After a long and involved discussion and argument, the Garden Grove City Council shifted course Tuesday night on a proposed smoking ban in city parks and voted to table the matter for six months.

The vote was 4-2, with Mayor Stephanie Klopfenstein, Mayor Pro Tem George Brietigam and councilmembers Cindy Ngoc Tran and Joe DoVinh in favor and councilmembers Yesenia Muneton and Ariana Arastegui opposed. Councilmember Philip Nguyen was absent.

In September of 2025, the council voted 5-0 with Brietigam absent and DoVinh abstaining to direct the city attorney to bring back a proposed ordinance to ban the smoking of tobacco and other

Suspect in
Fatal Drive-by
Is Held in Jail

Extradited from Vietnam

Last July in Stanton, what prosecutors called "a brazen broad daylight" drive-by shooting in Stanton took the life of a 15-year-boy.

Now one of the persons accused in the homicide is back in Orange County after being extradited from Vietnam to where he fled following the incident.

Quoc-Bao Viet Le, 21 is being held in Orange County Jail to face charges of murder and conspiracy to commit murder according to the Orange County District Attorney's office.

He was charged in July with co-defendants Danny Huynh, 24, Troy Quang Lu, 21 and Ali Ibrahim Al-souqi, 21, who is a fugitive believed to be in Jordan.

Le faces a maximum



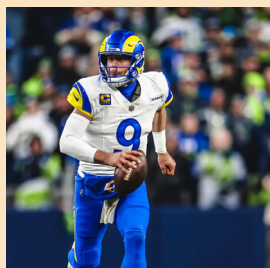

sentence of 50 years to life imprisonment if convicted on all counts, in the murder of Samuel Vidal, 15, and the wounding of Vidal's 13-year-old friend.

Raise to \$346,433 for Lisa Kim

Garden Grove City Manager Lisa Kim will be getting a raise said to be 7.5 percent, bringing her annual salary to \$346,433.

The city council approved the increase in her compensation at Tuesday night's meeting by a 6-0 vote, with Councilmem-

ber Philip Nguyen absent.

She will also get a lump sum of 80 hours of vacation beginning in March 2026 and every March thereafter.

All the council members voiced their praise for

Kim, who's served more than two years in the post, after Scott Stiles left to take a city manager position in Palm Springs.

The raise was justified by "Ms. Kim's sustained performance and executive leadership," accord-

products – including “vaping” from city parks and adjacent parking lots.

“The residents of Garden Grove deserve parks with clean air,” Muneton said at the time. But

two supporters – Klopfenstein and Tran – switched sides on Tuesday.

“I’m not really against this,” said Brietigam, but suggested that the ordinance might not be needed because smoking near children’s play areas is already banned by state law and provisions about littering tobacco products were already covered by anti-littering ordinances.

DoVinh was the loudest voice in opposition, suggesting that such a ban might lead to lawsuits from the American Civil Liberties Union and widespread public pushback.

He said he wanted to see the council make revisions – perhaps two or three times – in the proposed ordinance, which he ridiculed for its legal language.

Bigger can be better, but only to a certain point

Divided We Fall Dept?.

I saw an opinion piece in an area newspaper (yes, they still exist) about the alleged waste of taxpayers cash in having all these “little” cities and school districts in Orange County.

About 25 years ago (I don’t

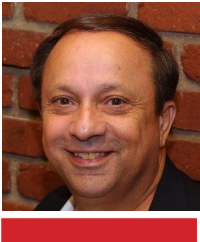
look it, do I?) there was talk about the notion of consolidating such agencies, and even some speculation about how that might be done.

For example, at that time, Stanton was struggling and it was suggested that the smart thing to do would be to disincorporate and divide it into two pieces, with the northern half – with, say Cerritos Avenue as the dividing line – going to Anaheim, and the southern half going to Garden Grove.

Villa Park, just a pocket-sized community full of houses I could never afford to buy, would be absorbed by Orange. Midway City (not actually a city, but an unincorporated county “island”) would become part of Westminster and on and on.

Consolidation has its merits, but also its drawbacks. Bigger cities can do more – usually – but their staff (and costs) tend to expand the bigger they get. It is also not unheard of that some smaller parts of a bigger city get less love than the more affluent and influential parts. Ask anyone who lives in the Wilmington district of Los Angeles how much attention City Hall lavishes on them.

A city manager whom I respect once told me that in

Police, store employees turn a heist into a bust

Fighting crime isn’t just for police officers.

According to the Garden Grove Police Department, three adult suspects were arrested Monday for allegedly stealing a computer from the Costco store at Main Street and Garden Grove Boulevard, using fake/homemade receipts.

Costco employees recognized the fraud, say police, and quickly contacted the GGPD with the description and license plate number of the suspect vehicle.

Officers spotted the vehicle, made a traffic stop and effected the arrest of the three men.

Further investigation of the incident, according to police, indicates the same group may have used similar tactics at other Costco’s and other retail stores in the area based on evidence found during the arrest.

History Minute

Hey, which street am I on now?

Across Orange County, over time cities have often not agreed on what their streets should be named. You can be driving along on Smith Street and find – suddenly – you are on Jones Avenue. Some examples:

- Garden Grove Boulevard east of the Santa Ana River becomes Memory Lane;
- Goldenwest Street north of Garden Grove Boulevard becomes Knott Street;
- Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove becomes Westminster Boulevard when you enter Westminster.
- Anaheim Boulevard, when you leave Anaheim, becomes Haster Street when you enter Garden Grove.
- And for you local history buffs, what is now Euclid Street in Garden Grove was called The Anaheim Road, and then The Euclid and finally Euclid Street and what is now Garden Grove Boulevard was once referred to as Ocean Boulevard.

Suspect is arrested for homicide in Fullerton

A 27-year-old Fullerton man has been arrested for the murder of another man on Saturday in Fullerton.

According to the FPD, the incident began on Saturday at about 8:52 p.m. when police received a 9-1-1 call reporting that a man had been stabbed and “possibly” run over by a motor vehicle in the area of South Euclid Street and West Baker Avenue.

Responding officers found a male victim in the roadway suffering from what appeared to be multiple stab wounds. Medical aid was rendered by the Fullerton Fire Department, but the man was pronounced dead at the scene.

A description of the suspect was broadcast to neighboring law enforcement agencies. The Buena Park Police Department responded to a hit-and-run accident and detained a suspect.

After an investigation it was determined that the man detained by BPPD was the suspect being sought in the incident in Fullerton.

Francisco Soriano was arrested and booked into the FPD jail for murder. The identity of the victim has not been released.

Inquiry Is Promised Into Shooting

Trump vows an 'honorable' investigation

A "very honorable and honest investigation was promised" by President Donald Trump on Tuesday in reference to the killing of Alex Pretti in Minneapolis by federal agents.

The New York Times is reporting that he also suggested that he "might de-escalate" the aggressive operation in Minnesota.

A man attacked Representative Ihan Omar during a town meeting on the immigration enforcement crisis, spraying her with a "strong-smelling liquid." He was hustled away by security and arrested.

In a related story, a preliminary review by U.S. Customs and Border Protection's internal staff

concluded that Alex Pretti, who was shot by two federal officers after resisting arrest, was not

brandishing a weapon, as claimed earlier by the Department of Homeland Security, saying that

Pretti "wanted to do maximum damage and massacre law enforcement."

Minn. Gov. Tim Walz met with Border Czar Homan

In the wake of two fatal shootings of protestors by federal immigration enforcement agents, Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz met with Tom Homan, in charge of President Donald Trump's campaign to combat illegal immigration.

According to United Press International, the two agreed to continue their talks. They talked about mutual goals such as "impartial"

investigations of the shootings.

Trump said that Homan "has not been involved in that area but knows and likes many of the people there. Tom is tough but fair and will report directly to me."

Walz said he had had a "productive call" with Trump and said the president "agreed to look into reducing the number of federal agents in Minnesota."

Under the Constitution, in a removal of a high official, the House makes the accusation of misconduct and the Senate serves as jury. Although Republicans control both houses at present, the midterm elections could give Democrats an opportunity to retake the House and potentially impeach Noem.

'99-Year Old Man': Tribute to Genius

Retrospective on life, work of Mel Brooks

It's not often we get to pay tribute, in full, to our giants while they're still with us. But in "Mel Brooks: The 99 Year Old Man!" Judd Apatow dutifully and affectionately celebrates the laugh-filled life of a comedy legend who's still here to tell the story — and the jokes — himself.

"The 99 Year Old Man," which debuts Thursday in two parts on HBO and HBO Max, is a big-hearted tribute to Brooks, an indefatigable comic force who did more than most anyone to lighten the mood of the 20th century. At 99 (he'll turn 100 in June), Brooks remains a remarkably great raconteur.

One of the cleverest tricks by directors Apatow and Michael Bonfiglio is playing some of Brooks' stories — like a memorable lunch with Cary Grant — across not just his sit-down interviews with them, but over multiple talk show appearances. He's been telling some of these jokes for decades. It doesn't matter. They're still good.

"The 99 Year Old Man" takes the whole life in: the formative childhood in Brooklyn; the Sid Caesar-aided entry to "Your Show of Shows"; the lifelong friendship with Carl Reiner; the 2000 Year Old Man sketches;

"The Producers"; the marriage to Anne Bancroft; "Blazing Saddles," and beyond.

But if there's an ongoing question in "The 99 Year Old Man," it's posed early by Apatow, who appears on-screen as Brooks' interviewer. Do people really know who he is? "No," Brooks answers straightaway.

That might sound like an odd answer for someone who has so unabashedly lived nearly a

century in the public eye. Yet Brooks has been such a non-stop performer that it can sometimes be difficult to see where the schtick ends and the self begins. One person describes Brooks, as a newborn, thinking the delivery doctor smacking him on the rear was applause. In an earlier clip, an interviewer laments Brooks' apparent lack of introspection.

He replies that he's merely "a coalescence of vapor." When Brooks gave his Oscar speech, for the screenplay to "The Producers," he said he would speak from the heart: "Ba-bum, ba-bum."

So is what's inside Brooks just jokes? I'd say — and I think this is what makes "The 99 Year Old Man" not just an exhaustive documentary but a moving and even stirring one — it's more the opposite. Brooks' comedy, from the 2000 Year Old Man to "History of the World, Part I," has always derived from something deeper, more personal and intrinsically Jewish than its slapstick qualities sometimes have

suggested.

"Comedy is a sensational and sometimes spectacular political weapon," Brooks says in the film.

There are countless big names who come in to speak to Brooks' boldness as a comedian, among them Dave Chappelle, Jerry Seinfeld, Sarah Silverman, Adam Sandler and Conan O'Brien. But I'm tempted to think Brooks' legacy is in how, for him, life and comedy are one: pulse and punchline together.

You can see that in Brooks' decades of marriage with Bancroft, who describes, every time her husband came home as

like a party. And you can see it in Brooks' undying friendship with Reiner. After the deaths of their wives, the two friends would nightly meet to eat deli sandwiches and watch old movies. Reiner once recalled they'd watch films "with lines like 'Secure the perimeter!'"

Bancroft died in 2005 and Reiner in 2020. Any life that stretches as long as Brooks' takes on an elegiac quality. Appearing in the documentary, before their deaths, are both Rob Reiner and

Close, But They Fell Short

Stafford and McVay mourn missed chances

SEATTLE (AP) — Sean McVay had zero interest in discussing whether Matthew Stafford, his soon-to-be 38-year-old quarterback, will be back for the Los Angeles Rams next year.

McVay had a bit more to say about how his team came up short against the Seattle Seahawks yet again on Sunday, losing 31-27 in the NFC championship game.

The Rams lost twice in a two-month span at Seattle, falling 38-37 in December when the Seahawks converted two 2-point conversions in regulation and a third in overtime.

This loss denied the Rams a chance of winning the franchise's third Super Bowl and the second and five years for McVay and Stafford.

"I'm never really short on words, and I am right now," McVay said. "It's tough, but this is sports, and you got to be able to deal with it."

Aside from one questionable decision — the Rams going for it on fourth-and-4 at the Seattle 6 with 4:59 remaining while trailing by four — McVay had his team humming as usual.

The Rams totaled 479 yards of offense to 396 for the Seahawks. Stafford, an MVP finalist, completed 22 of 35 passes for 374 yards and three touchdowns.

Before that critical fourth-down play, McVay raced down the sideline, looking like he might call timeout. But he didn't, and Devon Witherspoon broke up Stafford pass in the end zone.

"I thought about it, and didn't decide to do it," McVay said. "Obviously it didn't work out for us. But I thought our guys played well. There were a lot of things

that we got a lot of what we wanted today. Felt really good about the way that our guys executed, specifically on the offensive side. And you know, that was a situation where we just kind of came up short."

In the third quarter, the Rams had their latest of several special-teams miscues this season when Xavier Smith muffed a punt and Seattle recovered.

On the next play, Sam Darnold connected with Jake Bobo for a 17-yard touchdown and a 24-13

lead.

Smith also juggled a punt earlier in the game.

"That one, it was costly," McVay said. "I love him. He's done a great job. ... But that was a tough one."

The Rams countered each time Seattle took a double-digit lead. The NFL's top-scoring offense put together consecutive touchdown drives after Smith's gaffe. Stafford found Davante Adams for a 2-yard touchdown and then connected with Puka Nacua for a 34-yard score.

"It was a battle," Stafford said. "The whole game wasn't like we were all just waiting for one play here or there. There's a million plays in a football game that can turn the tide, and we had our opportunity and didn't make it."

Had Stafford completed that

fourth-down pass, it could have been the sixth game-winning drive of his playoff career, and third this postseason.

Stafford guided Los Angeles past the Carolina Panthers in the wild-card round with a late TD pass to Colby Parkinson, and

then set up Harrison Mevis for a game-winning field goal against the Chicago Bears in the divisional round.

For much of Sunday, he got the better of the NFL's top-ranked scoring defense. But the Seahawks made a few more plays

at the end.

"Great football team we just played," Stafford said. "Feel like it's a great effort, really good football game, obviously we didn't come out on top. Tough pill to swallow at the moment."

Dodgers add Kyle Tucker to All-Star lineup

LOS ANGELES (AP) — With multiple offers in free agency, Kyle Tucker was ultimately swayed by the Los Angeles Dodgers' championship pedigree.

"It's a big decision, so you still got to weigh out everything," he said, "but this team and this city and the fanbase kind of makes it a little bit easier to make some decisions. That is just ultimately what we wanted to do is come here and be part of that and try to win another World Series."

Tucker signed a \$240 million,

four-year contract, choosing the two-time defending World Series champion Dodgers over the New York Mets and World Series runner-up Toronto Blue Jays. He can opt out after years two and three.

"Obviously, we started lower," joked Andrew Friedman, the Dodgers' president of baseball operations. "It doesn't mean that it has to be two, three, four

years here. It could be longer than that. For him to choose us when he had other longer term and other shorter term, I think speaks to the growth and progress that we've made on creating a destination spot."

Tucker gets a \$64 million signing bonus, of which \$54 million is payable on Feb. 15 and \$10 million on Feb. 1, 2027. He gets a \$1 million salary this year and \$55 million in 2027, and he has \$60 million player options for 2028 and 2029.

In each season from 2027-29, \$10 million is deferred. The deferred money from all years is payable in 10 equal installments each Dec. 1 from 2036-45.

He also gets a hotel suite on road trips.

Tucker's \$60 million average annual value is the second-highest in baseball history, without factoring in deferred money,

behind Shohei Ohtani's \$70 million in his 10-year deal with the Dodgers that runs through 2033. With the addition of Tucker's \$30 million in deferred money, Los Angeles owes \$1.0945 billion in deferred compensation to 10 players from 2028-47.

"There was really nobody that moved our World Series odds for 2026 more than Kyle Tucker," general manager Brandon Gomes said.

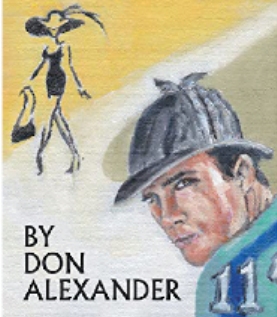
Tucker's signing reignited talk of management proposing a salary cap in collective bargaining after the Dodgers added yet another star to one of the sport's highest payrolls.

"We don't pay much attention to that because we operate within the rules and we do everything we can to put ourselves in the best position, both short term and long term, and we're not thinking about more macro things outside of that," Friedman said. "It is about how can we win as many games and put ourselves in the best position to win a championship in 2026 without really compromising ourselves out into the future and

his opinion, the maximum population size for a governable city is about 250,000 and no more.

By that measure, Anaheim (349k), Santa Ana (332k) and Irvine (306k) need to shed some weight. In the public interest I recommend that all of Anaheim south of Ball Road, for example, becomes part of Garden Grove.

That means we'd have to take on the Disneyland Resort, Angel Stadium and the Honda Center, but if the resulting tax revenue comes our way, I'll bet we'd be willing to take one for the team.
