New Looks For The Three Little Saigons

Contract is awarded for design ideas

A contract worth \$250,000 for the development of architectural and urban design guidelines for “Little Saigons” was approved by the Garden Grove City Council on Tuesday night. The vote was 7-0.

Approved was a contract with Gensler, an architecture, design and planning firm to draft architectural and urban design guidelines for the various “Little Saigons” in Garden Grove, Fountain Valley and Santa Ana.

Funding comes from the state Community Economic Resilience Fund.

The idea is to develop those areas as destinations for tourists and area residents.

Also on Tuesday, the Community Spotlight recognized the Garden Grove Unified School District for its “notable achievements and accomplishments in 2025.”

The GGUSD serves most of Garden Grove and parts of Anaheim, Cypress, Fountain Valley, Santa Ana, Stanton and Westminster.

Additionally, the council adopted a proclamation recognizing Jan. 13 as Korean American Day in Garden Grove.

The next meeting of the city council will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 27.

is that as of Aug. 1, 2025, landlords can increase rent by a maximum of 5 percent plus the regional Consumer Price Index, or 10 percent, whichever is lower. Landlords must provide at least 30 days written notice for rent increases of 10 percent or less, and 90 days notice of increases exceeding 10 percent.

However, there are some exemptions to those rules.

It's the shape of scary things to (potentially) come

Heavy Water Dept.; You may have read about or seen photos of the vandalism and other damage done to the interior of the Westminster Mall.

With the last major department store closed (except for Target, which – reportedly – is still going strong),

bad guys have been running wild inside the now-ghostly structure which was once the biggest enclosed shopping center in

Orange County.

Arriving at this sad moment is like watching a traffic accident in slow motion. Everyone could see it coming, and there was not enough collective energy to prevent it from happening.

This is only Part One. What becomes of restaurants and other stores in the mall parking lot, such as Outback and Best Buy? What kind of expensive resources must be devoted to keeping the former mall from becoming the worst kind of public relations or simply a locus for petty crime?

My larger point is not just to wring hands over this one problem. There's a (potentially) larger issue looming. Municipal costs in general are rising, in part because of the long-term costs of employee pensions. Some economists are concerned about the potential for a recession soon; the odds are about 50-50, I've read.

Smart cities, businesses and average Joes and Janes always need to keep their eyes on the horizon because – and here comes the mixed metaphor of the week – you never know when something is going to come up and bite you from behind.

Travel to NOLA with Roux in Hunt. Beach

The end of the year traditionally brings up the difficult question, "Where should I go to dinner for my birthday?" I generally attempt to dine at a different local restaurant each year with my family, preferably at a non-chain establishment. I always enjoy trying new places, but with a vegetarian in my midst and me being a card-carrying carnivore, sometimes finding a restaurant that hits the sweet spot for everyone can be a mite difficult. Luckily, I succeeded this year when I rolled the dice and dined for the first time at Roux Seafood Kitchen in Huntington Beach. Since I was craving a good steak and being that I am also a

fan of Cajun cuisine, the combination of Roux's 16-ounce ribeye (for only \$29.00) and the opportunity to savor some New Orleans gumbo as an appetizer was too good to pass up. The gumbo is stocked with plenty of shrimp, chicken, hot sausage, andouille, and okra, and was very tasty and a tad spicy, thanks to that hot sausage. (Roux does allow you to adjust

the level of spiciness in their dishes to your taste.) The steak was juicy and cooked perfectly (medium rare), and I added five large prawns to my meal for an additional \$8.00. The prawns were grilled to perfection and bursting with flavor, as was my side dish of garlic noodles. (Other sides include french fries, red roasted

No Inquiry into Minn. Fatal Shooting

Protester killed by ICE agent in disputed action

The killing of a woman by a federal Immigration Customs Enforcement officer in Minneapolis doesn't justify a criminal civil rights investigation, according to the U.S. Department of Justice.

The Associated Press reports that while an investigation by the FBI is underway, the Civil Rights Division of the DOJ won't be involved in looking into the death of Renee Good.

Deputy District Attorney Todd Blanche issued a statement, reading, "there is currently no basis for a criminal civil rights investigation."

Good was shot by ICE agent

Jonathan Ross on Jan. 7 in Minneapolis. She was fatally shot while in a van near activity by ICE.

Federal authorities claim she

was trying to strike agents with her vehicle; videotape of the incident appears to challenge that contention, says the AP. A half-dozen federal prosecutors

in the DOJ resigned on Tuesday in protest over the department's handling of the case, according to The New York Times.

High court may support transgender sports bans

In a pair of cases in which state laws ban transgender athletes from participating in girls and women's sports, the U.S. Supreme Court on Tuesday appeared ready to uphold such laws in place in West Virginia and Idaho and 25 other states.

The New York Times reports that – based on the questions during a hearing on Tuesday – the three liberal justices – questioned the fair-

ness of the laws, while the other six justices leaned on the fact that federal law has a long-standing policy of supporting separate sports teams for males and females to ensure fair competition.

The high court, in the past, has protected the rights of transgender employees, but Chief Justice John Roberts suggested that the principle didn't apply in sports.

Central Banks voice support for Fed Chair Jerome Powell

‘Dead Man’s’ Evoking ‘Dog Day’

Intense hostage drama in yet another bank

It plays a little loose with facts but the righteous rage of “Dog Day Afternoon” is present enough in Gus Van Sant’s “Dead Man’s Wire,” a based-on-a-true-tale hostage thriller that’s as deeply 1970s as it is contemporary.

In February 1977, Tony Kirsits walked into the Meridian Mortgage Company in downtown Indianapolis and took one of its executives, Dick Hall, hostage. Kirsits held a sawed-off shotgun to the back of Hall’s head and draped a wire around his neck that connected to the gun. If he moved too much, he would die.

The subsequent standoff moved to Kirsits’ apartment and eventually concluded in a live televised news conference. The whole ordeal received some renewed attention in a 2022 podcast dramatization starring Jon Hamm.

But in “Dead Man’s Wire,” starring Bill Skarsgård as Kirsits, these events are vividly brought to life by Van Sant. It’s been seven years since Van Sant directed, following 2018’s “Don’t Worry, He Won’t Get Far on Foot,” and one of the prevailing takeaways of his new film is that that’s too long of a break for a filmmaker of Van Sant’s caliber.

Working from a script by Austin Kolodney, the filmmaker of “My Own Private Idaho” and “Good Will Hunting” turns “Dead Man’s Wire” into not a period-piece time capsule but a bracingly relevant drama of outrage and inequality. Tony feels aggrieved by his mortgage company over a land deal the bank, he claims, blocked. We’re never

given many specifics, but at the same time, there’s little doubt in “Dead Man’s Wire” that Tony’s cause is just. His means might be desperate and abhorrent, but the movie is very definitely on his side.

That’s owed significantly to Skarsgård, who gives one of his finest and least adorned performances. While best known for films like “It,” “The Crow” and “Nosferatu,” here Skarsgård has little more than some green polyester and a very ’70s mustache to alter his looks. The straightforward, jittery intensity of his performance propels “Dead Man’s Wire.”

Yet Van Sant’s film aspires to be a larger ensemble drama, which it only partially succeeds at. Tony’s plight is far from a solitary one, as numerous threads suggest in Kolodney’s fast-paced script. First and foremost is Colman Domingo as a local DJ named Fred Temple. (If ever there were an actor suited, with a smooth baritone, to play a ’70s radio DJ, it’s Domingo.) Tony, a fan, calls Fred to air his demands. But it’s

not just a media outlet for him. Fred touts himself as “the voice of the people.”

Something similar could be said of Tony, who rapidly emerges as a kind of folk hero. As much as he tortures his hostage (a very good Dacre Montgomery), he’s kind to the police officers surrounding him. And as he and Dick spend more time together, Dick emerges as a kind of victim, himself. It’s his father’s bank, and when Tony gets M.L. Hall (Al Pacino) on the phone, he sounds painfully insensitive, sooner ready to sacrifice his son than acknowledge any wrongdoing.

Pacino’s presence in “Dead Man’s Wire” is a nod to “Dog


Day Afternoon,” a movie that may be far better — but, then again, that’s true of most films in comparison to Sidney Lumet’s unsurpassed 1975 classic. Still, Van Sant’s film bears some of the same rage and disillusionment with the meatgrinder of capitalism as “Dog Day.”

There’s also a telling, if not entirely successful subplot of a local TV news reporter (Myha’la) struggling against stereotypes. Even when she gets the goods on the unspooling news story, the way her producer says to “chop it up” and put it on air

Aaron Rodgers: time to step down before downfall

At first, I liked Aaron Rodgers. He was the star of the Midwest and a rival with Tom Brady for the honorific of "GOAT," meaning "Greatest of All Time." Then I disliked Aaron Rodgers for some of the offensive (and downright wacky things) things he said.

Now, I kind of pity him.

Watching him play on Sunday for the Steelers against the Texans his new acronym looks like OTH (Over the Hill.) in a 30-6 loss.

He completed just 17 of 33 passes, was intercepted once and sacked four times. His QBR (Quarterback Rating) was 14.3, which is almost invisible. His arm is still competitive, but the rest of his 47-year-old body is as mobile as my 1964 Plymouth Valiant was, which contributed to getting him dumped on his duff four times.

Aaron is on his Farewell Tour, first being traded to the Jets for the 2023 season where he was injured—and out for almost half of the season—on the team's first series of the first game.

He had a pretty good 2024 season for the 5-12 Jets. But he reportedly didn't get along well with .. well ... a lot of people and was released. From there it was on to the Pittsburgh Steelers where he led his new team to the NFC North title. That's a pretty nice way to end a career, despite the forgettable finale. Four NFL Player of the Year awards and one Super Bowl is a heck of a resume.

Aaron, let's remember you for your days in Wisconsin, terrifying defenses and making cool TV commercials, not hobbling onto the field for whichever team is placing nostalgia ahead of the future. And so should you.

No Doubt With Number 9

Stafford lifts Rams to a late playoff win

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Puka Nacua stepped into the huddle with the Los Angeles Rams trailing by four with 2:38 left, the home crowd roaring and his team's season on the line. He never thought twice about losing.

"Never a doubt — No. 9 is with us," Nacau said with a wide smile in reference to the team's 37-year-old All-Pro quarterback, Matthew Stafford.

Stafford calmly led the Rams 71 yards by completing 6 of 7 passes — the only incompleteness coming on a drop by Davante Adams — before capping it with a perfectly-placed 19-yard touchdown pass to Colby Parkinson with 38 seconds left, lifting the Rams to a dramatic, come-from-behind 34-31 win over the Carolina Panthers in the opening game of the NFL playoffs on Saturday.

Stafford finished 24 of 42 for 304 yards with three touchdown passes and an interception, while Nacua had 10 receptions for 111 yards and two total touchdowns as the Rams (13-5), who were 10 1/2-point favor-

ites, advanced to the divisional round.

"You see him out there, he just has the best composure of anyone I have ever seen," Parkinson said. "He knows that we are going to go make it happen and we completely trust him. ... I knew he was going to have to throw a back-shoulder ball — and that was a perfect ball. Like perfect. It couldn't have been placed any better."

Stafford credited his calmness to his 17 years of NFL experience.

"I have been in that spot a lot in my life — and I love that spot," Stafford said. "I would rather be me having to go out there with our offense and do it then watch from the sideline. You can make it stressful or you can make it calm and collected, and think the latter is what we were today."

Bryce Young threw for 264 yards and a touchdown and ran for another score for Carolina (8-10), which finished its sec-

Some doubt in Chargers' minds

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — Chargers coach Jim Harbaugh still believes he can take his team all the way. Quarterback Justin Herbert isn't so sure. After a 16-3 loss to New England in the wild-card round of the NFL playoffs on Sunday night, Harbaugh said he told the team, "Those that stay will be

champions."

"Not looking at this as an end," he said in a somber postgame news conference that undermined his professed optimism. "It's another beginning."

But when Herbert followed his coach to the podium, he couldn't smile through his third playoff loss in as many tries. The Chargers have not claimed

a postseason victory since winning in the wild-card round in 2018. (They lost to the Patriots the following week.)

Asked if he was still confident that he could make a playoff run or even win one postseason game, Herbert said, "I don't know."

"I haven't figured it out yet, and it hasn't happened," he said. "So we'll have to re-evaluate it

ond season under coach Dave Canales by losing four of its final five games.

Jalen Coker had career highs with nine receptions for 134 yards with a touchdown and Chuba Hubbard ran for 46 yards and two touchdowns as the Panthers lost in their first playoff appearance since the 2017 season.

"There is such a mix of emotions right now in the locker room, from guys being proud of what we accomplished and where we got, to being sick about the opportunity that was right there in front of us," Canales said. "And that is going to sting."

The Panthers, who beat the Rams 31-28 on this same field six weeks ago, fell behind 14-0 early but stormed back to take a 24-20 lead on Hubbard's second touchdown of the run game early in the fourth quarter.

Stafford, who was selected as an All-Pro earlier in the day, led the Rams back down on the field and found Kyren Williams for a 13-yard touchdown to regain the lead.

Los Angeles appeared to be in charge after getting a stop on defense, giving Stafford the ball back.

But a holding penalty put the Rams behind the sticks and forced a punt, which Isaiah Simmons blocked to set the Panthers up the Rams 30. Four plays later, Young found Coker in the left corner of the end zone for a 7-yard touchdown to give Carolina a 31-27 lead with 2:39 left, sending the crowd into a frenzy.

But the celebrations quickly turned to silence after Stafford gave the Rams the lead again. Carolina's last attempt to move into field-goal range ended when Jimmy Horn dropped a fourth-down pass from Young.

and see what happens."

A year after a 32-12 loss to Houston in which Herbert completed less than 45% of his passes and was intercepted four times, the 2020 Offensive Rookie of the Year led the Chargers to just a single field goal. He completed 19 of 31 passes for 159 yards and was the team's leading rusher, scrambling 10 times for 57 yards.

But he was also sacked six

times, losing 39 yards.

The Chargers only got deep into Patriots territory twice — the first time in the first quarter when Daiyan Henley intercepted a tipped pass from Drake Maye and set up the Los Angeles offense at the New England 10. The drive stalled at the 2, Harbaugh went for it on fourth down, and Herbert's pass fell incomplete.

"We just have to be able to score and we didn't do that today," the quarterback said. "That's on us as an offense. When we get those opportunities we have to do everything we can to get ball in the end zone, and we let the defense down today."

Among the problems: The best team in the NFL on third

down this season, converting 115 times, went 1 for 10 on Sunday night, and 1 for 3 on fourth down. (The only successful third-down conversion was a 1-yard QB sneak that was initially ruled short but was overturned on replay to give Los Angeles the first down.)

It was the second straight week the Chargers failed to score a touchdown. Asked if offensive coordinator Greg Roman was the right person to be calling plays, Harbaugh said, "Right now I don't have the answers."

"We're going to look at that, at everything," he said. "It really falls on me that we weren't at our best tonight. I don't have the answers. I wish I did. We'll work hard. It'll be a new beginning."

Herbert broke a bone in his left — non-throwing — hand in a Nov. 30 victory over the Raiders, but he played through the injury and led Los Angeles to four straight wins. The Chargers lost to Houston in Week 17, then Herbert sat out the regular-season finale to heal.



potatoes, rice, white rice and mixed vegetables.)

My family tried various entrées and appetizers, including the Mardi Gras pasta (sautéed Cajun trinity, large prawns, andouille sausage, hot sausage, jalapeño, and chicken in a tomato cream sauce), which my nephew described as the best he's ever tasted; the shrimp étouffée, which looked simply delicious; a bountiful house salad (with Granny Smith apples, dried cranberries, candy cashews, and shaved parmesan) and—wait for it—vegetable egg rolls. (There is a bit of an Asian twist to some of the dishes at Roux.)

(By the way, in case you're curious as to what the aforementioned "Cajun trinity" is, it's described by Wikipedia as the "essential flavor base in

Louisiana cooking, consisting of diced onions, green bell peppers, and celery." It even has its own Wikipedia page—who knew?)

The prices are extremely reasonable (especially given the amount of food you get) and the service was impeccable—our server Nathan was attentive and on top of things without being overbearing.

Overall, Roux provided a great dining experience and I plan on returning soon to try the jambalaya and the shrimp po-boy sandwich.

Roux also offers various seafood boils, including crab legs, crawfish, clams, mussels, and shrimp, as well as fried seafood and live lobster.

makes it clear: Whatever Tony is rebelling against, it's him, not his plight, that will be served up on a prime-time plate.

It doesn't take recent similar cases of national fascination, such as Luigi Mangione, charged with killing a healthcare executive, to see contemporary echoes of Kirsits' tale.

The real story is more complicated and less metaphor-ready, of course, than the movie, which detracts some from the film's gritty sense of verisimilitude.

Staying closer to the truth might have produced a more dynamic movie.

But "Dead Man's Wire" still works. In the film, Tony's demands are \$5 million and an apology.

It's clear the latter means more to him than the money. The tragedy in "Dead Man's Wire" is just how elusive "I'm sorry" can be.
