusp of its tragic end: "Blue Moon," about lyricist Lorenz Hart. Both are, in their way, joyous celebrations of brilliant, stubbornly uncompromising creative visionaries. And both are a grand time at the movies.

"Blue Moon," the first to arrive of the two, is one of the more sheerly delightful movies of the year. It takes place at Sardi's, in New York, on March 31, 1943. Down the street, "Oklahoma!" is premiering, a debut that for Hart (Ethan Hawke) stings. His long-time collaborator, the composer Richard Rodgers, has made it not with Hart but with his new songwriting partner, Oscar Hammerstein II. Six months from this night, Hart will die from pneumonia after spending a cold night passed out outside an 8th Avenue bar. He was 48.

But while Broadway's focus is on "Oklahoma!" ours is on Larry, as everyone calls him. He's holding court at Sardi's before Rodgers (Andrew Scott) and the "Oklahoma!" crowd rushes in. There, he is regaling Eddie the bartender (Bobby Cannavale) and a few others (including E.B. White, played by Patrick Ken-

nedy) in a free-flowing monologue, as he tries to resist the glass of whiskey on the bar, laments the imminent sensation of "Oklahoma!" and waxes poetic about some of his best lines.

"I've written a handful of words that are going to cheat death," says Larry. Hart's best work included American songbook standards like "My Funny Valentine," "The Lady Is a Tramp," "Bewitched, Bothered and Bewildered" and, of course, "Blue Moon."

But his appreciation for language goes far beyond himself. As much as he does a warm sip of bourbon, Larry savors any good quip, turn of phrase or mot juste. His favorite quote from "Casablanca," for example, is a telling one: "Nobody ever loved me that much." Larry adores the movie and, in particular, Bogart, whom, he notes, is both short and a leading man. "Which proves you can be both," Hart says.

Larry is, himself, diminu-

tive, with greasy strands of hair combed over his bald head. The physical transformation for Hawke is a little extreme and potentially distracting. There's little superficial in the role — including that Hart was a closeted gay man — that screams Hawke. Yet the actor has simply never been better. Hawke's Larry is a magnetic raconteur and an increasingly desperate has-been whose last-ditch attempts to ingratiate himself to Rodgers are limited as much by his excessive drinking as his refusal to hold his tongue. He is, to put it simply,

extraordinarily good company. "Oklahoma!" Larry realizes, is going to be performed from that moment "until Doomsday."

Even that exclamation point irks him. But more than that, the success of "Oklahoma!" — a musical Larry deems a "fraudulent" portrait of America — casts his sorry situation in a poignant light. This is the dawn of a mainstream Americana that doesn't have room for an uncon-

Once Shohei Ohtani homered for the third time — shortly after wrapping up his six scoreless innings on the mound — the superlatives began in earnest.

\* Best baseball performance of all time?

\*Best sports performance, pe-

riod?

\* Pinnacle of overall human achievement?

That last one is perhaps over the top, but the first two questions are worth exploring. In Game 4 of the NL Championship Series on Friday night,

Ohtani became the third player ever to hit three homers in a game in which he was a starting pitcher.

He also became the only person since at least 1906 to reach double digits in both total bases at the plate (12) and strikeouts on the mound (10).

To put his performance in more simplistic terms: There are three main components to baseball — pitching, hitting and fielding.

Ohtani pitched for two-thirds of the game and allowed the fewest runs possible. He had four opportunities at the plate and did the best thing possible in three of them. The other was a walk.

It would have been hard for him to do any better unless he pitched more innings — or maybe played in the outfield and robbed a couple homers.

When Don Larsen threw his perfect game for the New York Yankees during the 1956 World Series, he dominated on the mound only. And it wasn't for lack of opportunity. He went 0 for 2 with a sacrifice at the plate that day, according to Baseball Reference.

As baseball has evolved, good pitching and good hitting have become mutually exclusive. It's simply too hard for one player to excel at both at the big league

level. Or so we thought. Then Ohtani came along.

Wilt Chamberlain once scored 100 points in a game. Carli Lloyd had a hat trick in the first 16 minutes of a World Cup final. Secretariat's 31-length win at the Belmont was so jaw dropping even non-horse racing fans can understand the enormity of it. You could argue those three — or even Larsen — were more dominant on those days than Ohtani. But their performances didn't combine two increasingly incompatible skills in such a wondrous way.

### What's comparable?

Bill Russell once had 30 points and 40 rebounds in Game 7 of the NBA Finals — but again, there's always been a fair amount of overlap between great scorers and great rebounders. There was a time when big men stayed around the basket and guards shot jumpers, but now even centers can shoot 3-pointers and rack up assists. In basketball, that versatility is expected.

ventional man like Larry or his blue songs.

That makes this night at Sardi's a bittersweet salvation and a tender eulogy. Larry has an audience of only a few, but they're a fine crew (Cannavale is perfect) and their quiet, quip-filled toasts have an abiding warmth. On the outskirts of this group is Elizabeth Weiland (Margaret Qualley), a 20-year-old Yale

student with whom Larry is infatuated. To others, Larry's obsession seems incongruous with his sexuality, but he retorts that he "drinks beauty wherever he finds it."

Robert Kaplow, whose novel "Me and Orson Welles" was the basis of Linklater's film, drew from the real-life correspondence between Hart and Weiland for his script to "Blue Moon." In the film, Elizabeth is ambitious and busy mingling with the "Oklahoma!" party. That she's destined to join them, not Larry, is obvious to us. But his oblivious, irrational hope is one of the reasons to love him. Linklater's "Nouvelle Vague" is a wider story that, while the

focus is on Godard, makes room for all the central characters of the New Wave. It's a teeming movie, bursting at the seams with personalities. "Blue Moon," though, is a solo act.

And a magnificent one, at that. In its finest moments, Linklater's film pays homage not just to Hart but to all the forgotten writers who couldn't cheat death, but could tell one heck of a yarn.

their Super Bowl-winning season in 2021.

The most recent time he threw five touchdowns in a game was on Thanksgiving in 2015 in Detroit's 45-14 win over the Eagles.

On Sunday, he had little trouble with Jacksonville's defense by connecting with Davante Adams for three scores at the iconic home of English soccer. Stafford, who has thrown 12 touchdowns with no interceptions in his past four games, also connected with rookie receiver Konata Mumpfield and rookie tight end Terrance Ferguson in the London rout.

Stafford and Adams found the right time to connect because Puka Nacua missed the game with an ankle injury.

"We saw a few opportune moments to go and take advantage of some 1-on-1s," said Adams, who noted that he and Stafford had been exchanging extra text messages in recent weeks and "talking through certain things."

Adams became the second player to score three touchdowns in an international game. The NFL said the first was Mercedes Lewis, who had three in Jacksonville's 44-7 win over the Ravens at Wembley in 2017.

Adams, who caught two touchdown passes in the first half, then added a third on a 1-yard jump ball that sent Jags fans to the exits.

Stafford completed 21 of 33 passes for 182 yards. Jags quarterback Trevor Lawrence finished 23 of 48 for 296 yards and the touchdown pass to Hunter. In 2014, Stafford engineered Detroit's 22-21 comeback win

over the Falcons after trailing 21-0 at halftime.

"It's a blast. Sometimes travel is tough, but once you get out here, the fans are great, people are great," the 37-year-old quarterback said.

The Jaguars allowed seven sacks and committed 13 penalties for 119 yards.

"I'm not going to stand up here and blame these players, it starts with me," Jags coach Liam Coen said.

"You wouldn't have guessed that we were here for a week, prepared, ready to go play in this atmosphere by looking at it in terms of the way we started the game."

The only highlight for the Jaguars (4-3) was rookie two-way star Travis Hunter getting his first NFL touchdown. It made the score 28-7 in the fourth quarter.

Hunter had his best day as a pro, catching eight passes for 101 yards and the score.

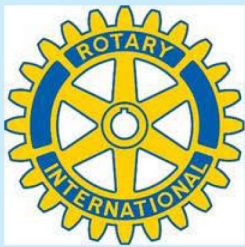

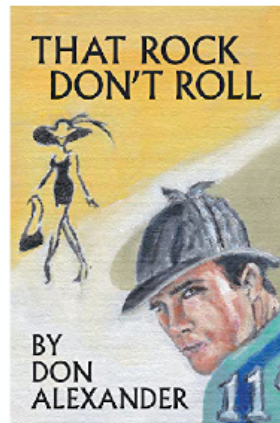
