

A Six-Month Extension on Rose Center

Current mgt. will remain through 2026

The drama that has been the story of the fate of the Westminster Rose Center will likely be extended a while longer.

At Wednesday's meeting, the Westminster City Council voted 5-0 to extend until the end of 2026 the agreement with the Friends of the Rose Center for operation of the facility, which includes a 419-seat theater and ballroom

in the Civic Center.

The council heard and voted to receive and file a status report on the process of processing proposals to manage the facility and develop it as a "multicultural center."

If the Friends of the Rose Center agree to the extension, that organization will continue to operate the facility through the end of the year, extending an agreement which would otherwise end on June 30.

"You can't rush the process," said Councilman Carlos Manzo.

The deadline for the sub-

regulating the keeping of pot-bellied pigs.

The animal is native to the Red River Delta of Vietnam and is kept as a pet, although in its past has been as raised for meat. Males can weigh as much as 110 lbs., with females at 105 lbs.

In 2007 the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations declared the “sus domesticus” to be an endangered species.

The proposed ordinance would limit the keeping of no more than two pot-bellied pigs in residential lots, provided they are not bred, are neutered, are tested and vaccinated for certain communicable diseases and restrained on a leash when removed from the premises.

Also, the premises where they are kept must be maintained in an odor-free, clean and sanitary manner and a permit is obtained for each animal.

Also on the agenda are Community Spotlights recognizing the Santiago High School Cheer team for winning the CIF Southern Section Division 4 championship and recognizing the city’s department of public works receiving the Tree City USA Growth Award.

The council will meet at 6:30 p.m. in its chambers in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave.

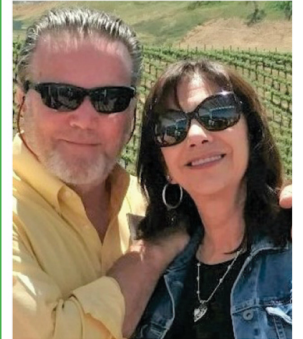

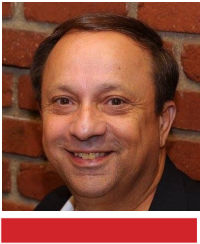

Divided council Ok'd 'brand' RFPs

They used to call themselves the united "MAGAnificent Seven," but at Tuesday's meeting, the members of the Huntington Beach City council were the majority of four and the minority of three.

At the session that reached

nearly to midnight, after considerable public debate and sometimes-heated council discussion, the council approved the creation of an ad hoc committee consisting of three council members to "review and make recommendations on request[s]

for proposals for the creative strategy, branding, merchandising, media, communications and film industry development systems."

In favor were Mayor Casey McKeon and Councilmembers Don Kennedy, Butch Twining and Pat Burns. Opposed were Councilmembers Chad Wil-

Stanton blaze hit apartments and garages

A three-alarm fire in Stanton on Wednesday morning struck an apartment complex, driving dozens of people from their homes.

According to the Orange County Fire Authority, the fire was reported at 11:14 a.m. in the 7500 block of Katella Avenue, near Western Avenue.

Arriving firefighters found a row of attached garages "heavily involved in fire," with flames reaching the attic of the apartment complex behind them.

OCFA crews launched an aggressive attack on both fires and ensured the residents were safe-

Investigation of Fed Chair Dropped

Critics say it was political prosecution

An investigation of Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell was dropped on Friday by the Justice Department, ending an effort widely criticized as politically motivated. The action sets the stage for the confirmation of a replacement of Powell, according to United Press International.

Attorney General Jeanine Pirro added that the Justice Department has asked the inspector general of the Federal Reserve to investigate cost overruns in remodeling of the Fed's headquarters building.

Pirro sought to have Powell

prosecuted for making allegedly false statements to Congress during testimony on the costs.

Critics of Pirro's actions say that she was angry with Powell for the threats came at the insistence of President Donald Trump, not lowering interest rates at his request.

Special Forces soldier held in betting on military operation

Teenage girl killed in gunfire at Louisiana shopping mall

Three of those wounded were senior students from Ascension Episcopal School, it was revealed in a Facebook post.

Well, 'Michael' Sounds Good

Too much hero worship in this biopic movie

"Michael" slides a sequin glove over the pop star's tarnished legacy, shrouding Michael Jackson's complications with a conventional biopic that, if you cover your ears, sounds great.

Antoine Fuqua's movie is sanctioned by Jackson's estate and its producers include the estate's executors. So it is, by its nature, a narrow, authorized perspective on Jackson. The film ends before the flood of allegations of sexual abuse of children, or Jackson's own acknowledgment of sleeping alongside kids. Jackson and his estate have long maintained his innocence. In his only criminal trial, in 2005, Jackson was acquitted.

"Michael" doesn't even subtly nod to these facts. It moonwalks right past them. The result is a kind of fantasy film, one that relives the extraordinary highs of Michael Jackson while turning a blind eye to the lows.

There's something understandably hard to resist about that. Who wouldn't love to forget all the bad that comes with Michael Jackson? "Billie Jean," alone, is good enough to give you amnesia. We're talking about one of the greatest song-and-dance entertainers of the 20th century. The connection he forged with millions shouldn't be taken for granted. And it can feel downright giddy to once again bask in Jackson's former glory — or, at least, an uncanny approximation of it by Jaafar Jackson, his nephew. But that also makes "Michael" as much a fairy tale as Peter Pan's Neverland.

"Michael" originally included scenes dealing with the sexual abuse allegations, but those were cut due to stipulations in an ear-

lier settlement. The finished film, scripted by John Logan ("Gladiator," "Aviator"), is largely structured as a father-son drama. In the film's early Gary, Indiana-set scenes, Joe Jackson (a typically compelling Colman Domingo) forcefully drills his children into becoming the Jackson 5 and whips young Michael (an excellent Juliano Krue Valdi) with his belt.

While "Michael" spans the Jackson 5 and "Off the Wall" and "Thriller," its through line is Michael's struggle for emancipation from his overbearing father and manager. In that way, it's quite similar to 2022's "Elvis," which likewise turned on the dynamic between Presley and the controlling Colonel Tom Parker. Similarly, the broad-strokes, play-the-hits biopic approach is very much at work in "Michael," produced by Graham King ("Bo-

hemian Rhapsody"). Fuqua, best known for muscular thrillers like "Training Day" and "The Equalizer," is maybe an unlikely pick for the task. But he cleverly staggers some scenes, like when young Michael first lays down a track in a recording studio. While his father looms outside and producers tell Michael not to shuffle his feet so much, Fuqua moves inside

the booth. We hear nothing but Michael's voice. The noise stops and there's just his pure, not-yet-corrupted vocal power, singing "Who's Lovin' You."

What happened to Jackson as he became an adult, many would

Fixing college sports: good luck with that

I think we have finally found an issue that can unite us all. Liberals and conservatives. The pious and the permissive. Left-handers and right-handers. Dogs and cats. Catsup and ketchup. The issue: college athletics is a mess. In fact, even the term is fudged-up. The impact of the transfer portal, the Name Image and Likeness policy which allows allegedly amateur “students” to make millions of dollars and impressively stretchable eligibility rules have changed “college athletics” into “athletic events that take place on a college campus or some other venue paid for

by television money featuring persons who at one time in their lives were enrolled in at least one college or university course. Exceptions may apply.”

President Donald Trump has taken up the cause of trying to reform “college sports,” but this is a tough climb. Should college athletes be paid by their school to play sports? The first reaction is probably no ... that makes them professionals.

But when I was the editor of my college paper, I was paid. It was only \$50 a month, but it was real money. Pay is pay. How about hiring athletes for doing stuff like waxing the basketball court floor, or chalking the baseball foul lines?

The idea seemed to have promise, until I remembered how my college had “no-show” jobs for its basketball players. It’s bad enough to pay jocks (or anybody) big money for little labor, but experience has shown that many of them wouldn’t even turn up at work,

The Impossible Dream?

Can the Man In the White House reform sport?

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump on Tuesday repeated his call for Congress to pass legislation that would rein in college sports at a time athletes are allowed to move freely from school to school and command salaries that put athletic departments in financial peril.

Trump’s remarks came at a White House event honoring some 100 athletes from seven teams that won NCAA championships in 2025.

Trump this month signed an executive order that would limit eligibility to five years, allow one transfer without penalty for undergraduates, stop pay-for-play schemes and build in protections for women’s and Olympic sports.

Aspects of the executive order might not withstand legal scrutiny, which is why Trump and some college sports stakeholders are asking for federal legislation that would codify restrictions and grant the NCAA an antitrust exemption to enforce rules.

Dozens of athletes have challenged NCAA eligibility rules

with the hope of extending their college careers and, in turn, their ability to earn money through name, image and likeness deals. He said it’s unfair for athletes right out of high school to compete against 28- or 29-year-olds.

“It’s a very precarious position the courts have left us in,” Trump said, adding that the 2025 settlement of House v. the NCAA created a professional model that

has led to financial instability for colleges. “And now it’s a total and complete mess. But we’re going to get it fixed up and we’ve got fantastic people doing it. So we need now Congress to act to clear up the confusion created by the courts and institute permanent reforms to protect college sports at every level, especially some sports.”

Cubs beat Dodgers in showdown

A showdown between two of the top teams in Major League Baseball on Friday night was just about as close as you could expect.

consider both an astonishing success story and an American tragedy. "Michael" doesn't try for that balance. It mainly follows the emergence of an icon, albeit a peculiar one who takes shelter in a room full of children's toys and whose need to be "perfect" drives him to cosmetic surgery in his early 20s. These and other developments (like the arrival of Bubbles the chimp) are mostly met with eye rolls by family members: the idiosyncrasies of a man-child genius. At nearly every turn, you can feel the narrative being twisted, sometimes by those still alive. (Joe Jackson died in 2018, nine years after his son's death at 50.)

Katherine Jackson (Nia Long), Michael's mother, is downright saintly. John Branca (Miles Teller), co-executor of Jackson's estate and a producer of the film, is seen as a heroic ally to Michael. Branca, perhaps, deserves the victory lap. Such a big-screen revival for Jackson was once unthinkable. But "Michael" is the latest in a string of successes for the former King of Pop, including Cirque du Soleil shows and "MJ the Musical" on Broadway — all despite the evidence pre-

sented by the 2019 documentary "Leaving Neverland." "Michael" isn't really a rebuttal to that film. It's pure pop shock-and-awe. And turning up the volume on "Beat It" will win you some arguments.

What's on screen is constantly running, in our minds, alongside what isn't. Even the glossiest of biopics allow some negative characteristics to show, but Fuqua's film sticks almost entirely to Michael, the myth. He visits kids in hospitals, makes Black history on MTV, writes the "Thriller" album in near solitude. (Kendrick Sampson plays a seldom-seen Quincy Jones.)

As played by Jaafar Jackson, Michael is a wide-eyed innocent who bore the scars of abuse and yet nevertheless maintained a childlike belief in music: king and casualty of pop, at once. If there's one thing that needs no embellishment here, it's the fervor of audiences for Jackson at his astonishing peak. Fuqua lingers on the fans losing their minds for Michael, but that ardor was real. Jaafar Jackson's perfor-

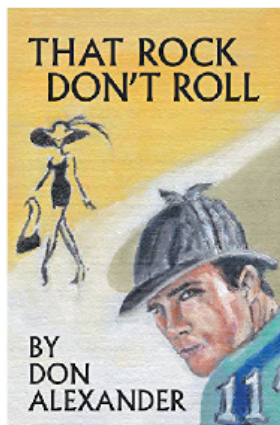
mance is a remarkable, charming facsimile not just for the dance moves and singing voice but, more crucially, for channeling Jackson's sweetness.

"Michael" concludes on an oddly and — considering where things would ultimately go for Jackson — completely false note of triumph. But when the movie sticks to the music, as it often does in copious concert performances, it's hard not to be moved. "Michael," a Lionsgate release in theaters Thursday, is rated PG-13 by the Motion Picture Association for some thematic material, language, and smoking. Running time: 127 minutes.
