Long-due renovations for the building that houses police services for the city of Stanton are on their way.

On the agenda for Tuesday's meeting of the Stanton City Council is official acceptance of a \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of

Housing and Urban Development to upgrade the facility in the civic center at 11100 Cedar St.

The structure dates back to when Stanton had its own police station. Police services are now supplied

by the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

Work included will be a new sewer line connection, interior walls and flooring restoration, ceiling tiles restoration, entrance door replacement, patio pergola removal, interior and exterior paint-

Nickelodeon Hotel OK'd For Harbor

7-0 vote clears way for large hotel project

What's probably the last remaining obstacle to beginning construction of a 500-room luxury hotel on Harbor Boulevard in Garden Grove has been cleared.

On Thursday, the city planning commission approved the site plan, planned unit development and supplemental environmental impact report on a 7-0 vote to build a Nickelodeon-themed hotel on a 3.72-acre site on Harbor at the northwest

corner with Twintree Avenue, south of the existing Sheraton Hotel.

The planned development would also include 17,715-square feet of ballroom and meeting rooms; restaurants that can seat up to 600 people and the Nick Studio theater, a studio hall, and 8,532 square feet devoted to retail and fitness spa.

The studio will be used to create and broadcast Nickelodeon TV properties. They include shows such as "Spongebob Squarepants" and "Paw Patrol." It's a property of Paramount, which is owned by Skydance Corporation.

The applicant was Kam

13-year-old motorcyclist is killed

The use – or misuse – of an electric motorcycle by a youth is blamed for the death of a 13-year-old Santa Ana boy killed in a traffic accident in Garden Grove Thursday night.

According to Sgt. Nick Jensen of the GGPD, the incident took place in the area of Magnolia Street

and Larson Avenue. Police were notified at 9:50 p.m. of a traffic collision in that area.

Arriving officers saw a male juvenile being loaded into an ambulance. He was unconscious and was transported to a local hospital with life-threatening injuries and was later pro-

nounced dead.

The investigation by the GGPD Traffic Unit indicated that the rider was operating an electric motorcycle in the number one ("fast") lane of Magnolia Street at about 35 miles an hour.

The rider and e-motorcy-

BJ's Restaurants showed \$9mill in Q1 profits

HUNTINGTON BEACH (AP) — BJ's Restaurants Inc. (BJRI) on Tuesday reported first-quarter net income of \$9 million.

The Huntington Beach, California-based company said it had net income of 41 cents per share. Earnings, adjusted for non-recurring costs, were 57 cents per share.

The results did not meet Wall Street expectations. The average estimate of four analysts surveyed by Zacks Investment Research was for earnings of 61 cents per share.

The restaurant chain posted revenue of \$358.1 million in the period, which topped Street forecasts. Four analysts surveyed by Zacks expected \$356.1 million.

BJ's Restaurants shares have fallen 3% since the beginning of the year. In the final minutes of trading on Tuesday, shares hit \$38.23, a decrease of 1% in the last 12 months.

U.S. Disables Two Iranian Tankers

But claims of a serious offer' from Tehran

United States forces fired on and disabled two Iranian tankers on Friday in the Strait of Hormuz.

According to the Associated Press, the action against the tankers came after the American ships exchanged fire with Iranian forces.

Additionally, the United Arab Emirates – a U.S. ally – reported again being attacked by missiles and drones fired from Iran. The military actions come as the U.S. maintains that a “cease-fire” is still in effect and that a settlement could be forthcoming.

The U.S. is insisting that Iran end its alleged nuclear development and reopen the Strait.

A “serious offer” from Iran is expected soon, said U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio on Friday.

‘Backdown’ on immigration crackdown worries GOP

Is the White House backing down on immigration enforcement?

The New York Times is reporting that some “hard-liners” in the Republican Party are growing upset with what they consider “doing too little” to crack down on illegal immigration.

The new Secretary of Homeland Security, Markwayne Mullin, has said he will take a different approach than his predecessor, Kristi Noem.

According to The Times, the

new approach – no more entering homes without judicial warrants, and mass roundups – comes from concerns in the White House that those tactics might cost Republicans votes in November.

But Tom Homan, “border czar” said that “This will be a good year. Mass deportations are coming.” Mullin, on the other hand, said his department would be focusing on “the worst of the worst. We’re going to go after the felons.”

Three-day cease-fire between Russia and Ukraine announced by Trump: starts Saturday

A three-day cease-fire and prisoner exchange between Russia and Ukraine has been agreed to, according to United Press International. The announcement came from President Donald Trump in his Truth Social platform. The pause will run Saturday through Monday, and both nations – according to the post – will be exchanging about 1,000 prisoners that have been captured since the war began four years ago.

UPI reports that the agreement comes a day before Victory Day, when Russia celebrates the victory of the Soviet Union and allies U.S. and Great Britain (and others) over Nazi Germany in World War 2.

Trump wrote in his post that he had made the request in calls to the two presidents.

WKRP Makes Comeback ... Sorta

TV show about radio inspired this version

CINCINNATI (AP) — WKRP isn't dead — as of Monday, it's living on the air in Cincinnati.

The call letters from the fictional radio station featured in a CBS sitcom were adopted by a trio of real "adult hits" stations in time for Monday's morning drive, and co-owner Jeff Ziesmann described listeners as "stoked."

"Our phones have been mobbed this morning, as I'm sure you can imagine," Ziesmann said.

Three stations in Cincinnati, northern Kentucky and Dayton, Ohio, simulcast the station's programming and listeners are now hearing them all identified as WKRP. They will continue to follow the format — music from the '60s to the '80s, with an emphasis on the 1970s — they've had under "The Oasis" brand.

The owners obtained the call letters by making a donation to a North Carolina nonprofit whose low-power radio station had them since 2014.

Ziesmann said a full-power station like his can use the same call letters because WKRP-LP in Raleigh is considered a separate class of station under federal regulations.

He said the nonprofit donation wasn't a direct purchase of the call letters — it was a purchase of the right to apply to the Federal Communications Commission for the call letters with the North Carolina group's cooperation.

The show "WKRP in Cincinnati" ran from 1978 to 1982 and starred Loni Anderson, Howard Hesseman, Tim Reid and Richard Sanders as bumbling newsman Les Nessman.

Sanders provided a very Nessman-like comment by email, with the actor saying: "I have spoken with Les Nessman regarding the resurrection of WKRP in Cincinnati. After the failure of his dream

to replace Walter Cronkite on the CBS evening news, he is hopeful that he can resume his duties as the News, Sports, Weather, Traf-

fic, and Farm Report Director at WKRP."

"I think we can all hope that WKRP will return to the airwaves

with more music and Les Nessman," Sanders said, echoing a running joke on the comedy series.

Holiday promotion that didn't fly

Probably the most memorable episode of "WKRP in Cincinnati" was a 1978 funny fictional account of a promotional event that, literally, crashed.

Nerdy newscaster Les Nessman (Richard Sanders) was doing a live spot at a shopping mall for a Thanksgiving stunt. He calmly and cheerfully reported the arrival of a helicopter which circled the area and then began disgorging ... sky divers? Without parachutes and ... "Ohmigod ... Turkeys!" In imitation of the famous radio broadcast of the crashing of the Hindenburg zeppelin in 1937, Nessman cried, "Oh! The humanity!" as the birds smashed into windshields and shopping carts. When it was all over, Station Manager Arthur Carlson (Gordon Jump) lamented, "As God is my witness, I thought turkeys could fly."

The Spirt of '76: More games for TV and gaming

Shocking News! Not Every College Basketball Team Will Make it To March Madness! Gamblers Grumble!

That's the sort of future headline you can expect to see in the not-too-distant future as college sports – indeed nearly all high-dollar athletics – race towards being a nearly-owned subsidiary of the NGAEO, National Gambling Association For Eternal Optimists.

Let me explain.

This week the NCAA announced its major men's and women's college basketball tournaments will each have a

field of 76 participants in 2027, a 21 percent increase from this year. That means that more than one out of five schools will go to a tournament originally

designed to sort out a dozen or so conference champions. We are moving to an era in which every team with a barely above .500 record (say, 16-15) can dream and yes, complain about who above the mediocre didn't get a chance to be slaughtered on ESPN by 40 points in the first round.

What's going on is fairly obvious. The more games, the more opportunities for broadcasts. The more broadcasts, the more wagering. The more wagering, the more people who will bet on a game that most folks otherwise wouldn't watch the broadcast if they were paid to.

I'm not implying the tendency to have more teams in March Madness is corrupting the game of college basketball. That process is already well underway. What it is doing is diluting the

Ted Turner: One of a Kind

An influence in sport, media and a lot more yet

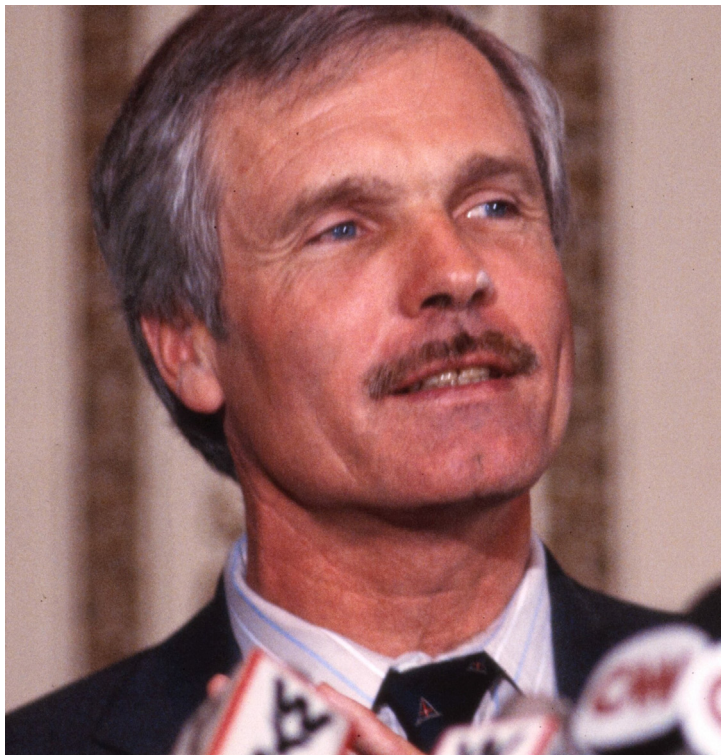

ATLANTA (AP) — Ted Turner was a sportsman of all types, a world champion in sailing and a World Series-winning owner in baseball.

He famously owned the Atlanta Braves, leveraging his ownership of the TBS superstation to broadcast their games across the country, all while showcasing his outsized personality at a time when many owners stayed behind the scenes.

Turner, who died Wednesday, bought the struggling Braves in the 1970s, put the team on his then-tiny TV station and then sold the signal to cable systems nationwide.

"He effectively transformed the Braves into a team with a national reach and set the table for ways that local teams have now gained more of a national footprint," said Travis Vogan, a sports media professor at the University of Iowa.

With a burgeoning fanbase that stretched far beyond the South, the Braves turned into a World Series mainstay during the 1990s, and Turner finally hoisted the Commissioner's Trophy in 1995 before selling the fran-

chise the next year.

In a statement Wednesday, MLB Commissioner Rob Manfred called Turner a "visionary whose impact on the media landscape transformed how fans experience sports."

Leadoff batter Shohei Ohtani is continuing to play as a mortal, getting just one hit in four at-bats (.248 so far in 2026) but drove in a run.

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How gerrymandering works and may not

The gerrymandering of House districts is becoming more rampant across the U.S.

The word "gerrymander" was coined in America more than 200 years ago as an unflattering way to describe the political manipulation of boundaries for legislative voting districts by those in charge of drawing them.

The word has stood the test of time, in part because American politics remain fiercely competitive. And with time and technology, politicians have become even more adept

at drafting voting districts that benefit their political party.

How are voting districts drawn?

In many states, the legislature is responsible for drawing U.S. House districts, subject to the approval or veto of the governor.

District maps must be redrawn every decade, after each census, to make sure that each district has about the same number of



voters.

But in certain states, nothing prevents legislatures from redistricting more often.

Some states entrust redistricting to special commissions composed of citizens or bipartisan panels of politicians in an effort to limit gerrymandering.

How does a gerrymander work?

If a political party controls the legislature and governor's office — or has such a large legislative majority that it can override vetoes — it can effectively draw districts to its advantage.

One common method of gerrymandering is for a majority party to draw voting districts that dilute the power of an opposing party's voters by spreading them among multiple districts. Another is for the majority party to pack voters who support the opposing party into a few districts, thus allowing the majority party to win a greater number of surrounding districts.

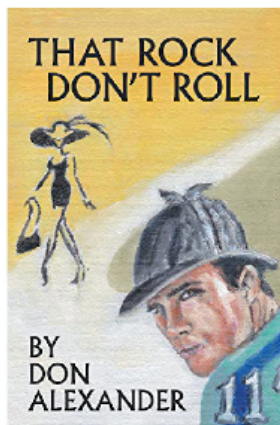

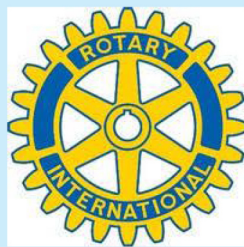

dubbed it “The Gerry-mander” — a term that later came to describe any district drawn for political advantage. Gerry lost reelection as governor in 1812 but won election that same year as vice president to President James Madison.

Though Gerry’s name was pronounced with a hard “G” — like Gary — his namesake redistricting method is pronounced with a soft “G” — like Jerry.

Is political gerrymandering

in elections illegal?

Not under the U.S. Constitution.

The Supreme Court, in a 2019 case originating from North Carolina, ruled that federal courts have no authority to decide whether partisan gerrymandering goes too far. Chief Justice John Roberts wrote: “The Constitution supplies no objective measure for assessing whether a districting map treats a political party fairly.”

The court noted that partisan gerrymandering claims could

continue to be decided in state courts under their own constitutions and laws. Some state courts, including the North Carolina Supreme Court, have ruled they also have no authority to decide partisan gerrymandering claims.

Why are more states errymandering?

The urge to gerrymander can become stronger when more is at stake. For example, the 2024 elections resulted in a very slim Republican majority in the U.S.

House. To try to maintain that majority in the 2026 elections, President Donald Trump urged Republican officials in Texas to redraw their congressional districts to their advantage to win additional seats. Democrats who control California’s government countered by redrawing their congressional districts to try to win more seats — a move ratified by California voters. The gerrymandering in the nation’s two most populous states led officials in other states to also redraw House districts to try to gain their parties an edge.

What does data show about gerrymandering?

Statisticians and political scientists have developed a variety of ways to try to quantify the partisan advantage that may be attributable to gerrymandering.

Republicans, who control redistricting in more states than Democrats, used the 2010 census data to create a strong gerrymander.

An Associated Press analysis of that decade’s redistricting found that Republicans enjoyed a greater political advantage in more states than either party had in the past 50 years.

Democrats responded to match Republican gerrymandering after the 2020 census. An AP analysis of the 2024 elections showed a significant political tilt in one-third of the states’ congressional districts, an indicator of potential gerrymandering.

But the overall number of U.S. House seats won by Republicans and Democrats aligned almost perfectly with what would have been expected based on the share of the vote that each party received in districts across the nation.
